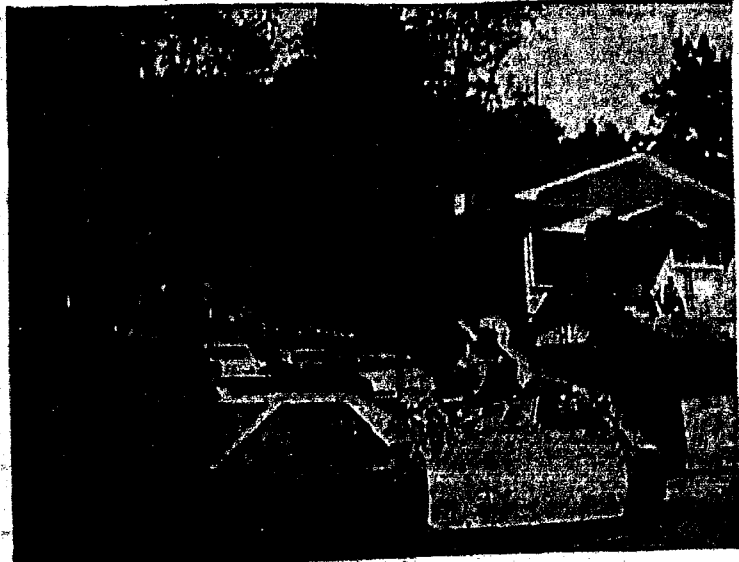


Locust Parade 'Best Ever'

