**Juliaetta's Growing; Kendrick Shows Stability-**

**Juliaetta, Kendrick Business Growth**

Moscow—The towns of Juliaetta and Kendrick, Idaho, are favorably inclined toward business growth, according to an economic base study of the area recently completed by the Center for Business Development and Research at the University of Idaho.

"In general, the two communities are both growing and that is good for business development," said Gary Blake, business development specialist at the center. "The study shows that the Juliaetta and Kendrick area, for a number of reasons, is a very favorable one for new development and growth of business."

Blake explained that an economic base study seeks to establish the current and potential future of the economic status of a community. Business interested in locating in an area use this base to determine their own potential growth within the community.

"An economic base study is one of the first things a new business which is considering the community as a location would ask for," Blake said. "It tells them about the area, economically, and substantiates the rough estimates of local businessmen who are not able to give the whole picture as well as the study does."

One of the most important factors considered in the study was the population. The population of Juliaetta has shown an increase in each of the census years since 1930 and has

continued this trend into the 1970s. Kendrick experienced population increases from 1930 to 1960. In the 1960s its population showed a slight decline, best explained by the steep canyon walls around the town which limit the availability of suitable building sites. Thus far into the 1970s, Kendrick's population has held steady at the 1970 census figure.

Another factor considered in the study was the type of transportation available. State Highway 3 runs through both communities, located on the Potlatch River, and Kendrick is also served by State Highway 99. The study showed that use of these highways has increased substantially over the past 10 years and anticipates that the recent completion of Dworshak Dam may result in additional increases in the future.

The Burlington Northern Railroad passes through both Juliaetta and Kendrick, making available carload freight service but no passenger service. Freight service is also available through Kendrick Auto Freight.

Agriculture was another factor covered in the study. A variety of crops including wheat, barley, oats, peas, beans, lentils and grass seed is grown. Small cattle operators and truck gardens also abound in the area.

The University of Idaho has conducted a feasibility study on the "Economic Potential for Developing Vineyards and a Wine Industry in

Idaho." Because of its climate, altitude and frost-free days, Juliaetta land was included in the study. Several varieties of grapes were planted and all thrived. As present, 10 acres are under contract to be planted in grapes and more acreage is anticipated.

Other factors discussed in the study were the commercial and industrial sector, community facilities and organizations, building construction and modification, residential ownership, public utilities, assessed valuation and government.

The Center for Business Development and Research was created in 1973 from a merger of the Center for Business Development and the Bureau of Business and Economic Research. In addition to preparing economic base studies, the center also conducts feasibility studies and courses for small businessmen around the state and acts as a consulting firm for small businesses.

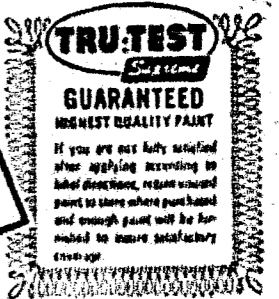

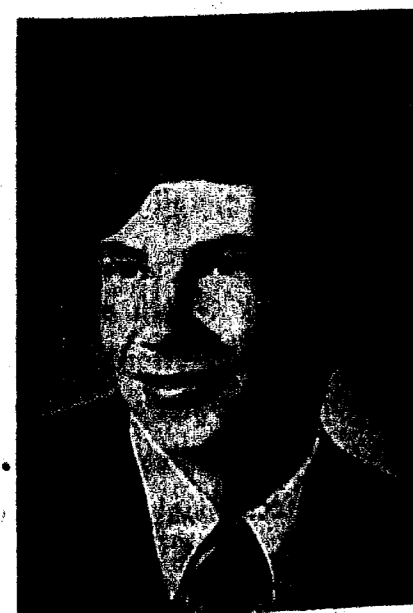

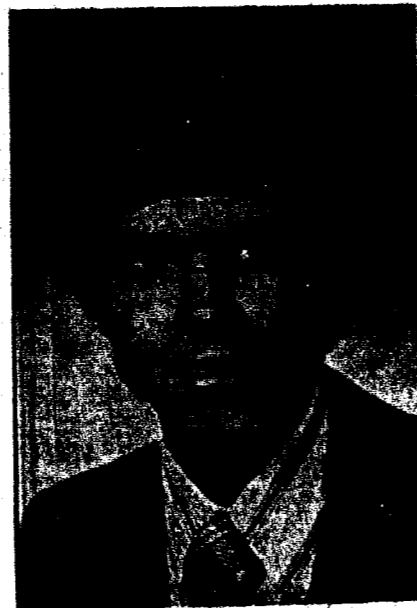
