

District 283 Trustees Adopt Increased Salary Schedules for Teachers and Staff

Trustees of Joint School District No. 283 met in special session Wednesday evening, April 24 and adopted a salary schedule based on \$7,150 per year for instructors with a B. A. or B. S. degree and no experience. This is an increase over the 1973-74 schedule of \$650,000.

The following bases for additional training are as follows: B. A. plus 15 semester hours, \$7,350; B. A. plus 30 semester hours, \$7,550; M. A. degree, \$7,850 and M. A. plus 15 semester hours, \$8,050. All of these figures represent a \$650.00 increase over last year plus increments for years of experience up to 15 years.

In further action the trustees approved an 8 percent increase for all non-contractual employees plus \$15 medical insurance for all daily, fully employed employees.

All raises depend upon the passage of a maintenance and operation levy of 31 mills on May 21st. Last year's M&O levy was 33 mills. This provides some relief for the taxpayer. By law a district can levy 27 mills without an election.

Establishing a plant facility levy for the purchase of buses is an absolute necessity, because of the age of some of the district buses. One bus presently has 95,640 miles on the speedometer, another 88,500 and the next oldest, 53,650 miles. Most districts sell their used buses when

they have travelled 68,000 miles. According to Supt. Blakeley, two of these buses should be retired, if our students are to ride over these slippery, icy grades. "The safety of the child must come first", according to the State Transportation laws.

Our trustees realize the condition of our buses and know it is a necessity and purchase a new bus every other year. Consequently, they are asking for a 3-mill plant facility levy for 5 years to buy buses. This election will also be held May 21.

It is not known whether the teachers will accept the adopted salary schedule advocated by the trustees. The raises proposed by the board members are necessary to meet the spiraling costs and inflation. Actually the district is lagging behind all other Latah County districts when it comes to salaries, and when all negotiations are over and various schedules adopted, Kendrick will still be behind its neighboring schools in all probability, in the opinion of Supt. Blakeley.

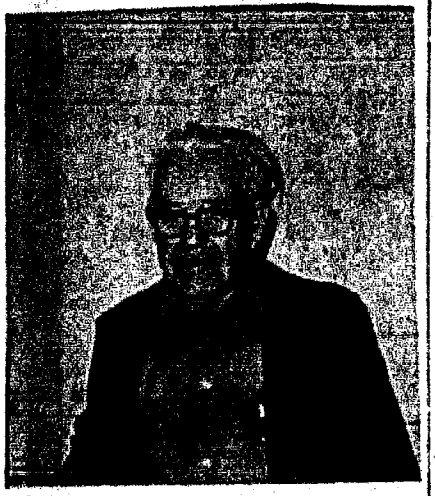
The balanced budget for 1974-75 is compared below with last year's. This is the state approved short form and must be labeled a preliminary budget at this time. The trustees will examine the complete long form at the next regular trustee meeting on May 9th and make input and adjustments, if necessary. This budget can not be legally adopted until a budget hearing is scheduled and held. All revenue is predicated on the passage of a 31 mill M&O levy.

Immunizations Will Be Offered at Health Fair

One of the services to be offered at the Kendrick-Juliaetta Health Fair on June 4-5, will be immunizations.

Several diseases can be prevented if you are immunized against them. These diseases include tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis (whooping cough), polio, measles, rubella (3 day or German measles) and mumps.

Adequate immunization for children under 6 years of age is a series of 3 DPT's (diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus) and one booster DPT; a series of 2 or 3 polio with one booster polio. Children should also have immunization of measles and rubella. These vaccines are supposed to provide life-time immunity, so only one is necessary. Before a child enters first grade, he or she should have a booster for DPT and polio in addition to the ones received as an infant. A booster dose of tetanus and diphtheria should be given every 10 years to school-age persons and adults.

Tuberculin skin testing will be available at the Health Fair. This skin testing should be done before a child enters school and then only as recommended for each individual's particular needs.

If you plan to have immunizations at the Health Fair bring any available records of immunizations you may have received. Children will be given immunizations only when accompanied by a parent. Your health fair will provide many health services, read this paper next week for further information.