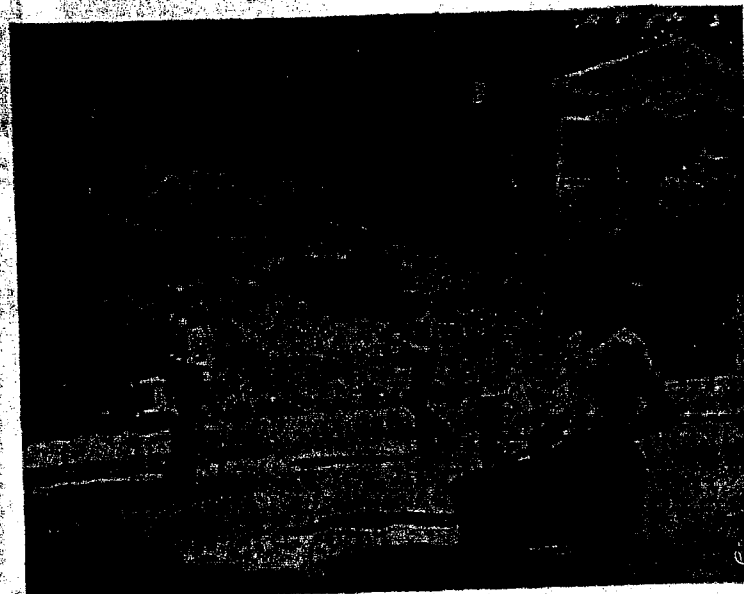

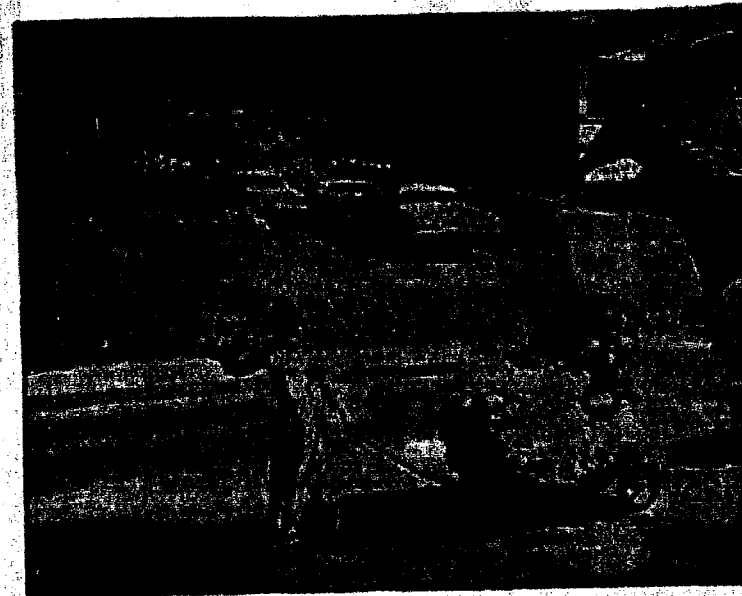

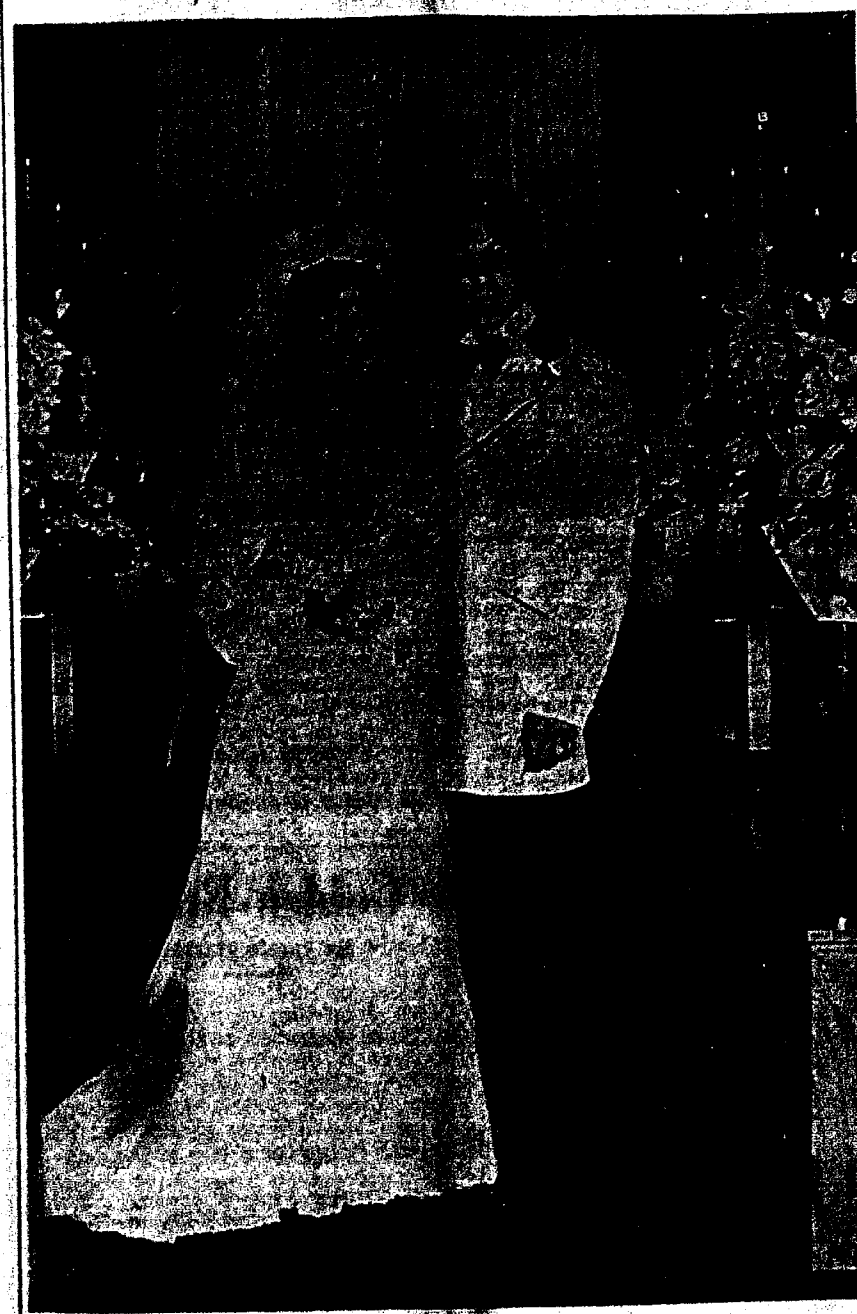

Julietta Grade Paving Project Due

Workers from the South Latah Highway District are now in the process of leveling and reshaping the twisting, winding Juliaetta grade leading up to Fix Ridge preparatory to the application of an asphalt surfacing and the 2.4 miles of the road. When the district workers, under the supervision of foreman Joe Schooker, are finished Crow Rock Products of Lewiston, the prime contractor, will process, lay and roll a 2-inch leveling course on the grade. Don Springer, clerk of the District, said Tuesday morning, the total bid for the project was \$15,514 and the work has an August 1 completion deadline. The preliminary work has consisted of re-shaping parts of the road and removing some of the blind curves which have plagued the grade travelers for many years. One of the worst blind spots on the grade, the switchback just below the Chas. Taylor ranch, has already been eliminated. District rock will be used on the base of the road, then Crow Rock Products will put down 8860 gallons of MC70 asphalt oil with 402 yards of aggregate rock. The 2.4 miles will extend from the top of the grade down to city limits of Juliaetta and the city of Juliaetta will come up approximately one block with asphalt to provide a solid oiled surface.

Other Seal Coating Work The Juliaetta Grade project is just part of the road work planned by the South Latah Highway District this summer. According to Don Springer there will be 7.13 miles of seal coating put down on various other roads in the district and 1.05 miles of road, from the John Luedke farm out to the Lloyd Wilson ranch, will be torn up and resurfaced. This section of highway has been in poor condition for some time and its new surfacing will be a great improvement. Springer added that the District had originally planned to do more oiling work this summer but the cost of the asphalt and oil has increased so much that the commissioners felt the costs were too high at this time.

Kendrick Pool Plans for Opening

Weather and repair and remodeling work permitting, the Kendrick War Memorial Swimming Pool is planning to open sometime next week, during the week of June 10, it was announced Tuesday by Wayne Harris, city councilman in charge of overseeing the pool's operation. The pool now has a new chlorination room to keep the water at an acceptable level, health-wise, and there has been the usual painting, cleaning and routine maintenance work done while the pool was closed. Becky Rishling will again serve as head lifeguard at the pool. Daytime hours for the pool will be from 1:30 to 5:00. When the evening weather becomes warmer, the pool will be open from 7 to 9 for nighttime swimming. Season tickets may