#### **Extrication Equipment** For J-K Ambulance Unit

The Juliaetta - Kendrick Volunteer Ambulance organization has purchased a set of tools designed to make safe the extrication of accident victims from entrapment.

The extrication equipment is designed to allow the safe removal of persons from wrecked motor vehicles, but it can also be used in other types of rescue operations including extrication from airplanes and building debris.

The extrication equipment was purchased jointly with the Idaho Department of Environmental and Community Services, which covered half the cost.

A training course in the use of the extrication equipment and the safe removal of accident victims from entrapment is also provided by the department's Office of Emergency Health Services.

The extrication equipment is designed to remove the doors and tops of wrecked motor vehicles to allow the removal of injured passengers without compounding their injuries.

It also is virtually spark-proof,
which adds a significant measure of safety to an operation that frequently must be carried out amid aboline vapors .


