

Tight Budgeting Task

Three months of critical budgeting face the trustees, and superintendent of schools if the status quo is to be maintained in the District for 1974-75.


Inflation and the energy crisis make budgeting in 116 Idaho School Districts the most difficult in years. Most school superintendents and trustees are completely baffled on how and when to proceed.

Answers to this dilemma for this District depends upon what course the legislature takes upon the reducvtion of the school tax levy from 27 mills to 25 mills. Such a reduction would mean a loss of \$6,053.05. If they cut the levy to 22 mills it would mean a loss in District 283 of \$15,-132.63. The first would hurt us and the second levy would about sink us for good. These estimates are based on last year's assessed valuation.

The total foundation allowance depends a lot upon whether the Legislature goes for the \$18.1 million suggested by the LE.A., \$15 million sug-gested by the State Trustees Association, or \$6 to \$7 million suggested by the governor. If the district tax levy remains at 27 mills and the Legislature grants an appropriation of \$15 million, we can maintain high quality education in District 283 and meet all increases without anymore additional mills than levied last year. Last year we had to pass an M&O levy for 6 mills above 27 or 33 to receive a \$1,500 college scholarship exist.

Let's take a look at State President Gary L. Morris' recent statener also earns for his or her school, ments about school finance for 1974-75: "Idaho is fortunate in having one Annals of America", from Encyclo-paedia Brittanica Educational Corp-bases in the United States, and I strongly support keeping this tax base intact. I doubt that a change in the tax base at this time is either wise or justifiable in face of current inflationary problems. Our tax base should remain the same and our present so-called surplus of \$28 million should be used to assist our public schools and other state and local agencies."

Second, third and fourth place winners will receive scholarship increases to \$4,000, \$3,000 Mr. Morris continued, "A recent research into the Bureau of Labor statistics reveals that we may expect the cost of living index to continue upward toward an 11 or 12 percent. increase during the current fiscal year. Considering all factors and taking this straight across the board on all public school mney, we should need approximately \$15 million to keep up with current inflationary trends. As you are aware we are continually told that Idaho is behind other neighboring states in teachers' tain schools and the total dollars spent per child on public education." While on the subject of teacher salaries, here are the base salaries for a Bachelor's degree and no experience in Latah County as of 1973-74: Moscow \$6781; Genesee \$6741; Whitepine \$6650; Potlatch \$6800; Kendrick \$6500. Our District is lower than any of our neighbors. We must keep abreast of our other county schools, if we are to competefor desirable teachers. A breakdown of President Gary Morris' estimates for 1974-75 based upon all Idaho school districts latest calculations, reveal that the following burget category increase should be made for 1974-1975: Instructional salaries, 12% increase: administrative salaries, 12% increase; transportation, 25% increase; maintenance and operation, 25% increase: fixed charges, 12% increase; capital outlay, 12% increase; other general funds, 12% increase: In conclusion Mr. Morris says, "The 25% increase in transportation and M&O costs can easily be justified. For example, gasoline, heating oil, paper and nearly all the consumable supplies have increased anywhere from 25% to 100%. Costs for equipment and services have risen so rapidly that it is difficult to make an accurate projection. Costs for books, paper, repairs and general upkeep are significantly higher and I find it difficult to see where it will level off." Frankly speaking, we don't know exactly what the outcome will be, but we most certainly will do our utmost to operate within the same tax levy as last year, with no additional increase. It will take about three months' study and work before a budget can be adopted. - Don A. Blakeley.

WINTER SLEEP

Surviving a freezing winter in an energy crisis is not easy for people. But black bear, bats, woodchucks, skunks, badgers and other animals as well as insects are curled up in their caves and holes. Sleeping the winter away.

The winter sleep of the black bear is an unparalled marvel in the natural world. Bears begin to den early in October. Denning is complete by December and usually lasts until April. From 3 to 5 months during the winter the black bear undergoes a metamorphosis. The rate of breath-ing drops drasticially, the body tem-perature falls, and the heart only beats 8 times a minute instead of 40 times as in summer.
