

School levy vote Set for Tuesday

Joint School District No. 283 trustees met in a regular meeting Thursday, May 9 and negotiated with the teachers for a \$7,225 base salary for a degree with no experience and established raises for all non-contractual employees.

Superintendent Don Blakeley had high praise for the board of Trustees for the manner they distributed raises to all teachers and non-contractual people, so as to help meet the high cost of living. He said the trustees did absolutely all they could do in an all-out effort to retain the teaching staff and supporting employees. Raises for all employees totaled approximately 9 percent.

Joint school district 283 teachers accepted a \$7,225.00 base pay in a special meeting Monday, May 14 and thus became one of the first districts in the area to reach an agreement on salaries. Indications now are that practically all teachers and employees will return for 1974—except Supt. Blakeley who resigned last December for retirement purposes.

Grange Members Hear Forester Speak

Kendrick Grange No. 413, met at the Grange Hall, Tuesday, May 7, at 8 p.m. There were 19 members and one guest.

Franklin Schoeffler, Woodland State Forester and a member of Moscow Grange, was speaker for the Conservation program arranged by Grange Master Manning Onstott.

Mr. Schoeffler gave a most interesting and informative talk on the tussock moth and the damage being done in Idaho and the problem caused concerning this by banning use of DDT.

He stated the tussock moth attacks the Douglas fir and white fir. The moths lay from 130 to 200 eggs each, which winter on the underside of the branches in a web. The wind carries the web and eggs thus spreading infection to other areas. When eggs hatch the larvae can completely defoliate a tree. Trees in Benewah County are badly infected. He said DDT is the only real control for this and 104,000 acres need to be sprayed in north Idaho.

Any appearance of the tussock moth should be reported at once. Spraying will be done by helicopter. He said livestock should be moved from the area being sprayed and that spraying will not be done within two hundred feet of waterways.

Plans for a float for the Locust Blossom Festival were discussed. Also plans for the pie house. Chairman of Women's Activities, Mabel Glenn, reported it was decided to have four kinds of pie this year—apple, cherry, lemon and chocolate. Each Grange lady is asked to bring 3 or 4 pies.

Mr. Glenn presented gifts to the winners of the local serving contest. She also reported on the serving contests and dinners served recently by the Grange. A report on progress of the quilt was made.

The Grange voted to help serve coffee and doughnuts to the workers on the united effort of organization in the area for clean-up day in the anti-litter campaign held Saturday, May 11.

The next meeting of the Kendrick Grange will be held Tuesday, May 21, at 8 p.m. The program will be "Nursing Services Offered by Public Health Department" by Mrs. Ruby Hawkins.

Fire Season Began Friday, May 10

The closed fire season on all areas in the State of Idaho outside of the cities began Friday, May 10, 1974. State Land Commissioner, Gordon C. Trombley, states that after this date it is unlawful to burn on forest or range lands without a burning permit in possession.

Burning permits when conditions are safe, can be obtained from the offices of the Department of Public Lands, United States Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, and Clearwater-Potlatch Timber Protective Association. Advice on burning problems is also available at the same offices.

Dick Benjamin, forest warden for Kendrick forest protective district urges all citizens who will be debris burning to take all necessary precautions, including provisions for minimizing air pollution. If a fire escapes control, the person setting the fire will be liable for both suppression costs and trespass damages.

Benjamin reminds everyone to be careful with their campfires, matches and cigarettes.

Kathleen Goes for the Record

Cindy Taylor, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Taylor of Juliaetta, competed in the Idaho Girls' Track and Field Championships at Boise May 11, in the discus competition. Cindy, the gold medalist in the shot put last year, took the silver this year with a throw of 102., setting a new Kendrick High School record in the event. The first place throw was 102', 2".

1974 has been a good year for the discus at Kendrick. At the beginning of the season, the school record stood at 93', 1 1/2", a record set by Miss Taylor at Lewiston last year. Kendrick is, however, tied with having two extraordinary discus throwers in the persons of Miss Taylor and Kathleen Parker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Parker of Juliaetta.

In the first meet this year, Miss Parker shattered the existing record with a toss of 97 feet. At the First Annual Kendrick Field Meet, she continued her drive, throwing for an other record of 100', 2".

State rules require that only the top finisher in each event can win a berth in the annual state track and field meet. In fierce competition on May 3, Cindy Taylor recaptured the discus record with a throw of 100', 4", beating Miss Parker by a mere two inches.

Plans are now being made to make possible to send the top two finishers from this area, instead of only one.

With two discus throwers such as Kathleen and Cindy, Kendrick will always be remembered as a power in that event.

