






the fancy names for meats cuts have been dropped. Miller said the ribeye steak is an example. The names Delmonico, fillet and beauty, used in will no longer apply under the new standards.

The new labels will carry three main parts-the name of the animal species from which the meat came

(beef, pork, lamb, veal), the primal or sub-primal cut (rib shoulder, loin), and the recommended name of the particular cut (steak, roast). A Porterhouse steak, for example,

would be labeled beef loin Porterhouse steak.

It may be that some of the old. fancy names of cuts will also appear on labels. However, the basic recom-mended name must be on the priceweight label, Miller stated.

Ground meat labels are also due for revision. Ground beef will be labeled as such, And, the label will include the lean meat percentage, which must be at least 70 per cent to meet government standards.

If the ground meat actually comes from a particular part of the animal, such as the round, chuck or sirloin, then it can be labeled ground beef round, ground beef chuck or ground beef sirioin. The percentage of lean would also be noted.

The new standard label system will make meat shopping less confusing Thank you and therefore a little easier, Miller Sons, Inc. believes.