be purchased at the office. Prices will be the same as last year: Family tickets—\$30; 12 and over—\$8.50; 6 through 12—\$7.50. Single admittance will be: 12 and over—50c; 6 through 12—35c. Children under 6 will be admitted free but they must be accompanied by a responsible adult. Girls will not be required to wear swim caps. Cutouts are not accepted swimwear, pool authorities reminded. Schedules for swimming lessons will be set at a later date.

Dandelions Are Easy To Control

Of course, the easy way is to call the commercial applicator with his specialized equipment and know-how. You will be assured of a good job.
 You can do the work yourself. As far as equipment, the bottle sprayer on the end of the hose or the pressure sprayer are the most popular. The jar on the end of the hose is cheapest but is the most difficult to control for drift.

The 2 or 3 gallon pump sprayer is easiest to use, but must be used only for 2, 4-D and not for any other use. Amine form of 2, 4-D used according to directions is the herbicide to use to control dandelions. Be sure it is the amine form and not an ester form of 2, 4-D. The ester forms are hard to control as far as drift and can volatilize and injure your flowers. Care must be taken in using any 2, 4-D as drift will injure broad leaf plants. A heavy cardboard can be used to prevent spray droplets from hitting flowers and shrubs. Be careful to always keep the cardboard facing the protected plants on the same side. If you reverse the cardboard you can rub the

material off on the next shrub and injure it.
 The herbicide, 2, 4-D, is an excellent material if used correctly, but in careless hands can destroy flowers, tomatoes and shrubs.
 Follow the instructions carefully and you can have a pretty, weed-free lawn.

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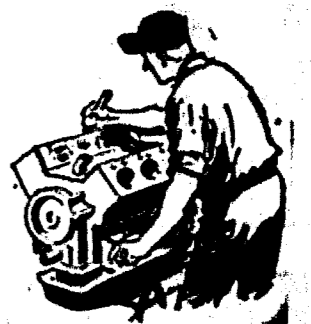

Beginning Area Recreation Future

Over the past many years the City of Kendrick has operated and been able to maintain a swimming pool program for the benefit of teaching the area children the fundamentals of swimming. During certain times it was necessary to ask for donations in order to make improvements in order to meet state requirements to keep the existing pool in operation. Each year the demand for improvement continues to increase and the maintenance problem becomes greater. During 1973 it became necessary for the city council to hire an engineer requesting he make recommendations to renovate the pool. At this time the council is making modifications so the pool will be open during 1974, but how long they can continue to operate under these circumstances is only a matter of time. From the record of the pool income has been approximately \$3000 and sales and supplies will run approximately \$3000; therefore this leave nothing for repairs.