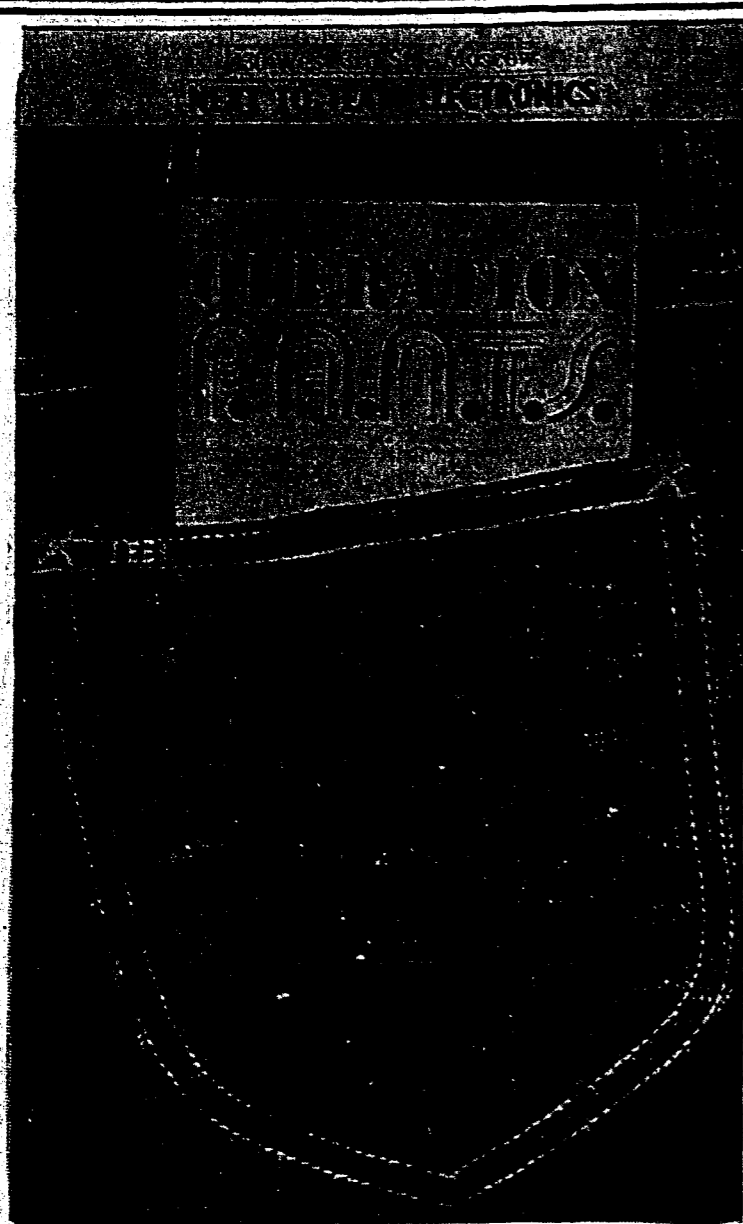
Juliaetta Church Ladies Sale Is Saturday, May 11

TV Viewers Can Save Energy

Television viewers "tuned into" the facts can turn their sets into energy savers.

Amount of energy a television set consumes depends on type and use, according to Ruth Spidahl, state home economics leader, U. of I. cooperative extension service.

"A tube-operated, black and white set expends more electricity than a solid state model," says Ms. Spidahl. "A color set uses even more," she points out.

Despite higher initial costs, solid state sets save energy and money in the long run.

"Choosing a black and white set instead of color also saves money—and energy. However, advantages of watching programs in color often outweigh these savings," Ms. Spidahl suggests.

A model with an "instant-on" feature draws power constantly. However, even though it uses more energy the feature prolongs set life.

To save energy with "instant-on" sets, Ms. Spidahl advises owners to unplug these sets only when they won't be used for several days—such as when the family goes on vacation or weekend trips.

Another waste involves unwatched television sets.

She says, "Turning any set off saves energy, but only if it's left off awhile. So, don't turn the TV off for only 30 minutes or so."

