County Job Picture

23 Latah Co workers were given assistance in locating work during the past week through the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment. This is a slight increase over the 20 persons placed during the previous week; and up quite a bit from the 9 so helped last year at this time. At the end of the week there were over 39 jobs open. With the onset of spring, job opportunities should continue to improve during the next few weeks.

The number of people continuing to seek unemployment insurance remained fairly steady with a decrease of less than 20—most of the logging and construction industry. There are currently 182 persons seeking jobless pay from the Moscow area, down from last week's 188, but considerably higher than last year's 138. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area, the current total is close to Moscow's with 164 drawing unemployment insurance benefits down from last week's 167, but again like the Moscow area up from last year's 126. The Kendrick area remained stable with 12 this week, 10 last week and 10 last year. At Potlatch the totals are 73, down from last week's 84; but still higher than last year's 61. In Genesee the figures are 9 this week and 6 last year. Unemployment should continue to slack off as the weather improves and the loggers can get back into the woods.

Sewing With Naturals

One of spring's trends is the natural look—natural fibers, natural textures, and the classic colors of white, ivory and natural.

Special care needs to be taken in sewing whites and naturals, Janice Buckner, textiles and clothing specialist, U. of I. cooperative extension service, advises.

Take the following tips from the professionals.

Have everything spotlessly clean. Cover your cutting surface with a clean sheet. Have extra sheets handy to cover your work area when you leave it and to cover the floor when you try on your garment. When you've finished your garment, baste a strip of the white around the cuffs and hem if you don't intend to wear it for awhile. This helps keep it clean while it hangs in the closet.

Dust your sewing machine. Do not oil it while sewing your light garment. Wash your hands often. Do not wear make-up. You might touch your face and get make-up on

your hands. Check to see that your tools and the bottom of your iron are clean. Put a fresh cover on your ironing board. As pins may leave little black marks, pin only in the seam allowance area. Do not mark style lines or dart lines with pins, and never use tracing paper. Use tailor tacks or trace lines with thread. Use only white thread as pastel threads can leave tracks. Be sure your needle is fine and clean. It can easily pick up oil from your hands, and then, dirt. These precautions should help you have a clean garment when you are finished.

LETTERS FROM READERS

To the Editor: The teachers of District 283 have been engaged in negotiations with the Board of Trustees concerning salaries. Last year's base pay was \$6,500. Because of the recent state legislation allowing for additional funding for professional salaries in public education, the Kendrick-Juliaetta teachers have requested an \$800 raise giving a base of \$7,300. This would be a 12% increase over last year while the NEA reports a 21.1% increase in the cost of food alone by October 1973. The Kendrick-Juliaetta teachers feel this is a most necessary and reasonable request. It is interesting to note that last year's salary schedule was low enough that District 283 teachers who are sole-supporters of their family and have two or more children, are eligible for food stamps. The teachers feel this a deplorable situation for an employed professional to be involved and they wish to see it remedied.

The Board of Trustees presently has offered a \$7,150 base for next year. The Kendrick-Juliaetta teachers agree that this would not be an acceptable base and have decided they will continue seeking a \$7,300 base. The state legislature, when voting in the additional funding this spring, suggested a \$1,000 increase for all Idaho teachers. The Kendrick-Juliaetta teachers are asking \$200 less than this suggested amount.

The teachers requested a joint meeting with the Board of Trustees, where all teachers could be present. The idea behind this meeting was to allow the Board members an opportunity to view the number of teachers who wished to stand by the \$7,300 request, and also allow the members an opportunity to ask any questions they might have. The teachers were denied this meeting and were told that the Board would meet only with the negotiating team. This denial was a standing one, covering the time period of May 6, 1974 through May 9, 1974. May 9, 1974 is the next open Board meeting and the teachers had hoped for a meeting with the Board previous to this time.

As of the afternoon of May 6, the negotiating team will be meeting with Superintendent Don Blakely to review thoroughly the detailed budget. The teachers are awaiting the outcome of this meeting to decide what the next step will be in their negotiations.
