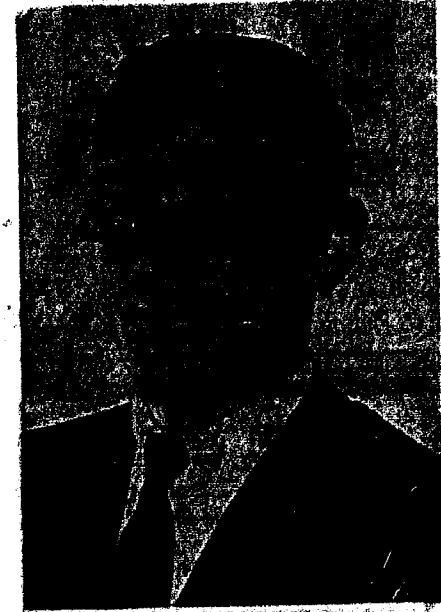


Ed Morken To Seek House Seat

"Seventy per cent of the gross state products of Idaho are directly attributable to agriculture," he said. "I feel there are some issues before the legislature that only an agriculturist can answer," he added.

This is Morken's first candidacy for a public office, although he has been a leader in Republican party affairs and in agricultural efforts for a number of years.

Among the issues Morken deems important are land use planning, OSHA and Open Range. Morken commented that education is the state's second most important industry. He said he doesn't think local school systems should be funded totally with state money, because "if you have a local obligation you tend to maintain local interest, and you are better able to keep abreast on how your school is functioning."

Morken is a 1953 graduate of Pacific Lutheran University of Tacoma, a member of the Food Producers of Idaho board, the University of Idaho Agricultural Consulting Council, president of the Idaho Pea and Lentil Association for two years and a board member of the county wheat growers organization and the American Legion.

He and his wife, Betty, have a daughter, Nanette, who is in the third grade. The family resides on a ranch near Genesee where he is in partnership with his father.

School Trustees Approve Budget

There was no opposition or questions at the public hearing on the proposed budget for Jt. School District 283 Monday evening, June 10, and the trustees adopted the budget for the coming school year in its final form.

The school's budget for the coming year shows an increase of slightly over \$60,000 from last year, reflecting the rising costs of operation and maintenance, increase in salaries and the purchase of a new school bus. The budget last year was \$308,724.65. This coming year's budget is \$368,798.36.

Supt. Blakeley said both he and the board were grateful to the taxpayers of the district for their approval of the two levy issues which permitted the district to meet the rising cost of school operation.

In other action the board reluctantly accepted the resignation of basketball coach Geo. Nolan and named Bill LaMunyan as head basketball coach, assistant football coach, head track coach and Jr. High football coach in addition to his duties as 7th and 8th grade math and science teacher. Supt. Blakeley indicated the school is very fortunate to be able to find so qualified a replacement as Mr. LaMunyan within its own faculty.

Blakeley said all teachers but Nolan and Whittig had signed contracts for the coming year for the high school faculty.

Glen Utzman, Moscow attorney and accountant, has been retained as district auditor. High School Handbook was approved by the trustees.

The Superintendent reported the summer maintenance and repair program is coming along "very well."

May Was Drier

The month of May was drier than usual in the Genesee area but the crop year rainfall still continues to run above normal, according to John Luedke, who maintains rainfall figures for the SGS.

Luedke recorded a total of 1.42 inches in the Genesee area for May's 31 days. This less than 1.73 inches of last year or the 2.33 inches in 1972.

The total crop year moisture is 24.79 inches, to date, well above the 20-year average of 21.33.