"Frequently turning a TV set off and on is hard on it—especially a tube-operated model. Constant warming and cooling weakens its tubes."

"And, electricity saved from such actions is minimal—only a few cents a month."

According to Ms. Spidahl, the best way to conserve energy is to limit TV use.

"By leaving the set off a little more each day, people get an added bonus—time to do things that were often postponed."

Habit is like a soft bed—easy to get into, hard to get out of.

The day-long program included a business meeting and luncheon.

All are of Genesee except Mrs. Arnzen, who is from Greencreek.

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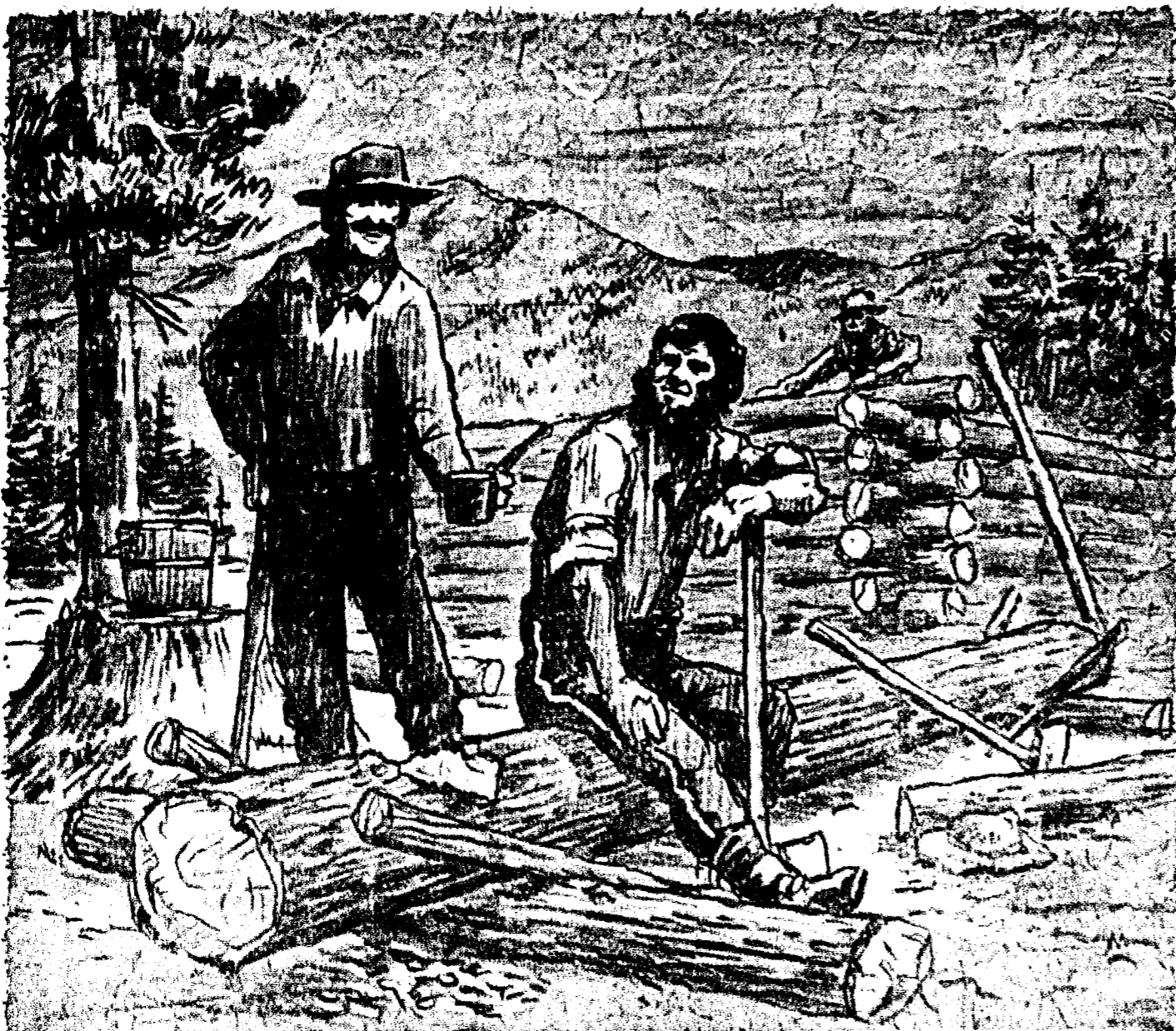
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Good Neighbors

The main stream of Inland Empire settlers began to pour in just after the war between the states. They were people of every kind and from every place. Some even still wore their striped breeches, both blue and gray.

