Curt Hermaann Listed In High School "Who's Who"

Curtis Wade Hermaann, a senior at Genesee high school, was recently notified that he is to be featured in the Eighth Annual Edition of "Who's Who Among American High School Students, 1973-74," the largest student award publication in the nation.

Students from over 20,000 public, private and parochial high schools throughout the country are recognized for their leadership in academics, athletics, activities or community service in the book. Less than 3 percent of the junior and senior class students nationwide are awarded this recognition.

Curtis is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Hermaann of Genesee, Idaho. He is active in football, basketball, youth legislature and Yearbook staff, Frey All-American Football and has also received an appointment to the U. S. Naval Academy; winner in Elks Most Valuable Student contest; football captain, and salutatorian. In addition to having his biography published in the book, Curtis will also compete for one of ten scholarship awards of \$500 to \$1,000 funded by

the publishers and will be invited to participate in the firm's annual "Survey of High Achievers" later in the academic year.

Curtis plans to attend the United States Air Force or United States Naval Academy.

Gourmet dining? No, but it kept them alive.

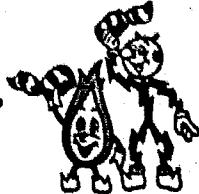
Nobody wasted a bite and the family was thankful for mother's providence.

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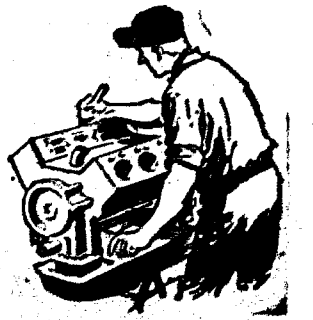

WHEREAS, increasingly heavy traffic on our streets and highways makes it imperative that continued emphasis must be placed on safe driving; and
