ORDINANCE NO. 178

AN ORDINANCE TERMED "ANNUAL APPROPRIATION BILL" APPROPRIATING MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF DEFRAYING ALL NECESSARY EXPENSES AND LIABILITIES OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, LATAH COUNTY, STATE OF IDAHO, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING ON THE FIRST DAY OF JANUARY, 1974, AND ENDING ON THE THIRTY-FIRST DAY OF DECEMBER, 1974, AND CREATING AND ALLOTING SAID APPROPRIATION TO CERTAIN FUNDS OUT OF WHICH SUCH EXPENSES SHALL BE PAID.

OR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO:

SECTION 1. There is hereby appropriated out of any monies in the treasury of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, not otherwise appropriated and out of any revenue which the City of Juliaetta may acquire between the first day of January, 1974, and the thirty-first day of December, 1974, the sum of \$189,360.00 for the purpose of defraying all necessary expenses and liabilities of such corporation for the fiscal year beginning on the first day of January, 1974, and ending on the thirty-first day of December, 1974.

SECTION 2. There are hereby created the following funds:

A. General FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$57,400.00 out of the above appropriation for the general expenses of said City.  
B. WATER FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$14,000.00 out of the above appropriation for the expenses, maintenance and improvement of the water system of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho.

C. FIRE DEPARTMENT FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$2,540.00 out of the above appropriation for the fire department purposes.

D. WATER REVENUE BOND REDEMPTION FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$420.00 out of the above appropriation for the bond interest and redemption of bond numbered 13.

E. FEDERAL REVENUE SHARING FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$10,000.00 out of the above appropriation for general expenses of said City in accordance with the laws and procedures for the spending of such funds.  
F. FEDERAL GRANT FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$108,000.00 out of the above appropriation for the drilling of a water well, pump, casing and pipe from well to reservoir.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and the first publication thereof.

**NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC**

Notice is hereby given this 4 day of March, 1974, pursuant to the Idaho Noxious Weed Law Section 22-2444, Idaho Code, to every person who owns or controls land in LATAH County, Idaho, that noxious weeds standing, being, or growing on such land shall be destroyed or eradicated by effective cutting, tillage, cropping, pasturing or treating with chemicals or other effective methods or combination thereof, approved by the County Weed Superintendent, as often as may be required to prevent the weed from blooming and maturing seeds, or spreading by root, root stalks or other means.

Upon failure to observe this notice the county weed control superintendent is required to proceed pursuant to the law and have weeds destroyed by such method as he finds necessary, the expenses of which shall constitute a lien and be entered as a tax against the land, and be collected as other real estate taxes are collected or by other means as provided by law.

**DID YOU KNOW...**

\*\*\*The kindergarten bill is still pending in the House Revenue and Taxation committee. Objections have been raised concerning Option Four of the bill, which relates to enrichment programs for grades one and two in communities where regular kindergarten classes are impractical. \*\*\*Reapportionment is over—for the time being, as the Senate rushed through House Bill 538 as amended. This bill was drafted by the special Legislative Reapportionment Committee and was felt to be a "healthy compromise" by a number of legislators. It reached the Governor's office, and was signed before the court imposed deadline of March 7th. The next move is up to the court.

\*\*\*House Joint Memorial 22 is arousing considerable attention from citizens across the state. The bill recommends that the Forest Service review the Salmon River breaks and Idaho Primitive Areas to see if land coming within those perimeters actually meets Wilderness criteria or if some of the land could be reclassified for other purposes. If passed by the House it could reach the Senate third reading calendar by Mar. 14th.

\*\*\*Marijuana Legislation is news again this year, with two Senate bills directed to possession and punishment. Senate Bill 1319 was voted "held in committee" requiring a 2/3 vote before any further consideration can be attempted this session. The second bill, S1445, was voted out of committee for amendment. This bill would make possession of three ounces or more of marijuana a felony on first offense conviction. It was noted by several people testifying before the Senate Judiciary and Rules committee that the offbeat measurement of three ounces would strike hard at street pushers in Idaho. However, others testified that 8 ounces would be a more realistic amount, as the lower figure would punish more users than pushers.

\*\*\*House Bill 448, which would set limits of 15 years served before parole consideration for prison inmates or 1/3 of a sentence, whichever is less, was voted "held in committee" after Warden May and the entire Parole Board voiced their opposition. They felt such legislation would be a "backwards step" seriously crippling the effectiveness of individual parole consideration and determination.

\*\*\*House Bill 597, the public school appropriation bill, was considered during a special evening session by the House March 11th. If everything goes right, it will face Senate action about March 15th.

\*\*\*The public hearing to consider license standards for day care homes and centers was cancelled as House Health & Welfare committee members tabled the bill. This action virtually eliminates any chance of the measure reaching the House floor this session.

\*\*\*Legislative sessions are now running Saturdays and some evenings. The Legislative Public Information Center, located on the third floor of the Capitol is open for business when ever the Legislature is in session

\*\*\*The comprehensive Idaho Building Code Act of 1974 has passed the Senate and should reach action in the House by March 14th. This bill has graduated restrictions for construction depending upon city, urban or rural location, but makes inspections necessary regardless of location. Illustrations were given of a rural home near Boise that blew apart during a sudden windstorm. Insulation from the home was displayed and a report read outlining its poor quality of construction. Had mandatory inspections been in force, one Senator noted, this home might have been saved.

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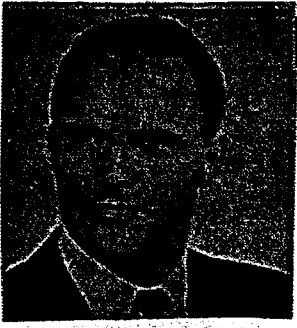
### IT HAPPENED WAY BACK WHEN

#### HYPERTENSION

An estimated 23 million Americans have hypertension, but only half of this number are aware of their condition.

In 90 percent of the cases, the cause is unknown, reports the Idaho Medical Association.

Essential hypertension occurs more commonly in people with a family history of high blood pressure. Although its cause is unknown, it is known to be aggravated by certain environmental factors. Among these are emotional stress, especially feelings of anger and frustration, large amounts of salt in the diet, cigarette smoking and overweight.

Once considered a relatively benign disorder, even mild hypertension is now recognized as a disease that can be fatal. In untreated hypertension, the time from onset to death is about 20 years. Except for an elevated blood pressure reading, no warning signs are likely to appear for the first two thirds of this time after which failure of one or more vital organs occurs. Once organ failure begins, the average survival of the untreated patient is about six years.

Hypertension and hypertensive heart disease cause about 60,000 deaths annually and contribute to strokes, heart attacks and kidney failure.

How can you tell if you are hypertensive? Unless you see a physician, the chances are that you can't. As a rule, hypertension is detected during the routine physical examination of an apparently healthy person.