It wasn't considered proper or tactful to question a man's background or beliefs. The main thing was, how would he be for a neighbor.

Folks were spread out pretty thin and your well-being or even life could depend on the

nearest person's ability and willingness to lend a hand. A tradition of hospitality and good neighborliness built up and became a regional characteristic we still enjoy today.

Good thing, too. At The Washington Water Power Company we have been warning of possible energy shortages and the need for everyone to share. This should come easy for folks who really know what neighborliness is.

The proposed 1974-75 budget was adopted by the Genesee School Board at a special meeting Monday, April 29th.

The proposal budget calls for an additional 3 mills over last year's budget. With the increased cost to the district it was felt necessary by the board that this 3 mills was needed to do the repair and maintenance needed on the building for the coming year. The board wants everyone to understand that the 3 extra mills will be used only for the purpose of doing the necessary maintenance work on the buildings. Included in this maintenance will be roof repair, window replacement, heating repair, electrical rewiring of some rooms as required by OSHA.

The board also received a petition to place before the voters of the district a levy of 1 mill for the kindergarten program. This will be done on a separate ballot, so that the patrons of the district may decide the issue.

The election for the special M&O levy will be at the same time as the Trustee Election, May 21st.

The proposed budget and notice will be placed in the paper May 9th.

ASTHMA

Asthma is a chronic illness in which the victim has difficulty in breathing. It is not contagious and, fortunately most attacks are relatively mild.

If neglected, it increases in severity and endangers health as time goes on according to the Idaho Medical Association.

Most asthma attacks are triggered by an allergen. Foods, furs, feathers, or pollens can start a flare up. Sometimes a bacterial infection of the throat, nose or sinuses can touch off an asthma attack. Nervous tension sometimes is a factor.

In a severe attack, the victim appears to be suffocating. He becomes pale, turns bluish and perspires heavily. He is using all his strength to breathe. Fortunately, attacks can be relieved by medical treatment.

Finding the allergen is the first step in dealing with chronic asthma. Usually, a series of tests is required. If the allergen is something which can be avoided, such as a

dog or cat, the problem can be solved with relative simplicity. If it should be pollen in the air or dust particles, the case is more difficult.

Occasionally, an asthma patient will be helped by a change of climate, but physicians advise that you proceed with caution in making a cross-country move. An allergy to things in the new climate may develop. If a move is planned, it should be preceded by an extended visit.

Asthma can be controlled in most cases. In almost all cases, a physician can provide relief from asthmatic attacks, and by careful management reduce the frequency and severity of attacks.

