Hoop Season Opens Saturday Night; GHS, KHS, Both at Home

The 1973-74 basketball season opens Saturday evening, December 1, with both the Genesee Bulldogs and the Kendrick Tigers debuting before their respective home town fans. Kendrick will be hosting the Deary Mustangs in a non-league game while the Genesee Bulldogs entertain the visiting Timberline Spartans in an A-3 league clash.

Genesee Has One Starter

Coach Orzle Kamlikeberg describes his GHS Bulldogs as "not too big"; but not really small—not very fast, but pretty quick." Orzle faces a rebuilding year his season as he begins with only one returning starter from last year's successful squad and one other letterman.

Back this year is 5-9 senior guard Jeff Boyd who was a starter on the team that compiled an 18-8 record. Ron Tigen, a 6-2 senior, also won his basketball letter last year.

Moving up from the JV's will be Ron Nichols, Dan Mader, Ralph Stout, Pat Mervyn and Sheldon Hampton. From the Frosh squad of last season come Dan Stout and Doug Green.

Senior Curt Hermann, who layed out of basketball last year, moves up to the varsity squad and is expected to help under the baskets.

Nichols, at 6-3, is the tallest man on the team this year, closely followed by Tigen, Mader and Ralph Stout, all at about the 6-2 mark.

"This is going to be a tough league this year," said Orzle, as he reviewed some of the competition. Mentioning particularly Lapwai, Kamiah, Prairie and Kendrick, all of who are loaded with returning talent.

"But, with some experience we ought to do pretty well," he added.

Orzle will be assisted by Gary Hoek, Jr. High math and science teacher, who is coaching the JV squad. Von Hopkins is handling the Frosh team.

Coach George Nolan takes over a KHS Tiger team loaded with returning lettermen and starters, including his big men from last year. The Tigers were the surprise of the tournament last season, coming in unheralded but ending up giving some of the top-ranked teams trouble before being forced out. Coach Nolan and his Tigers hope to give even more and rougher competition this year.

Following a varsity scrimmage Monday evening which was refereed by Scrapy Curtis of Lewiston, Nolan was especially pleased with the defensive work of his team and its rebounding capabilities. Curtis, who refereed some of the Tigers' tournament games last year, told the Kendrick coach his Tigers were "vastly improved from last season."

Returning lettermen are Ron Siffow, Dennis Lukecart, Kelly Clemenberger, Marty Clemenberger, Ed Anderson, Jim Souders and Vern Reed, at 6-3½, and Anderson at 6-2, provide the height for the Tigers.

Coming up from the junior varsity squad are Ken Brown, Don Benjamin and Bob Parks. Ron Whitum is also joining the team for the first time.

"We've got good potential," Nolan said when asked about how he thought his team's chances were this season. "We've got good running ability and good quickness," he added.

The Tigers will use the fast break on offense whenever they can, the coach said, and will be using a combination zone and man-to-man defense of about 12 different varieties, depending on circumstances.

Following the Deary game, the Tigers travel to Prairie the following Friday night, Dec. 7.

District Elections Set For Monday

Five district elections to choose commissioners for various road, fire and cemetery districts in this area are set for Monday, December 3.

Electing commissioners for terms of four years, will be South Latah Highway District, Genesee Rural Fire Protection District, Potlatch Cemetery District, Nezah Cemetery District and the Genesee Community Cemetery Maintenance District.

First Highway Election

This will be the first election of the South Latah Highway District since it was organized and consolidated out of the old Genesee-Rimrock Highway District, Kendrick Road District and the Good Roads District. At the time of its organization, all commissioners were appointed by the state. Now, three years later, the first of the appointed commissioners' terms expire. Jack Parsley, incumbent commissioner from Sub-District No. 3 is running unopposed for election. Voting may be done at the Kendrick Fire Hall or at the Genesee Fire Station between the hours of 1 and 7 p.m.