Sewer Bond Passes

Despite rainy weather, Juliaetta voters turned out in good numbers Tuesday and overwhelmingly approved a \$120,000 supplemental bond issue to assure a sewerage system for the town.

There were 195 votes cast Tuesday afternoon, reported city clerk Floyd Helmgartner. Of these 195 votes, 161 favored the bond issue and only 34 opposed it. A simple majority was required to approve the issue.

The City of Juliaetta already has voter approval for issuing \$185,000 worth of bonds for a sewer system—this was gained in November of 1972. However, costs have increased so much that it was necessary to ask for this supplemental issue of \$120,000.

Only recently the city received a full grant of \$118,000 for a new water system and it is expected that work on this project will begin within two weeks.

Construction of the sewer system will not begin until bids are called, received and contracts awarded.

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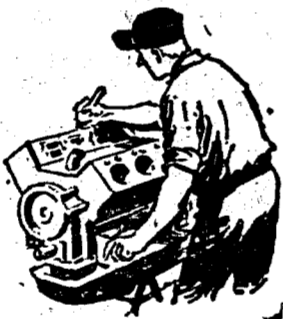
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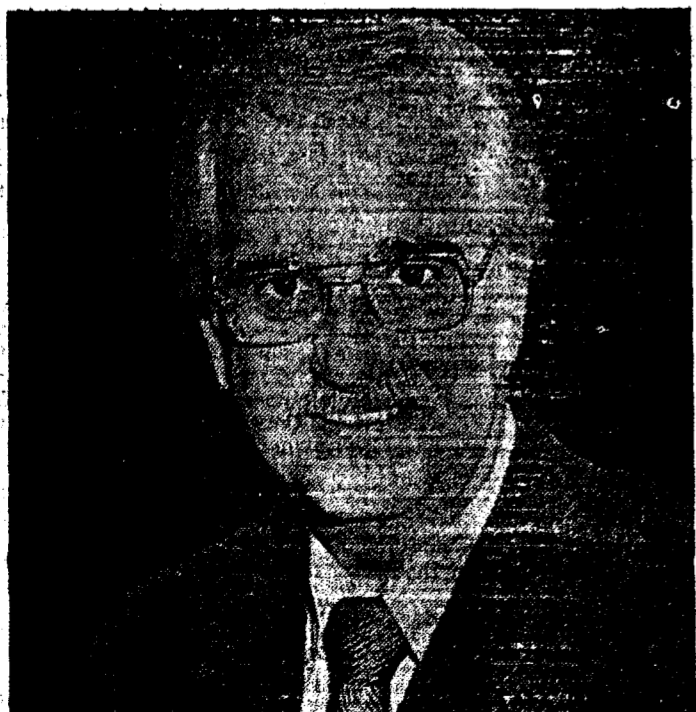
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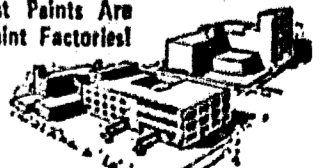

MILLEVY VOTE MAY 21

May 21st voters of the district will decide three issues for the school district. Two trustees will be elected from trustee zone No. 3 and No. 4. Mr. Tom Boyd incumbent has filed for reelection in zone 3 and Mr. Ray Stout incumbent from zone 4 has filed for re-election. Qualifications for electors to vote for the trustees is every male or female citizen of the United States, eighteen (18) years old, who has actually established a bonafide residence in this state and in the county where he or she offers to vote prior to the day of election and a resident of the school district.

Another issue to be voted upon will be a one mill levy for kindergarten. This would enable the district to run a kindergarten program for the coming school year. To vote on this issue you must have the same qualifications as on the mill levy.

At the regular school board meeting Monday, May 13 the board approved the 1974-75 school calendar. School will open September 3 and close June 3rd. November 28-29 — Thanksgiving vacation; December 23 to January 6 Christmas vacation; March 27, 28 & 29 Spring vacation. The board also approved job descriptions for everyone in the district and that they will become part of the district policy.

The district will also have a yard sale on June 1st to get rid of some surplus items to be replaced for the coming year. Items will be advertised and also listed and posted around town.

The board also reviewed the new standard teachers contracts and the new requirements for bus drivers for the coming year. The drivers have to pass a two-part test in addition to the requirements this past year. One part is on a daily bus inspection and the other is a driving test.

A report was given by Supt. Diehl on the federal programs going on within the district. These programs are reimbursable programs and all equipment, books have been received and are ready for audit.

Mr. Woehl, Principal, gave a tentative report on next year's high school schedule.