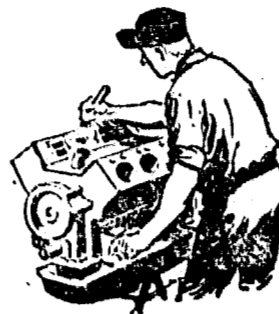

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE CONSTRUCTION, ACQUISITION, AND INSTALLATION OF A SEWAGE COLLECTION AND TREATMENT SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO AND THE SUBSEQUENT OWNERSHIP, OPERATION, MAINTENANCE AND CONTROL BY SAID CITY AT THE ESTIMATED COST OF NOT MORE THAN \$510,000.00; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF PART OF THE COST OF SAID CONSTRUCTION, ACQUISITION, AND INSTALLATION BY THE ISSUANCE OF MUNICIPAL REVENUE BONDS OF NOT MORE THAN \$315,000.00, WHICH SAID BONDS SHALL BE PAID ONLY OUT OF THE REVENUES AND EARNINGS OF SAID WATER-SEWER SYSTEM OF SAID CITY, SUBJECT, HOWEVER, TO THE APPROVAL BY THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID CITY OF JULIAETTA AT A SPECIAL ELECTION ORDERED HEREIN; DESCRIBING SAID BONDS; SETTING FORTH CERTAIN COVENANTS; CALLING A SPECIAL ELECTION FOR THE SUBMISSION OF THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID CITY AND QUESTION OF THE RATIFICATION OR REJECTION OF SAID BOND ISSUE AND OF SAID INDEBTEDNESS OR LIABILITY; PROVIDING FOR THE NOTICE OF SUCH ELECTION AND THE PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO:

Section 1: That the City Council of the City of Juliaetta, Latah County, Idaho, deems it advisable to provide a sewage collection system for the residents of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, and therefore to provide for the construction, acquisition, and installation of a City sewage collection and treatment system, and to pay part of the cost of said water improvements and sewer system to issue municipal revenue coupon bonds in the sum of \$315,000.00 of which the amount of \$195,000.00 of municipal revenue coupon bonds was authorized by Ordinance No. 168 and assented to by the qualified electors of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, at an election held on the 7th day of November, 1972, and to issue additional municipal revenue coupon bonds in the sum of \$120,000.00.

Section 2: That the following improvements be made:

Installation of the following sewer lines:

There will be a 10 inch interceptor sewer pipe laid in the following locations:

The sewerage treatment plant in the SE 1/4, Section 9, Township 37N, Range 3 WBM and from the sewerage treatment plant North along State Highway No. 3, 4,000 feet to a point; thence perpendicular across State Highway No. 3 to the right-of-way of the Burlington Northern Railroad; thence parallel to the railroad approximately 4,200 feet, NE across an open field to a point on State Highway No. 3 which is 150 feet South of Potlatch Creek Bridge. The line continues along State Highway No. 3 (Main Street) SW 350 feet.

There will be an 8-inch lateral sewer pipe laid in the following locations:

On Main Street from the interceptor sewer to 4th Street, also on Main Street from mid-block between 3rd and 4th Streets to 250 feet South of A Street.

On the alley of Block 10 NE to 5th Street and on 5th Street from alley to Main Street.

On the alley of Block 2 SW to 3rd Street and on 3rd Street from the alley on Main Street.

On the alley of Block 3 SW to 2nd Street and on 2nd Street from the alley to Main Street.

On the alley mid-way between A and 2nd Streets to Main Street.

On Water Street from 5th Street to 3rd Street, also from mid-block between 3rd and 2nd Streets to 2nd Street.

On 5th Street from the alley between Main and Water Streets to Water Street.

On the alley of Block 11 SW to 4th Street and on 4th Street from the alley to Water Street.

On 3rd Street from the alley between Main and Water Streets to the interceptor sewer along the railroad.

On 2nd Street from the alley between Main and Water Streets to the interceptor sewer along the railroad.

On a SW diagonal from SE of the intersection of 2nd and Water Streets to NE of the intersection of A and Main Streets.

On A Street from Main Street to the end of A Street.

Main Street SW 1,100 feet from A Street.

From State Highway No. 3 across Block J to State Street.

On State Street from the North end of State Street to mid-block between 4th and 5th Streets, also on State Street from 4th Street to 200 feet SW of A Street.

On 4th Street from the alley between Hallett and State Streets to State Street.

On 3rd Street from the alley between Ward and Hallett Streets to State Street.

From NW of the alley of Block 25 SE to the SW edge of the intersection of 2nd and Ward Streets, also across 2nd Street to the NE corner of the intersection, also on 2nd Street SE to State Street.

On Ward Street to 3rd Street and NW on 3rd Street 250 feet.

On 4th Street from Crawford to McCall Street.

On McCall Street from 3rd Street to 150 feet NE of 4th Street, also from this point SE across Blocks 28 and 20 to the intersection of Hallett and 5th Streets, also on 5th Street from Hallett to State Street.

