**WINTER SLEEP**

Surviving a freezing winter in an energy crisis is not easy for people. But black bear, bats, woodchucks, skunks, badgers and other animals as well as insects are curled up in their caves and holes. Sleeping the winter away.

The winter sleep of the black bear is an unparalleled marvel in the natural world. Bears begin to den early in October. Denning is complete by December and usually lasts until April. From 3 to 5 months during the winter the black bear undergoes a metamorphosis. The rate of breathing drops drastically, the body temperature falls, and the heart only beats 8 times a minute instead of 40 times as in summer.

During hibernation, the black bear does not eat, drink, or eliminate any waste products. Unlike some other

**Parents Might Cause Child's Hyperactivity**

Hyperactivity in children might be linked to genetic and environmental influences of parents.

A study of 50 boys diagnosed as hyperactive, compared with 50 boys diagnosed as normal, revealed that nearly half the hyperactive youngsters had parents who had been hyperactive children or were suffering from emotional disturbances. There was no hyperactivity among parents in the control group of normal youngsters.

This study, conducted by Dr. Dennis P. Cantwell, University of Southern California in Los Angeles, noted that although it is not certain whether hyperactivity is passed on through heredity or by environment experiences, the family factor appears to be strongly implicated, reports Ruth Spidahl, state home economics leader, University of Idaho cooperative extension service.

The findings may encourage professionals and parents to consider the possibility that child and parents should be included for counseling and treatment, she suggests.

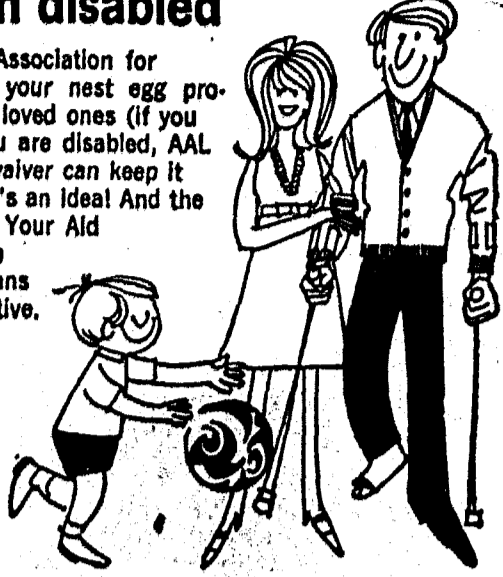

**IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT**

7 Latah Co. workers were given job finding assistance through the Moscow office of the Idaho Dept. of Employment during the past week. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager said this was a decline from the 12 so helped last week and down from the 13 placed during this same time last year. At the end of the week 8 new jobs had been received and there were 9 jobs available. Most of the jobs available are for restaurant and domestic workers.

Claims for unemployment insurance declined drastically during the past week as workers returned to woodwork, and to cedar operations throughout the area, Hartstein's report continued. A total of 87 persons discontinued filing claims. Most returned to work, some exhausted claims, others were found to be ineligible for benefits, while some others moved from the area. 31 new claims were filed during the week, compared with 43 during the previous week. At the end of the week there were 519 persons seeking benefits compared with 575 during the previous week and with 355 during the same week a year ago. In the immediate Moscow area the total is now 275, down from last week's 304 but up from 1973's figure of 206. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area the total declined from 128 a week ago to the current 114, compared with 72 last year. At Potlatch the current total

is 92, down from last week's 99 but almost double 1973's figure of 47. At Genesee the totals are 23 now, 29 last week and 21 last year, while the Kendrick area shows 15 now, the same as a week ago but up from last year's 10. Hartstein reported that his office accepted 3 claims for Disaster Unemployment Assistance from persons who may be eligible in accordance with the Governor's recent announcement.

### POOL IT!

Car pools are one way to help conserve energy, cut traffic, save money, and fight pollution. And they provide door-to-door service.

Studies show that in major metropolitan areas the average car occupancy for work trips during rush hours is 1.6 persons per vehicle. If car occupancy could even be increased to 2 persons per vehicle, 20 percent of cars would be removed from rush hour traffic.

Now galvanized by the energy crisis, all kinds of groups are organizing computer pools and matching services for drivers. Even before this winter's crisis, figures from the U. S. Bureau of the Census showed that more people were using car-pools than were riding buses, street cars, subways, and elevated trains combined.

Some companies have developed ingenious car pool systems. The 3M Company in St. Paul, Minnesota, for example, owns 30 vans that hold 12 passengers each. Passengers pay a monthly fee based on the number of miles from home to work. If they want, drivers get to use the vans nights and weekends for the vehicle and maintenance. But if the driver can get more than 8 passengers, he or she can keep the fees. The 3M Company says it never expected the spectacular success of the system.

Car-pools can never take the place of public mass transit systems, those systems are vitally needed. But car-pools can happen overnight at savings all around. And the idea of
