#### JOBLESS CLAIMS IN LATAH COUNTY DECLINED

The number of persons continuing to claim unemployment insurance benefits declined for the third week in a row.

Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager for the Idaho Department of Employment, reported this week that there are currently 440 persons receiving jobless pay compared with 483 at the end of the previous week. He said his office had only 299 persons filing such claims a year ago. Nineteen persons filed new claims during the week, compared with 29 during the previous week and 26 during the same week in 1973.

Hartstein said most of those who discontinued their claims were woodworkers and sawmill workers from the various employing establishments throughout the county.

In the immediate Moscow area the number of claimants fell from last week's 253 to the current 249, but was up from 1973's figure of 168. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area the total is now 84 compared with 80 last week and 60 last year. In the Potlatch area, the current total is 81, up from last week's 80, and considerably higher than the 45 of late February, 1973.

At Genesee the figures are 19 this week, 25 last week and 15 a year ago. At Kendrick there are 7 this week, 12 last week and 11 a year ago.

There are currently 12 persons seeking or receiving assistance through the Distaster Unemployment Assistance Act throughout the county.

Hartstein's report indicated that job placement activity is about normal for this time of year. His office found jobs for 6 workers during the week, compared with 5 last week, and 5 during the same week a year ago. A slight increase in the number of new listings was noted, rising from 9 to 12. At the end of the week there were 17 jobs still available.

Pvt. Joseph B. Schooler, son of Charles W. Schooler, Genesee, Idaho is a newly arrived soldier at Jefferson Barracks.

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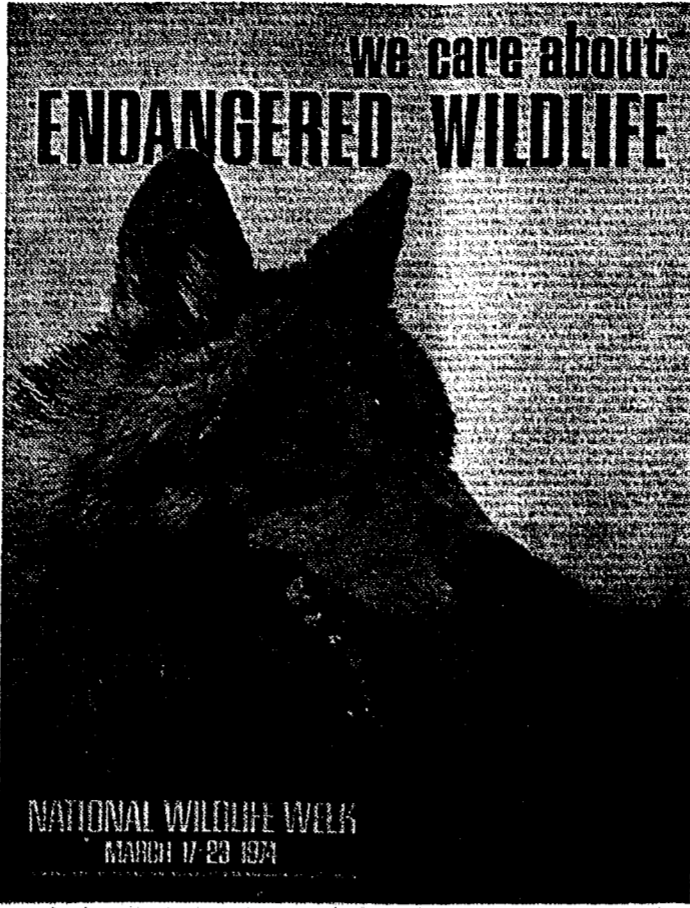

#### SNOWMOBILE FUN DEPENDS ON INDIVIDUAL DRIVERS

Wintering conditions for big game animals and game birds are good most places around the state. Exceptions include wintering areas northwest of Snowville, Utah; the South Fork of the Boise River north of Fairfield; and the Warm Springs area near Ketchum, where supplemental feeding operations are underway.

In other areas, snow machine enthusiasts sometimes disturb wintering animals by trying to get closer for better pictures. Moving through snow burns energy reserves that elk and deer need for survival. Most drivers do not realize that disturbing the animals forces them closer to exhaustion.

Idaho has laws against such activity. Statute 49-2611 states that it is unlawful for any person to operate a snow machine in a negligent way so as to harass game animals or birds. Conservation officers regularly patrol problem areas to protect wintering populations.

Cooperation from all snow machine users is essential to solve this problem.

#### SALMON-STEELHEAD PLANTS

More young steelhead and salmon were stocked in Idaho waters in 1973 than in any previous year as a result of efforts of the Idaho Fish and Game Department, the U. S. Fish and

Wildlife Service, and the Idaho Power Company.

A total of just under 13 million steelhead fry, fingerlings and smolts were released, compared to an average of 3.2 million fish the past five years. There were about 4.73 million young spring chinook salmon released, compared to an average of 3.1 million the past five years.

All of the plantings should help the future runs of salmon and steelhead in Idaho.

Last year's salmon harvest was one of the best during the past ten years with an estimated 9,721 chinook salmon being caught. The salmon and steelhead regulations are printed separately this year in two folding leaflets, while general fishing seasons and regulations are printed

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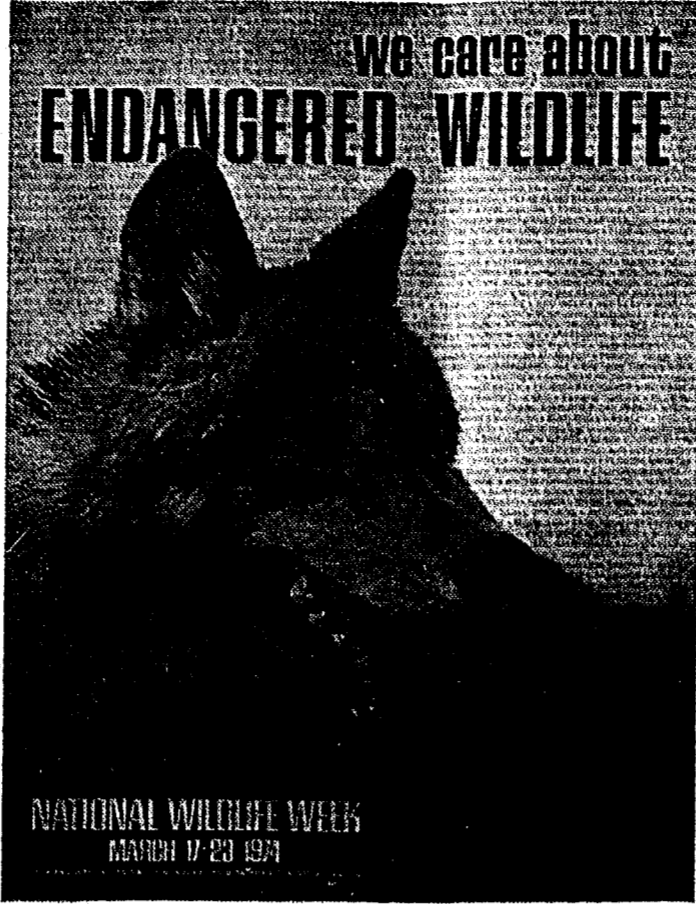
