



#### BAN LIFTED ON DES USE

Cattlemen can again legally use diethylstilbestrerol (DES), a livestock growth hormone, according to Dr. Richard Bull, University of Idaho animal nutritionist in the College of Agriculture.

DES was banned by the U. S. Food and Drug Administration about a year ago. However, the U. S. Court of Appeals recently ruled that FDA acted illegally in banning the hor-mone from cattle feed, Bull said.

Following the recent ruling, some manufacturers have announced they are already marketing DES implants and feed additives.

#### SNOWMOBILE FUN DEPENDS ON INDIVIDUAL DRIVERS

Wintering conditions for big game animals and game birds are good most places around the state. Exceptions include wintering areas northwest of Snowville, Utah; the South Fork of the Boise River north of Fairfield; and the Warm Springs area near Ketchum, where supplemental feeding operations are underway.

In other areas, snow machine enthusiasts sometimes disturb wintering animals by trying to get closer for better pictures. Moving through snow burns energy reserves that elk and deer need for survival. Most drivers do not realize that disturbing the animals forces them closer to exhaustion.

Idaho has laws against such activity. Statute 49-2611 states that is is unlawful for any person to operate a snow machine in a neglegent way so as to harass game animals or birds. Conservation officers regularly patrol problem areas to protect wintering populations.

Cooperation from all snow machine users is essential to solve this problem.

SALMON-STEELHEAD PLANTS More young steelhead and salmon were stocked in Idaho waters in 1973 than in any previous year as a re-sult of efforts of the Idaho Fish and Game Department, the U.S. Fish and

Wildlife Service, and the Idaho Power Company.

A total of just under 13 million steelhead fry, fingerlings and smolts were released, compared to an average of 3.2 million fish the past five years. There were about 4.73 million young spring chinook salmon released, compared to an average of 3.1 million the past five years. All of the plantings should help the future runs of salmon and steel-



#### SNOWMOBILE FUN DEPENDS ON INDIVIDUAL DRIVERS

Wintering conditions for big game animals and game birds are good most places around the state. Exceptions include wintering areas north-west of Snowville, Utah; the South Fork of the Boise River north of Fairfield; and the Warm Springs area near Ketchum, where supplemental feeding operations are underway.

In other areas, snow machine enthusiasts sometimes disturb wintering animals by trying to get closer for better pictures. Moving through snow burns energy reserves that elk and deer need for survival. Most drivers do not realize that disturbing the animals forces them closer to exhaustion.

Idaho has laws against such activity. Statute 49-2611 states that is is unlawful for any person to operate a snow machine in a neglegent way so as to harass game animals or birds. Conservation officers regularly patrol problem areas to protect wintering populations.

Cooperation from all snow mach-ine users is essential to solve this problem.

SALMON-STEELHEAD PLANTS More young steelhead and salmon were stocked in Idaho waters in 1973 than in any previous year as a re-sult of efforts of the Idaho Fish and Game Department, the U.S. Fish and

Wildlife Service, and the Idaho Power Company.

A total of just under 13 million steelhead fry, fingerlings and smolts were released, compared to an aver-age of 3.2 million fish the past five years. There were about 4.73 million young spring chinook salmon released, compared to an average of 3.1 million the past five years. All of the plantings should help

the future runs of salmon and steelhead in Idaho. Last year's salmon harvest was one of the best during the past ten years with an estimated 9,721 chin-

ook salmon being caught. The sal-mon and steelhead regulations are printed separately this year in two folding leaflets, while general fishing seasons and regulations are printed