Genesee Rural Fire District

One commissioner from Sub-District 2 of the Genesee Rural Fire Protection District will be elected in balloting to take place in the city room of the fire station between the hours of 1 and 7 p.m. Incumbent J. P. (Phil) Hermann is unopposed in his bid for another four-year term.

Nezah Cemetery Election, Kendrick

Commissioners from Sub-District No. 1 and Sub-District No. 2 of the Nezah Cemetery District will be elected in voting at the Kendrick Fire Hall Monday, Dec. 3. Ervin Mabbott is unopposed on the ballot for commissioner from Sub-District No. 1 and Oscar Slind is unopposed for commissioner from Sub-District No. 2. Polls are open from 1 to 7 p.m. in the Fire Hall.

Genesee Cemetery District

Laverne Anderson, Sub-District No. 1 and John Myers, Jr., Sub-District No. 2 of the Genesee Community Cemetery Maintenance District, are unopposed on the ballot for commissioners of this district which encompasses all the cemeteries in the Genesee area. Balloting will be from 1 to 7 p.m. at the Genesee Fire Hall. Both positions are for four years.

Potlatch Cemetery District

Two commissioners for the Potlatch Cemetery District are to be chosen in Monday balloting. Wm. Thornton's name will appear on the ballot as candidate for commissioner from Sub-District No. 1 and Ted Meyer will be a candidate for commissioner from Sub-District No. 2. Both officers are for four-year terms. Leland Church is the polling place from 1 to 7 p.m.

Unemployment Claims Increase in County

Although Moscow job openings and placement of job seekers declined from the previous week, the Department of Employment office reported that there was an increase over the Thanksgiving week of last year. During the week just ended, Frank J. Harstein office manager, reported that his office found jobs for 6 Latah county workers, compared with eleven placed during the previous week, and 2 placed during the same week in 1972. At the end of the week there were 11 jobs still open, the same as at the end of the previous week, but less than half the number available one year ago.
 59 persons mostly woodworkers and construction workers filed new claims for unemployment insurance during the week bringing Latah County's jobless pay rolls up to a total of 861. During the previous week 89 workers filed new claims, and the total number seeking benefits was 324. A year ago the total was only 204. Inclement weather was blamed for most of the lay-offs, although a few workers indicated other reasons for being idled. Harstein indicated that freezing weather, if not accompanied by a lot of snow, may enable many of the woodworkers to return to work during the next week or so.

Nickel Plating May Cause Allergy

Heading the list of commonly found substances causing allergic reactions is nickel sulfate, an ingredient often found in cheap costume jewelry, reports the Idaho Medical Association.
 Nickel plated earrings, watchbands and other items caused an allergic reaction in about 11 percent of their wearers, a testing program involving 12,000 people in North America indicated.
 Other substances high on the list of causes of allergic reactions was potassium dichromate, found in tanned leather and in concrete. About eight percent of the subjects were allergic to this chemical.
 Thimerosal caused allergic reaction in eight percent of the subjects. It is often encountered as an ingredient of merthiolate, a commonly used antiseptic.
 Thirteen dermatologists, skin specialists representing 10 separate centers took part in the study in which patients were patch tested with 16 allergens to determine which substances are most likely to be causing allergic reactions.
 All of the substances, caused redness, skin rash and itching.

Carbon Monoxide Hazard In Winter

Carbon monoxide is a deadly gas that you cannot taste, smell or see, and it becomes a special hazard in the winter, cautions the Idaho Medical Association.
 It is produced whenever a carbon-containing material burns, and is hard to detect except by its symptoms—drowsiness, headache, tightness across the forehead, confusion, nausea and muscular weakness.
 If the victim cannot reach fresh air, carbon monoxide kills.
 Automobile exhaust is one source, and improperly installed and maintained home heating systems are also dangerous.
 Heating systems should be checked annually for operating efficiency. Vents, pipes, flues, and chimneys should be tight.
 Heating devices calling for outside air should be properly vented.
 If types of fuel are changed, a qualified service man should adjust all appliances involved.

