By this method numerous matching monies, both state and federal can be obtained to help develop the area in a shorter period of time, and each will receive the maximum benefits. The board would be assigned all park and recreation facilities in the boundary lines.

It appears that if Plan Two is accepted the board should consist of an equal representation and elected by the people to serve on their behalf and should be broken down into five districts. As time goes we feel a county recreation district will be formed being spent in our area.