On Ward Street from mid-block between 3rd and 4th Streets 500 feet to the sewer line across Blocks 28 and 20.

On Hallett Street from 4th Street to

5th Street.

The construction of a sewage treatment facility on approximately 1 acre located in the SE 1/4, Section 9, Township 37N, Range 3 WBM.

The construction of the foregoing is in accordance with the maps, plans and specifications as prepared by Hoffman, Ficke & Wyatt, Consulting Engineers of Lewiston, Idaho, for the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, for the carrying out of the plans of construction, complete details for which said project are fully set forth and specified in the above maps, plans and specifications, which said maps, plans and specifications have been filed and are now on file in the office of the City Clerk of Juliaetta, Idaho, which said maps, plans, and specifications are hereby expressly adopted and approved.

Section 3: The total cost of doing all the foregoing, together with all necessary costs and engineering expenses, legal costs, labor costs and incidental costs, as estimated by the City Council and will be not more than \$510,000.00, which will be paid in part by bond issues in the amount of not more than \$315,000.00 of which \$195,000.00 was authorized by Ordinance No. 168 and assented to by the qualified electors of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, at an election held on the 7th day of November, 1972, and by the authorization of an additional bond issue in the amount of not more than \$120,000.00, and the balance from other legally available funds. The foregoing estimated costs also included inspections and fiscal expenses and interest which will accrue during the construction period and for six months thereafter on money borrowed.

Section 4: That a special election of the qualified electors of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho shall be, and is hereby ordered to be held in said City on Tuesday, the 14th day of May, 1974 between the hours of 12 o'clock noon and 8 o'clock p. m., Pacific Daylight Time on said day, at which election the question of the afore mentioned plan of construction, described in this ordinance and the payment of a part of the cost of the same by the issuance of water-sewer revenue bonds in the amount of not more than \$120,000.00, said \$120,000.00 to be in addition to those water-sewer revenue bonds authorized by Ordinance No. 168 and approved by the qualified electors on November 7, 1972, and payable from the revenues of the water-sewer system, shall be submitted to the qualified, registered voters of this City, and to their assent or rejection as provided by law. The voting place of said election shall be at the City Hall in the City of Juliaetta, Idaho.

Such voting place, and the ballot box or boxes therein, for said special election will be opened at the hour of 12 o'clock noon and will continue open until and will be closed at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m., Pacific Daylight Time, on said date. The voting at said election shall be by ballot, and the proposition which shall be submitted thereon shall be in substantially the following alternative form, viz: "In favor of issuing Water-Sewer Revenue Bonds for the purpose provided by Ordinance No. 179."

"Against the issuance of Water-Sewer Revenue Bonds for the purposes provided by Ordinance No. 179."

If at such election, a majority of the electors, qualified and entitled to vote at said election and voting at said election, assent to the plan of construction and the payment thereof out of and from the earnings and revenues of said water-system of said City, such bonds for said purpose shall be issued as provided by the Revenue Bond Act of the State of Idaho.

Section 5: Notice of said election shall be published in the Kendrick Gazette, a legal newspaper printed and published on Thursdays at Kendrick, Idaho, and being the official newspaper of said City of Juliaetta, Idaho; that said publication shall be had once a week for two successive weeks prior to such election and said publications to be had on the 2nd day of May, 1974, and the 8th day of May, 1974, prior to the date fixed for said election, which said notice of election shall set forth the purpose of this Ordinance, the amount of bonds authorized by it, the maturity dates of said bonds, the maximum interest rate which said bonds shall bear, the voting place or places, the hours between which the polls shall be open, the qualification of the voters who may vote thereat, and shall refer to this Ordinance for further details and particulars; and shall be given in the name of the City of Juliaetta, Latah County, Idaho by its Mayor and attested by its Clerk.

Section 6: The City Clerk, the registrar for the City elections, shall register the qualified electors for said election, commencing with the date that the notice of election is given and first published and thereafter as provided by law, at any time during office hours, and at any other times, all as provided by statute, and shall cause notice of registration to be given as required by law.

