Some signs and symptoms that might be observed in persons with hearing impairment include: failure carrying out the president's choice of to hear normal conversation, turning flowers, and were made by Mrs. Ericthe head to hear, talking in a monotone (either loudly or very quietly), inattention, anxious facial expression, or excessively noisy. Children with a hearig problem may exhibit speecl

delay or impairment of speech.

Hearing conservation is important for each of us. Conservation methods include: 1. immunization of children against contagious diseases which may endanger hearing (measles, treated to ice cream cones prior to mumps, and rubella), 2. avoidance of swimming by children with perforations of the ear drum and by all children during colds, 3. appropriate treatments of colds, 4. prompt and adequate treatment of middle ear infections. One additional measure which may be of value in preventing hearing losses is the removal of ear wax. This can be done easily by the physician or under his or her guidance. Q-tips, bobbie pins and the like are potentially dangerous and should not be used in the ear.