There is two approaches to solve this problem:

- 1. Ask for donations and keep one step ahead of state requirements. But this method is expensive and costly for the amount of funds spent, compared to the amount of work accomplished. Because only a minimum amount of work is completed each year and donations begin to dwindle and become a constant battle. 2. This method would be to form a recreation district in this area with boundary lines that of the school district to take care of the entire recreation development in the entire area, which would be governed by a board of directors other than the city council. The board would survey the need of the area, and could assess a maximum millage of up to 3 mills in taxes for this development. By this method numerous matching monies, both state and federal, can be obtained to help develop the area in a shorter period of time, and each will receive the maximum benefits. The board would be assigned all park and recreation facilities in the boundary lines. It appears that if Plan Two is accepted the board should consist of an equal representation and elected by the people to serve on their behalf and should be broken down into five districts. As time goes we feel a county recreation district will be formed and if we form our own district first this could exempt us from a county-wide plan and be assured of monies to be spent in our area.

Plan for Canning

Interest in food preservation must have reached an all-time high last summer. More persons than ever tried their hand at canning, freezing, pickling, and jelly making. Many were first time preservers; others had considerable experience. Interest probably will increase this year.

Now is the time to check your canning and freezing equipment and supplies as well as up-to-date information on the processes to be used. suggests Esther Wilson, nutrition specialist, U. of I. cooperative extension service.

There are two major concerns in preserving or keeping foods for later use. They are: (1) maintain high quality and (2) prevent the growth of microorganisms which can cause illness.

Temperature has much influence on the growth of bacteria in food. They grow very rapidly between 60 and 120 degrees F. Freezing stops the growth of most bacteria but does not destroy them. Freezing also slows, but does not stop, enzyme action, which causes changes in flavor, color and texture.

High temperature (heat) for a long enough period of time will kill most microorganisms. Clostridium botulinum are most resistant to heat and may not be destroyed until the temperature reaches 240 degrees F. The pressure canner must be used to get temperatures above boiling (212 degrees F.). The looseness and tightness of the pack of food and the size of jar affects the temperature and processing time in canning.

Blanching, which is a heat treatment does reduce the number of microorganisms present, but its major purpose to be prevent undesirable changes in color, flavor, and textures, according to Ms. Wilson.

All costs should be considered in the home preservation of food—the food, packaging materials, other ingredients, labor, equipment and fuel. Sometimes it is not practical to preserve food at home, especially if food is not home grown. However, the family may eat better, and quality of home preserved food may be better.

Tacoma, Wash.
May 22, 1974

To the People of Kendrick and Juliaetta area Hi Folks,

This letter is written and I hope will be published in the local Gazette. Kendrick was my home town and Kendrick high was where I graduated in 1941. No doubt there are still people living there that were in my class; such as Everett Farrington, a good logger living in Juliaetta; Harry Newman, who farms on Potlatch Ridge; Bob Watts, who takes care of the Kendrick Rochdale Co. There are many old timers still around such as Ed Deobald, Marvin Long, Mrs. Pearl Long, Nora Callison, the Benscoters, Dick Blewett, Jay Armitage, and no doubt many more.

I still take and read the local Gazette-News which, as most of you know, covers not only Kendrick and Juliaetta, but Genesee and of course all the surrounding areas we call "Ridges". There lies some of the finest farming county I've ever seen or known.

The streets of Kendrick, of course, are lined with locust trees which bloom about this time and are very beautiful.

It was here in the Potlatch Valley where I learned to milk cows, chop wood and kindling, pick berries, cherries, apples, pears and prunes. We put up alfalfa hay in our barn and hay shed with Jackson fork which was also used in putting up outside haystacks.

In them days we used horses and mules. We had no electricity but we did have running water from a nice clear spring.

