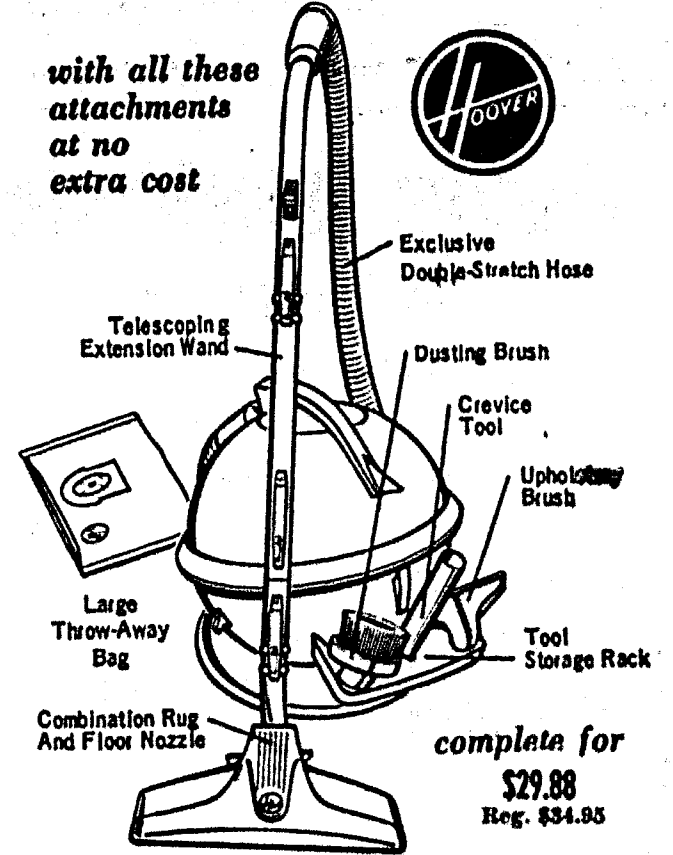
Heimgartner, his wife Pat and their two children, Shelly and Gregory will relocate in the Coeur d'Alene area prior to the completion of the particleboard plant.

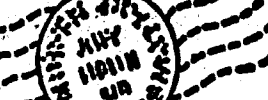

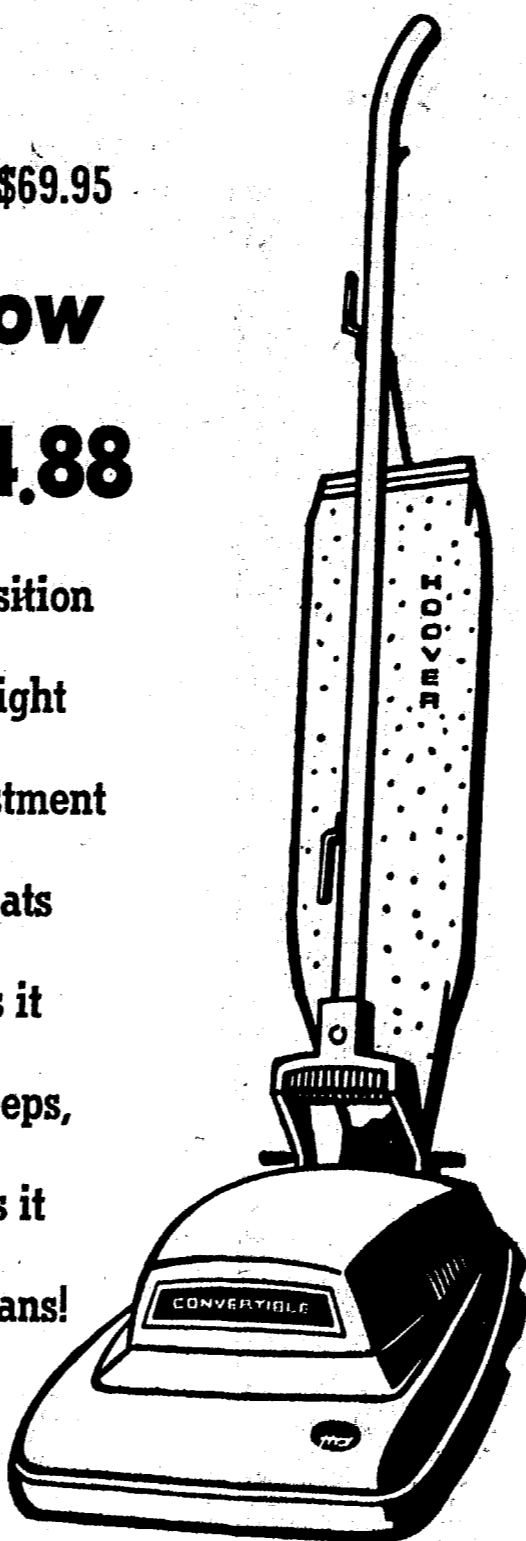