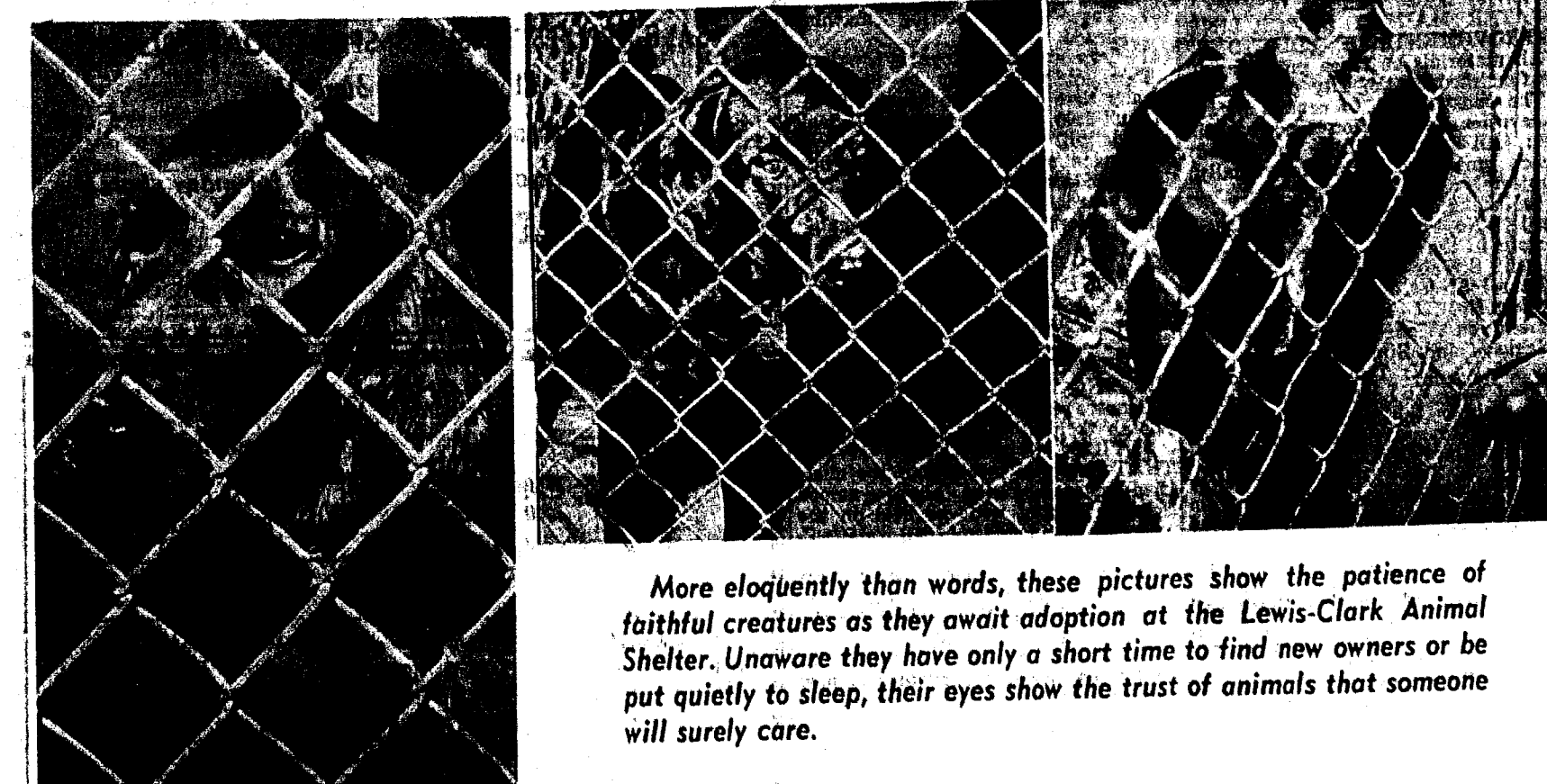

Animals Need Help...



More eloquently than words, these pictures show the patience of faithful creatures as they await adoption at the Lewis-Clark Animal Shelter. Unaware they have only a short time to find new owners or be put quietly to sleep, their eyes show the trust of animals that someone will surely care.

Lewiston and Clarkston and the surrounding areas cast off over four thousand unwanted dogs and cats a year. To counter this problem, the Lewis-Clark Animal Shelter joins the Idaho Veterinary Medical Association in urging the spaying and neutering of pet dogs and cats. The alternate—mass euthanasia (mercy killing) in the gas chamber—is not what most people want. The control problem currently costs the residents of Lewiston and Clarkston five dollars per family per year, whether they own a pet or not. It is estimated that over half the dogs born in the area every year die by the needle.

The shelter, long a source of pet food in the valley, is expanding its home

finding efforts by remaining open on Sundays from 2 to 5 p. m., in addition to its regular 8 to 5 daily schedule. This Sunday Open House for Pet Adoption will commence on June 23rd and will continue as long as people come.

It is the policy of the Shelter to spray all female dogs it sends to new homes, if they are old enough. Owners will be asked to sign an agreement of responsibility and to pay the nominal fees established to assure this responsibility. These are not large costs.

The new shelter building constructed in 1972 with the help of private donations insures, more than ever, the health of the pets which are

available for adoption.

Typical of the pets available are: 2 Samoyeds, male and female, Male 1 1/2 years, female 3. Black, white and tan German Shepherd, male pup.

Part Shepherd, female. Terrier and Chihuahua mix, 3 1/2 yr. female.

Black and white female terrier, 1 year. Black and white part poodle, year old, real bits, male. Full blood German Shorthair Pointer, female, 5 years. This is a really nice dog. Female Shorthair-black Lab. cross, 6 months old. Collie and Shepherd mix, 1-year-old

male. German Shepherd female, less than a year.

Three part Airdale females, 3 or 4 months old. Three kittens, all lovable.

There are many other dogs and cats to look at and choose from. By making a place for a dog or cat in your life, you will be granting that gift of life to a friend who never forgets. Why not stop by the next time you are in Lewiston.

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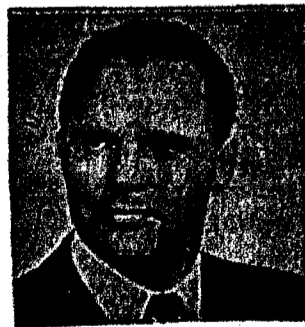