My folks were honest, hard-working farm people. My mother neither smoked nor drank, was a wonderful cook, and worked very, very hard. Here was a Christian living woman if I ever seen one. We, kids, got sent to Sunday school and this, as I've grown older, I've never regretted.

As I grew up there I learned to shoot, first with a .22 rifle, later with a .30-30 and shotgun. I used to trap and shoot ground squirrels on my way to school and back. I rode sleigh sleds and went ice skating and skiing in the winter months. In the summer we went swimming in the Potlatch River holes or once in awhile down to the Clearwater River. Later, if I was lucky, I went to the mountains for huckleberries and mountain stream trout.

After my Dad passed away we lived in the old Nick Brocks place near the bottom of Brady Gulch. This I know was swept away by one powerful flash flood.

All in all, I had a good growing-up life.

After leaving there in 1941 I went to Tacoma, Wash.; worked for the Greyhound Bus Co.; served about three years in the U.S. Navy during World War II. Tacoma had been my residence for more than 30 years.

I spent about 16 or 17 years here following the painting business, both interior and exterior.

I now have a good 13-year-old 4-ton GMC pickup with a manufactured canopy, plus radio and heater.

Anyway, it's getting harder and harder for people to live in cities.

I have been thinking that for the coming summer at least I would like to return to my good home country.

Now if there is anyone there who would like my labor, be it painting or any good work, please drop me a letter or card. This would make me very happy and feel good.

Now concerning the younger generation and their problems. Tacoma, by the way, is full of a great deal of crime and a lot of younger people in trouble. Every chance I get I try to sit down with these people, hear their side of things, and try to help if I can.

I feel that here is our coming generation who will be here when many of us are gone.

A lot of this, I feel, was caused by the Korean War and of course Vietnam. This has caused many families to break up with kids growing up with no good guiding parents.

America is our country. Let's all help the very best we can.

PSORIASIS
The exact cause of psoriasis, which afflicts one out of 50 persons in the United States, is unknown, reports the Idaho Medical Association.
It appears as itchy, silvery-scaled red patches on the elbows, knees, scalp and trunk, as well as on the hands and other parts of the body.
It has no sure cure.
The elbows, knees and trunk most frequently are the areas with the characteristic thick red scaling plaques. In the scalp, red plaques with sharp borders usually are visible at the hair line. These shed large quantities of silvery white scales resembling severe dandruff.
Acute psoriasis causes many small raindrop-like lesions over the body.
Much more is known about psoriasis today than in the past, although the exact cause is not known. It is not an infection and is not contagious. It may be hereditary. Injury to the skin often precedes psoriatic lesions.
Changes in the seasons cause variations in the lesions. Psoriasis usually improves during the summer and worsens during the winter.
Certain medications usually produce initial improvement, but the concern is merely alleviated and returns when the medication is discontinued. In some instances it responds well to sunlight.
Your physician can prescribe medications to help remove the scales and ease itching.

CALL A PHYSICIAN? WHEN SHOULD YOU
...Everyone faces this question occasionally and the Idaho Medical Association suggests the following considerations to help decide whether medical aid should be sought at once.
When the patient's complaint or symptoms are too severe to be endured, such as abdominal pain common to gall bladder attack, appendicitis or kidney colic, or there are sudden chest pains, the doctor should be called without delay for relief of pain.
Contact a physician when an apparently minor symptom persists for more than a few days and does not appear to be due to some easily identified cause. A nose bleed from a sharp blow is one thing; a nose that bleeds constantly or frequently for no apparent reason is a different matter.
Seek help when a symptom returns repeatedly for no apparent reason. Digestive disturbances due to over indulgence are one thing; constant digestive distress despite care and moderation in eating is another.
When in doubt, it is safer to seek medical help than to take a chance. Accidents require immediate medical attention when the victim is unconscious; when bleeding is severe and cannot be controlled; when the victim is groggy or confused; when there are signs of shock—pale cold skin, sweating and weak pulse; when there is breathlessness and great thirst; when there are signs of broken bones; when pain is severe; when there are signs of poisoning; when serious or extensive burns have occurred; when persistent severe vomiting is present; when vision is suddenly lost or blurred.
When you cannot reach a physician quickly in a medical emergency