Becoming Better Patients

It takes at least two to cure an illness. The doctor and the patient. Seeing a doctor soon about symptoms that don't go away—like a cough or breathlessness—is one good way to help prevent long-term lung diseases.
 Too many people postpone seeing a doctor because they hope in vain that their symptoms will disappear. When the symptoms persist, they are embarrassed about their delay and sometimes are less truthful with the doctor once they see him or her. Patients may also say they drink or smoke less than they do. And they may hesitate to volunteer facts that could help the doctor diagnose the illness. To help, doctors need all the pertinent information they can get.
 One way to be a better patient is to organize your thoughts and the history of your illness before you see the doctor. This gets the picture clear in your own mind and you're less likely to overlook pertinent points to tell the doctor. It also helps the doctor get to the cause of your problem sooner. And if the doctor's explanations are not clear, ask questions. Doctors don't know when you don't understand if you don't tell them.
 Too many patients do not follow the doctor's instructions. Many stop taking medications once they feel better. That may not be long enough. If you have a TB infection, for example, you must take pills every day for at least a year in order not to develop TB illness. Skipping pills, failing to come back for follow-up visits, not sticking to a recommended diet—all these wipe out the good care your doctor wants to provide.

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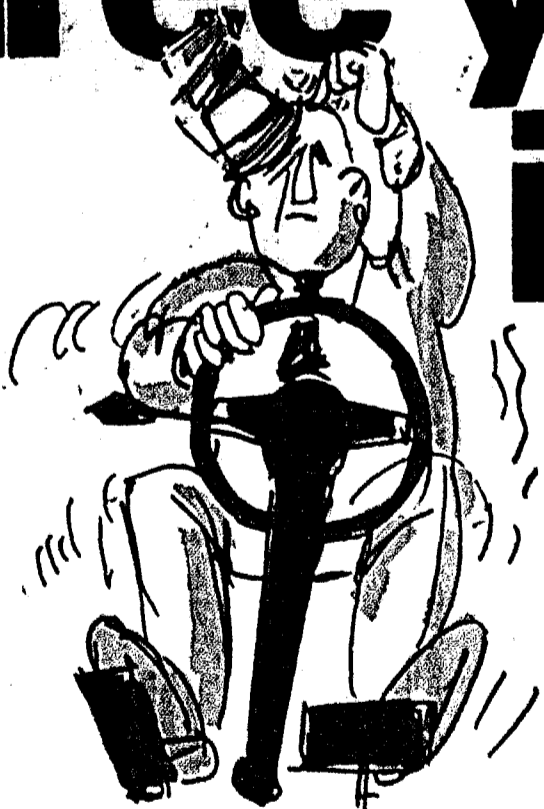
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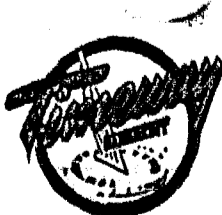

Can At Home For Special Diets and Save

Buying canned fruits and vegetables for a family member on a low salt or low sugar diet can be expensive.

If you have a home garden, you can save money by canning fruits and vegetables for special diets at home. Perhaps you can get produce at a good price or a friend gives you some.

Sugar and salt used in regular home canning are only for flavor. They do not affect keeping quality of home-canned food, Esther H. Wilson, nutrition specialist, University of Idaho cooperative extension service, points out.

When canning without sugar, use fully ripe but not over-ripe fruit. Prepare fruit as you would for regular canning. Then add a little water and cook the fruit until it is boiling hot.

Pack the hot fruit into hot canning jars. If necessary, add boiling water to cover. Adjust caps and process water bath canner for the recommended time for the particular fruit.