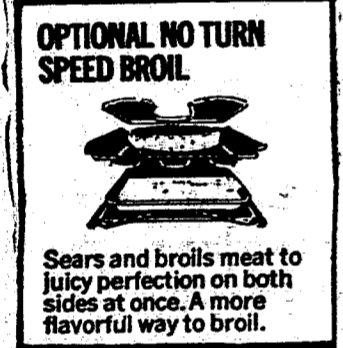
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GIRLS' BASKETBALL CLINIC

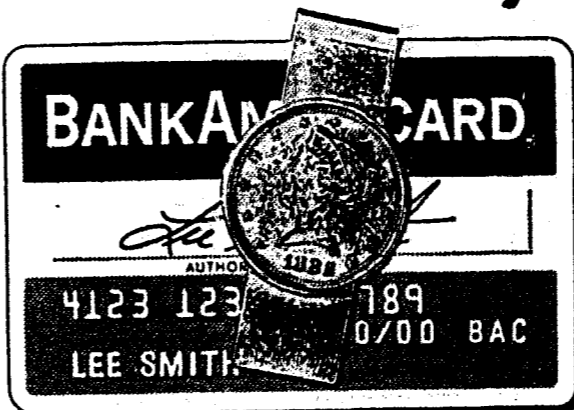

The Economy method is used in grade 1 through 3. The children stay in the classroom for reading but read in groups according to reading level, much the same as Julietta.

We were most impressed with the intermediate reading groups, Grade 4 through 6 leave their regular classrooms and go to their assigned reading groups for 1 1/2 hours each morning. They are grouped according to reading level. There are 13 groups with close to 20 in each class. The children seem very happy and learn well. The Houghton method is used. The man who heads up these groups said that with this method, a 6th grader can succeed in Jr. High—if doing good on 4th grade level in the 6th grade.