Section 7: Said Water-Sewer Revenue Bond Issue authorized by this Ordinance of not in excess of \$120,000.00 shall consist of not more than One Hundred Twenty (120) coupon bonds of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered from one hundred ninety-six (196) upward, consecutively, shall be the ultimate maturity of said bonds; the annual amortized principal maturities thereof, and the bond principal amounts which will be paid annually, shall be amortized and payable in accordance with the provisions of the Revenue Bond Act of the State of Idaho, whereby the first annual amortized bond principal payment thereof shall mature and be payable on the first annual installment date after date of issue, the annual installment date being January 1, and the various subsequent annual maturities shall, as nearly as practicable, be in such principal amounts as will, together with accruing interest on all outstanding bonds as such issue, be met and paid by approximate equal annual installments of combined principal and interest thereon during the thirty(30) year term

for which said bonds shall be issued, which said bonds shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding eight (8) per cent per annum, which interest shall be payable annually on January 1, evidenced by interest coupons which shall be attached to each of said bonds, and said bonds and interest coupons shall be payable at the place or places, permitted by law and designated by this City Council prior to the issuance of said bonds.

The principal and interest of said bonds being payable solely out of and from the revenues of said water-sewer system, or out of a special fund or funds, as provided for by this Ordinance, or the Ordinance issuing the Bonds.

Said bonds and interest coupons, if authorized at said special election, shall be issued against said revenues and said special fund, or funds, to be created by subsequent ordinance and shall be a valid claim of the holder thereof only as against said revenues and said special fund or funds (after first deducting the costs of operation and maintenance of said water-sewer system) and the money required to be paid therein, shall not constitute an indebtedness of the City of Juliaetta within the meaning of the constitution and laws of the State of Idaho.

Section 8: The earnings and revenues out of and from said water-sewer system shall be paid into a special fund, or funds, (hereinafter created by subsequent ordinance) until full payment of all said bonds, both principal and interest, after deducting the costs of operation and maintenance of said water-sewer system.

Section 9: In the event the bonds referred to herein are legally authorized to be issued, it is further covenanted and ordained as follows: That the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, shall not sell, lease or in any manner dispose of said water-sewer system, or any substantial part of unit thereof, until the bonds with interest thereon shall be paid in full; that said City (until all of said water-sewer revenue bonds and the interest thereon shall have been fully paid) shall not reduce the rates required by it for water and sewer service to consumers, so that the gross revenues of said water-sewer system shall be insufficient to pay for the retirement of the principal and interest of said bonds; that if at any time the gross revenues of said water-sewer system, or as hereafter bettered, extended or improved, shall not be sufficient to pay the costs of operation and maintenance, and the charge thereon created in favor of the bonds referred to in this Ordinance and Ordinance No. 168, the City shall increase its said rates to such rates and amounts as will be sufficient to provide for the payment of all such costs of operation and maintenance of said water-sewer system, and of the water-sewer revenue bonds, referred to herein and interest thereon and other incidental costs and expenses permitted by statute; that, in order to preserve the priority of said special fund, or funds, the said City shall not create, or permit to be created, so long as any of said bonds shall be outstanding and unpaid, any indebtedness or charge whatsoever which shall be a charge against the revenues of said water-sewer system superior to the charges required for the retirement of these bonds referred to in this Ordinance and Ordinance No. 168 and interest; and that any future charge which may be created by said City or authorized by the qualified electors and made payable out of the revenues of said water-sewer system, shall constitute a charge and lien subject to the charge and lien thereon and to the duty of the City of Juliaetta with respect to said revenues.

Section 10: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage, approval and publication in one issue of the Kendrick Gazette, a newspaper printed and published in the City of Kendrick, Idaho, and of general circulation within the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, and being the official newspaper of said City.

Unless such nominee shall not less than twelve (12) days prior to the day of election, decline to nomination in writing filed with the Clerk of the Board of Trustees, his name shall appear upon the ballot.

That the election at said meeting will be by secret and separate ballot. Eligible voters must be citizens of the U. S. of voting age (eighteen years old) and have resided in the State of Idaho for the last six months and in the Trustee Zone for more than the last thirty days.
