

Screening for diabetes will be offer-ed at the Health Fair on June 4th and 5th at the Kendrick High School.

If any of the following conditions apply to you, you should participate in diabetic screening: over forty, fam-ily history of diabetes, overweight, a nine-pound baby. The test for diabetes screening is

very simple. Just a finger-puncture. for a drop of blood is all that is nec-Approximately one and one-half

Approximately one and one-half hour prior to having your blood test done, eat one of the following meals. Breakfast: Three pancakes with a large amount of syrup, 1 glass of milk and fruit juice. Disner Meal: 1 serving potatoes, dri-ed beans or corn, 2 slices of bread or rolls, 1 piece of cake or pie, cof-fee or tes with sugar, milk, or soft drink "nlus anything clas you like".

drink, "plus anything else you like". Pap smear or test is for early de-Pap smear or test is for early de-tection of cancer of the cervix in women. Cells from the cervix are pla-ced on a slide, and then sent to the laboratory for findings. It is impor-tant to have a good sample of cells, so douching should not be done be-fore the test. If the results indicate a need for further evaluation, you will be contacted by your Public Health Nurse.

Mrs. Donna James, R. N., Women's Health Care Specialist, will be doing pap tests on Wednesday, June 5th, from 9 a. m. to 3 p. m. On Tuesday, June 4th, Dr Edward Boas will be doing pap tests from 3 to 9 p. m.

Every women should have a pap test once a year.
