Bulldogs Bump Rams; Tigers Top Timberline In Week's Hoop Action

Both the Genesee Bulldogs and the Kendrick Tigers took victories in League competition over the weekend. Kendrick hosted the Spartans of Timberline and beat them in a tight 55-48 game for the second win in three starts. Genesee had no trouble disposing of the visiting Clearwater Valley Rams for a 61-41 win—the third without a loss.

Bulldogs Breeze Genesee found itself on the short end of a 0-4 score in the opening seconds of the game against Clearwater Valley Saturday night before Curt Hermann dumped in the first field goal of the night. Ron Teigen, on his way to a 22-point effort, tied it all at 4-4 with a ten foot jump shot; Dan Mader sent the GHS boys ahead 6-4 and it was all Bulldogs from then on. Genesee had pushed out to an 18-8 first quarter lead.

Keeping about ten points ahead most of the second frame, GHS spurted just before the halftime and took a 34-18 bulge into the dressing room. The Rams rallied sharply about midway in the third period and closed to within four points, 36-32, with 2:33 left in the quarter before Genesee called timeout and smoothed down. Teigen dropped in a field goal and the Bulldogs were off and running again and racked up ten straight points without a reply from the CV boys as the quarter ended 46-32.

Ozzie's boys kept control of the game in the final quarter of play and with the bench strength shutting in and out, finished up with a 61-41 victory. Lanky Ron Teigen broke the back of the Rams with his hot 22-point effort. Jeff Boyd and Ralph Stout both both dumped in 10 points each while Curt Hermann added 8 points and was a strong factor in the Bulldog's domination of the back boards. JV Win 52-29

In the opening game, the Genesee JVs saw an 8-0 lead disappear and had to start all over again from 9-9 before they finally downed the little Rams 52-29 in what became a runaway contest. Genesee was out in front 10-16 at the half.

Tigers Overcome Spartans After losing to strong Prairie last Tuesday, Coach Geo. Nolan's Kendrick Tigers had to come back strong in the second half to finally defeat the visiting Timberline Spartans 55-48 for their second victory in three starts.

Timberline moved out quick and marked up 15 points in the first quarter while holding the Tigers to 10. Kendrick could manage only 10 points in the second quarter but the Spartans got 16 and were ahead 31-20 at the half.

The Tigers finally got its offense untangled in the third period and with Reed, Clemenhagen and Silflow leading the way, scored 22 and were holding a slim 42-41 lead going into the final frame. Tight defense held the Spartans to just 7 points in the fourth quarter and the Tigers got 13 for the 55-48 win. Lavern Reed's 16 points paced the Tigers with Kelly Clemenhagen getting 12 and Ron Silflow 13.

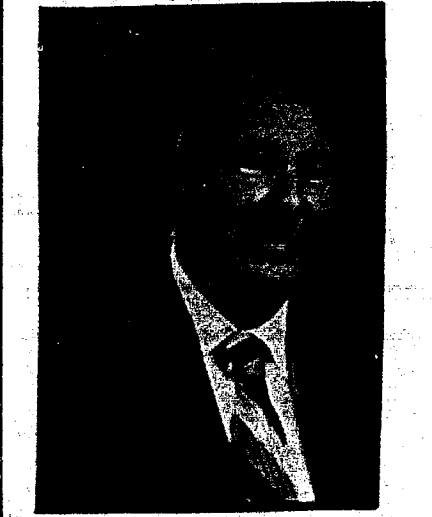

Supt. Blakeley Tells Trustees of Retirement Plans

Superintendent Don Blakeley again advised the trustees at their meeting Monday, Dec. 10, that he would not be returning as administrator of Joint School District 283 schools for 1974-75, and urged that a search for a new superintendent start early, so a good replacement might be selected. Most superintendents' contracts are renewed early in January, but the superintendent and trustees feel that the vacancy should be made known at once instead of waiting until all available eligible candidates are contacted.



Mr. Blakeley stated, "I have nothing but praise for the wonderful principals and a fine staff of teachers. According to Blakeley, "The schools have made tremendous progress under all trustees that he has served under the past four years. Two excellent chairmen have paved the way and held the line. The people have just been marvelous with their cooperation and the students have steadily improved in attitude and citizenship. It is hard to quit under these conditions, but I feel that 36 years in the school game is long enough and there has to be a time when we all have to quit. Our plans are to live here for at least a year following termination of my contract June 30, do some fishing, hunting and traveling that has been curtailed due to my occupation."

The energy crisis was discussed and recommendations by the State Department of Education Energy Task Force considered; however, no action was taken pending the State Superintendents meeting in Boise, December 13 and 14. Following the state meeting all Latah County superintendents will meet at Moscow. Decisions will then be announced to the board of trustees for final action. Carolyn Morse and Richard Runak discussed goals they hoped to achieve in their respective departments; namely, Business Education and Boys P.E.

Principal Robert Heppner outlined the results of S.R.A. tests taken this fall in grades 7, 8 and 9. All three grades placed above the national averages. Strong areas are: Reading, Use of Sources, Math Concepts, Science and Social Studies.

After an evaluation of the Learning Disabilities classes it was decided to employ another teacher's aide which will not cost the district any added money. The superintendent is receiving applications for the ancillary aide position which will pay \$2 an hour for a school day starting Jan. 21. Educational requirements are at least a high school education. In conclusion the trustees set up guidelines for the employment of a superintendent for 1974-75. All applicants are to apply to Superintendent Blakeley.

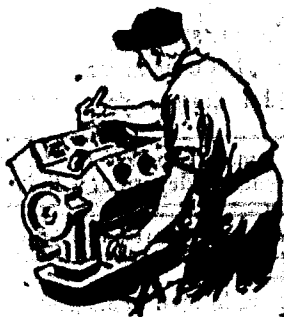

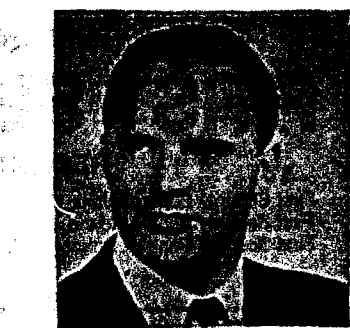
