Tussock Moth **Spraying Begins**

The St. Joe Douglas-Fir Tussock Moth Control unit came out of moth balls, so to speak, as field crews re-turned to full strength after being delayed 15 days because of cool temperatures and wet weather.

Forest ecologist Laura Smith, a crew leader on the control project, radioed the first report of tussock moth eggs hatching on June 12. The hatch started as a result of warmer weather which began June 9. A 70% egg hatch is expected by June 15, said Assistant Project Director Wayne Bousfield, who has been concerned over the expense involved in the de-

lay. Field Monitoring Coordinator Al Espinosa, U. S. Forest Service, explained that the delay in spray operations was used to good advantage by cooperating monitoring agencies who have nearly completed their pre-spray sampling. Seventy samples, in-cluding birds, fish, aquatic insects, large and small mammals, etc., were taken to the Idaho Department of Environmental and Community Services Lab in Boise on June 8. The St. Joe Unit in North Idaho has had, initially, a little better success in collecting pre-spray samples of all the units in the three state area of Washington, Oergon and Idaho, Espinosa

Water, stream sediment, and the stream vegetation pre-spray samples have been sent in, but air sampling is the one remaining component to be completed. Water sampling stations have been established in the spray blocks, in the edge of the spray blocks, and about one mile downstream. The stations are located in Jerome Creek and Meadow Creek near Harvard and in Hatter Creek near Moscow Mountain. Another station, used as a control, is located in Strychnine Creek near Laird Park. Fish boxes containing live rainbow trout will be put in both Jerome Creek

and Strychinne Creek.

Spray day will be critical for the monitoring personnel who will be out sampling water and aquatic life, watching for possible drifting aquatic insects. Aquatic insects would be the first affected should DDT spray get into the water, 24 to 48 hours after spraying additional sampling will be conducted. Further monitoring will continue through the summer and

will end next spring.

Boustield, a U. S. Forest Service Entomologist, said his crews are ready for the spraying to begin. At least one spray block in the Moscow Mountain area is expected to reach 70% egg hatch by June 15. Bousfield said that 95% of the field work is completed. Pest detection crews are monitoring the egg hatching and lar-va (caterpillar) development daily. Weather crews also are collecting data daily. Spray deposit checkers

are ready for spraying to start. A Huey 205 helicopter with a 350 completed this work.

Because of the hot weather and the high water along some of the area rivers, all members are urged to at the plans and plot our course for the next campout. All are welcome. Bring a friend.—Lloyd Craig.

If a permit is granted, such connecting sewer shall be of such size and shall be built of such materials and at such point and of such grade and depth as the Water Commissioner and City Engineer may direct, taking into consideration future connections which may be made with such connecting sewer. The Water Commissioner may refuse to issue such permit if the proposed connection would overload any existing sewer or drain. All decisions of the Water Commissioner and City Engineer hereunder may be reviewed and modified or reversed by

the Council. The application shall be accompanied by a sum of One Hundred Seventy-Five Dollars (\$175.00), which shall be a fee payable to the City for each and every service connection made to the sewer line from said property. CUSTOMING HIGHING MACHINERY MAY HELP EASE FINANCIAL STRAIN FOR SOME FARMERS

Moscow - To help the financial strain caused in part by rising machinery prices, farmers might consider hiring custom operators. That is the suggestion of Dr. John Early, University of Idaho extension agricult-

ural economist. He points out, however, that custom hiring is not profitable for all farmers. Each must weigh the profit and cons to determine whether hiring or owning equipment will provide the highest net income.

Early suggests some farmers may not have established their real costs of machinery ownership. He feels that if everyone knew what those costs are, more farmers might be looking for custom operators. Some farmers might even be willing to put some extra cash on the line-beyond. the going rate to buy more timely operation and quality work.

Early explains that ownership costs or fixed costs — nicknamed DIRTI-5-are depreciation, interest, repairs, taxes and insurance. Annual depreciation is 10 percent

per year of the purchase price if the machine is owned 10 years and 20 per cent yearly for five-year own-ership. Figure interest by either taking the going rate (about nine percent) times

take one-half the interest rate (4.5 percent) times the total value of the machine at the time of purchase. Repairs can be averaged at about

half the value of the machinery or

3.5 per cent over a 10-year life. On that basis, a \$30,000 combine would cost \$6,600 a year to own. If used to harvest a 220-acre grain crop, the per acre ownership cost would be \$30. Add to that, \$4 an acre for variable costs fuel and labor and the total cost is \$34.00 an acre to operate your own combine on 220 acres. That is the figure to be used when comparing costs to custom hire.

Early says. On 600 acres of grain, ownership costs on the \$30,000 combine wouldt

drop to \$15 an acre. Therefore, the number of acres plays a big role in whether to ow or custom hire machinery. Other factors are timeliness or operation, test. weight and moisture content and losses during the harvesting operation. Their importance may actually outweigh a portion of the extra cost of

ownership. 🛶 According to Early, custom machinery rates have gone up over 30 percent since 1972. The main reasons for this are increased costs of machinery, fuel and supplies.

Current indications are that cus tom combining rates are in the \$12 to 15 per acre range. That compares with \$9 to \$12 in 1972 and 1973. Early points out that much custom work is done by neighbors who have extra time and perform the service to help a fellow farmer, Many of these

farmer-custom operators, if they fig-

ured the total cost of operating their equipment, would find they are only recovering variable costs and a portion of the fixed costs. Additional information on the subject of custom hiring and rates in daho appears in a recently published University of Idaho booklet. It is Agricultural Experiment State progress report No. 117, titled "Rates for Custom operations in Idaho." The authors are R. V. Withers, professor of agricultural economics, and J. C. Roetht-

eli, agricultural economics research associate. Individual copies of the book are free at UI county extension offices in the state.

CUSTOMING HIRING MACHINERY MAY HELP EASE FINANCIAL STRAIN FOR SOME FARMERS

Moscow - To help the financial strain caused in part by rising machinery prices, farmers might consider hiring custom operators. That is the suggestion of Dr. John Early, University of Idaho extension agricult-

ural economist.

He points out, however, that custom hiring is not profitable for all farmers. Each must weigh the proc and cons to determine whether hiring or owning equipment will provide the highest net income.

Early suggests some farmers may not have established their real costs of machinery ownership. He feels that if everyone knew what thous costs are more farmers might be looking for custom operators. Some farmers might even be willing to put some extra cash on the line-beyond. the going rate—to buy more timely operation and quality work.

Early explains that ownership costs or fixed costs — nicknamed DIRTI-5 are depreciation, interest repairs, taxes and insurance. Annual depreciation is 10 percent per year of the purchase price if the machine is owned 10 years and

20 per cent yearly for five-year ownership. Figure interest by either taking the going rate (about nine percent) times half the value of the machinery or percent) times the total value of the

machine at the time of purchs Repairs can be averaged at about 3.5 per cent over a 10-year life. On that basis, a \$30,000 combine would cost \$6,600 a year to own. If used to harvest a 220-acre grain crop, the per acre ownership cost would be \$30. Add to that, \$4 an acre for variable costs—fuel and labor—and the total cost is \$34.00 an acre to operate your own combine on 220 acres. That is the figure to be used