DO NOT add artificial sweeteners to the fruit before it is canned. Add sweeteners to fruit when it is ready to eat and according to the family

Hunting-Fishing End For Big Game, Trout

All general deer and elk hunting is now closed in Idaho except for 3 deer units and 1 elk unit in eastern Idaho, and some general archery hunting. Several controlled post season elk and deer hunts will be open for permit holders only during December. Statewide general trout season ends November 30.

Sportsmen also are reminded by the Idaho Fish and Game Department that the season for harvesting the three species of forest grouse—blue, ruffed and spruce or Franklins grouse ended November 25.

Sportsmen are urged by the department to check regulations before going hunting or fishing. Some waters are open for year-round fishing; others prior to November 30. Special seasons for some or all species of fish in specified waters also are listed in the 1973 fishing regulations.

Management units where hunting seasons are open for mountain lion are listed in big game regulations. The use of dogs to trail, hunt or kill mountain lion in any unit of the state is unlawful through December 14. Nonresidents must have a non-resident hunting and fishing license (\$135) and cougar tag (\$10) to take mountain lion. The bag limit is one cougar per year, except as provided.

It is illegal to kill or capture a spotted mountain lion kitten, or a female accompanied by a kitten. It is unlawful to kill or capture a moun-

tain lion in captivity without a permit. The hide (with evidence of sex attached) and the skull of each lion must be presented to a conservation officer or Fish and Game Department regional office within five days after kill. In addition, a report must be made giving the location and date the cougar was bagged. Hides will be sealed with a metal tag which must remain attached until the hide is tanned. Skull will be retained by the department until cleaned and

If you are canning special foods for only one family member, half-pint or pint jars are the best to use. After opening, a jar of home-canned food will keep in the refrigerator two or three days, depending on type of food and refrigerator temperature.

Some ways to improve flavor of saltless vegetables, providing the ingredients also aren't restricted from the special diet are:

* One-half to one tablespoon lemon or orange juice and a tiny piece of peel will give flavor to each pint of carrots, beets or asparagus.

* Green beans and peas get a lift from a bit of mace, nutmeg or curry powder.

* Learn to use herbs and spices when cooking without salt.

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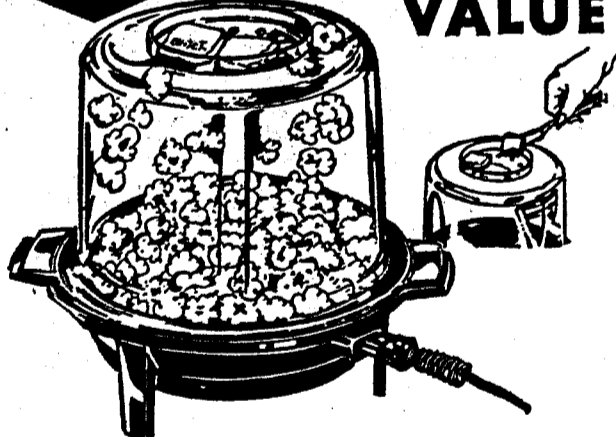

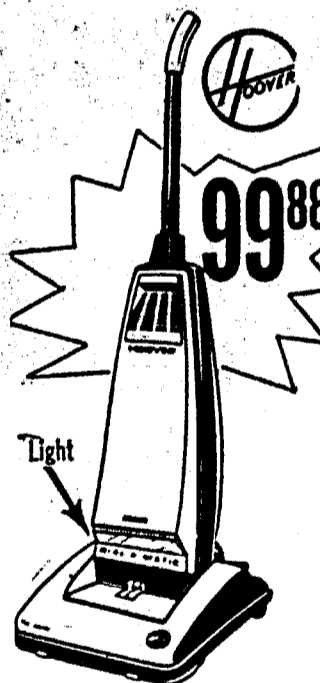

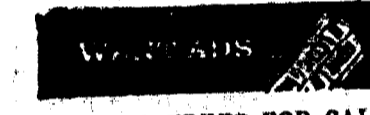
