Another difficulty the young child usually has in following directions is distractions. Until a youngster is 11

distractions. Until a youngster is 11 or 12 years old, he cannot control and organize his mind to a point where he can fight off ditractions, according to Swiss psychologist Jean Pioget. Everyone pays lip service to the obvious truth that young chil-dren are easily distracted, but few adults act on it.

Keep directions clear, simple and minimal. Show the child what you expect of him. Let him imitate.

Give him plenty time. If he flubs, lend a helping hand instead of scolding Remember if adults don't understand directions they blame the giver of the directions. When directions confuse children, adults blame the children. And be patient with your preschool-
