Selected to Staff North

Directors, Personnel

The results of a recent meeting held at the office of Whitepine School District included the election of officers and the employment of personnel to administer special education involving students in five rural school districts in northern Idaho.

Due to recent legislative and state board action, school districts are being held responsible for the education of all children, the handicapped, the gifted, as well as the normal, average student. This, of course, has been done to different degrees by the different school districts in the state. However, in an effort to do a better job, expand present programs and more effectively meet the needs of all students, and to make available to them the maximum number of state and federal funds, five north Idaho school districts have formed a multidistrict of special education. 