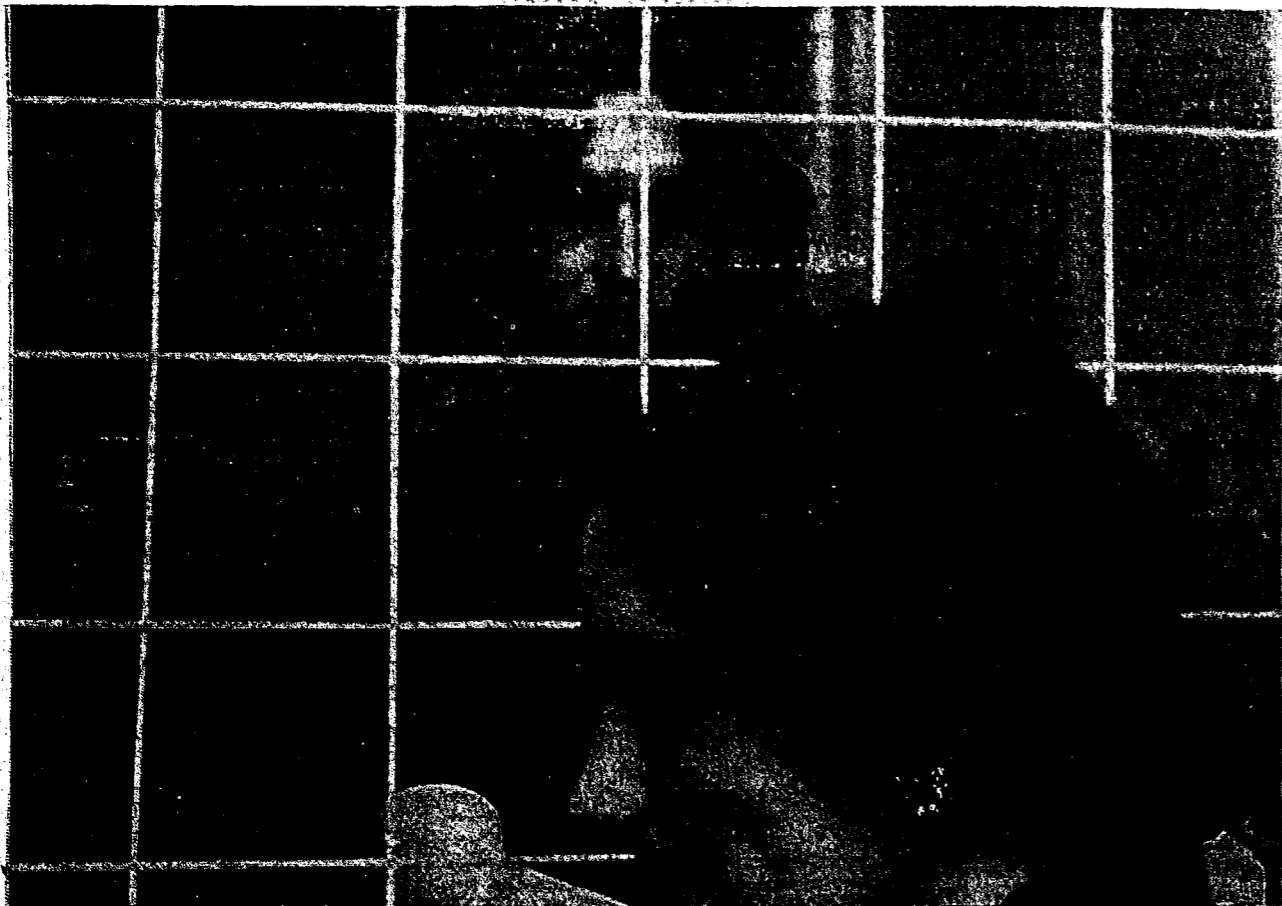

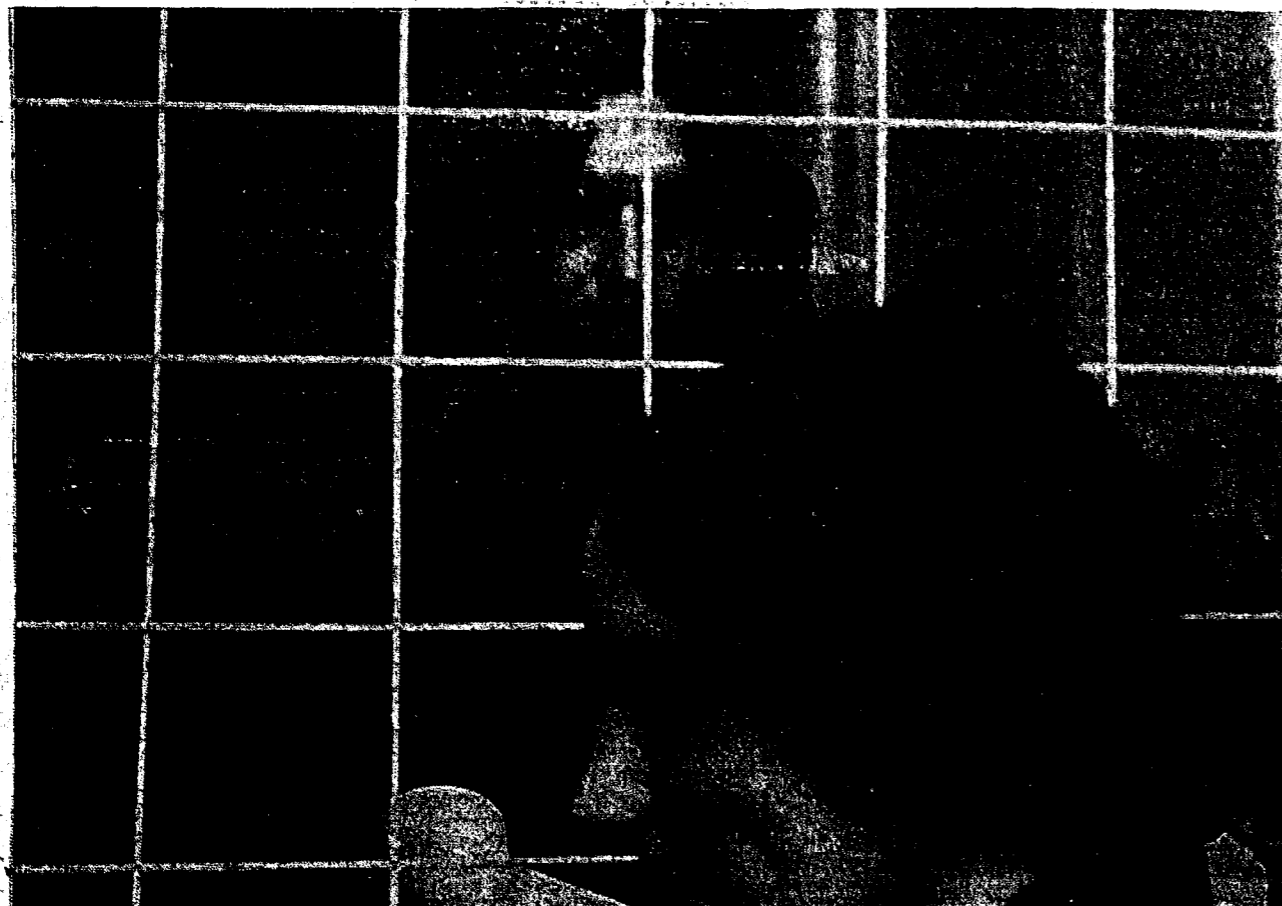
