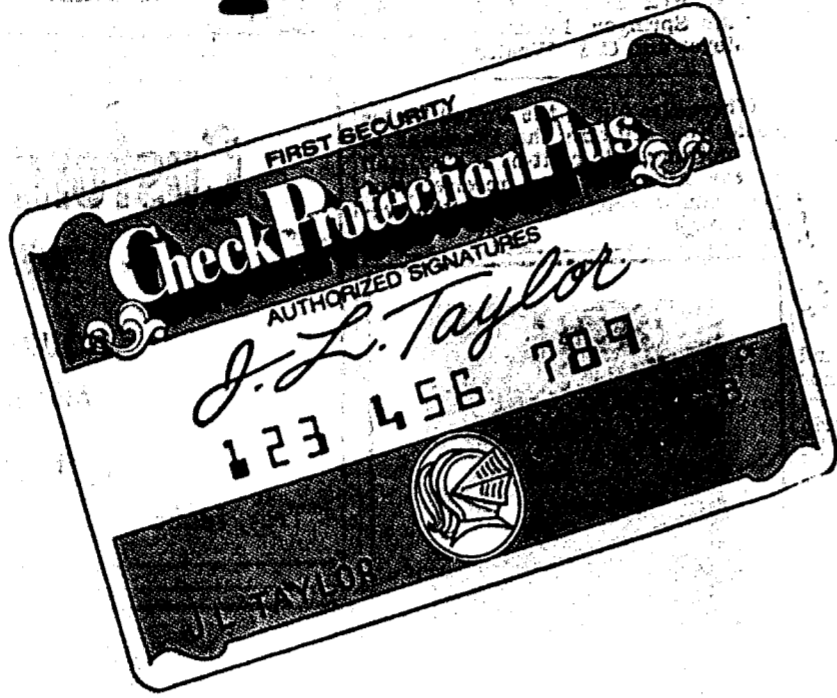

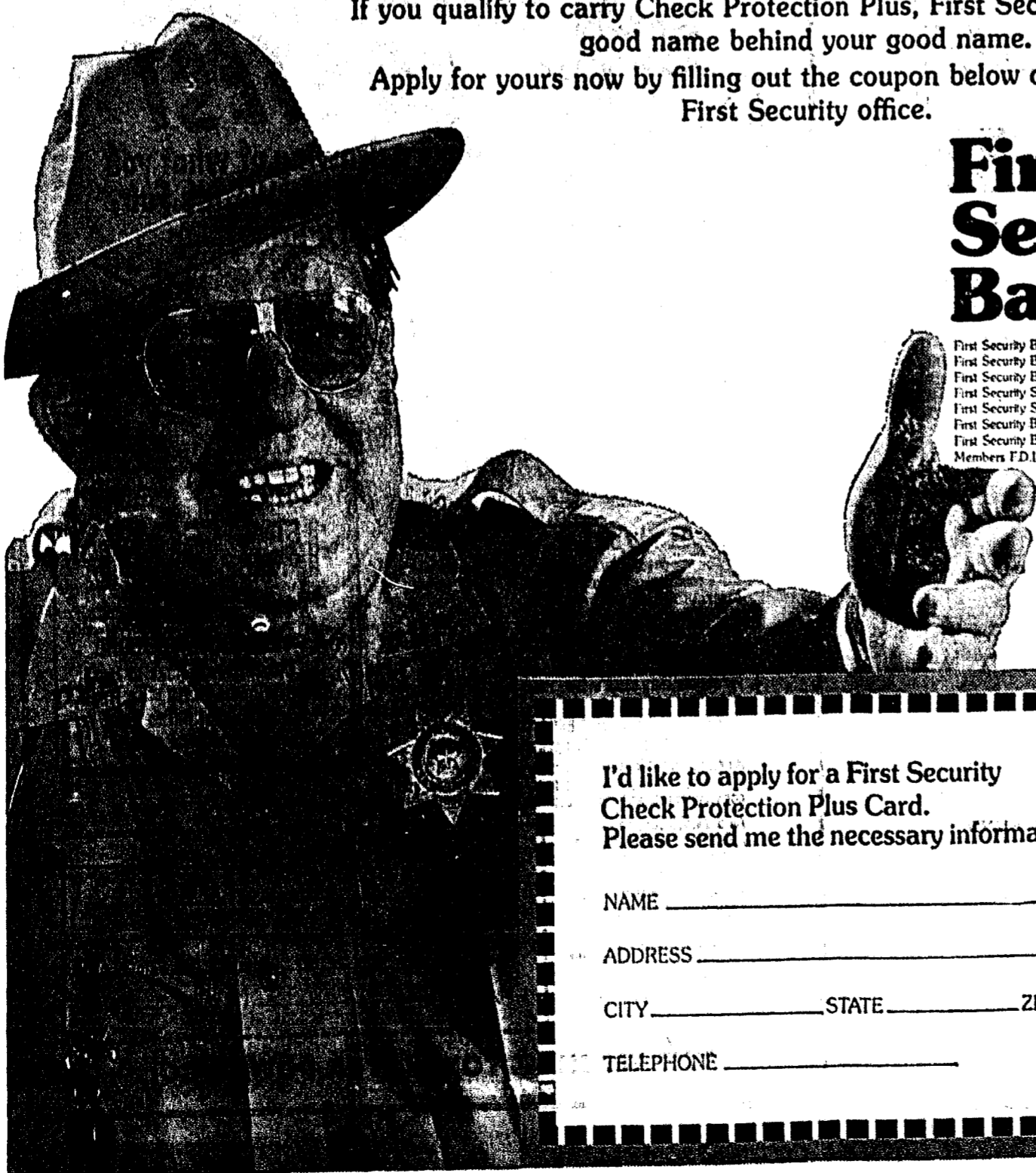

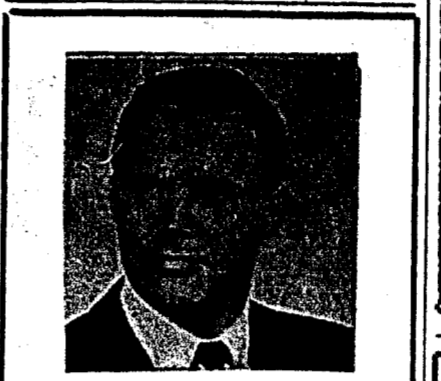

Four Latah Farmers Win Weed Fighter Caps

In the fight to control noxious weeds Weed Fighter caps are awarded for finding a new patch of dalmation toadflax, leafy spurge, white top, knapweed or skeleton weed.

Robert Larson, Potlatch spotted a patch of knapweed at the Harvard railroad siding. Joe Anderson, Potlatch, found a patch of white top on the road northeast of Potlatch. Robert Lindsey, Viola spotted dalmation toadflax on Highway 95 ten miles north of Moscow. Ole Swenson, Genesee, discovered a new patch of dalmation toadflax north of Genesee.

These new patches, along with the rest of the known infestations have all been treated as the first step to complete eradication, reports Homer Fetter, Latah County Weed Supervisor.

Carvings on Display

Eight carvings, seven in soapstone and one in wood by Nez Perce artist Doug Hyde, will be on display through July at the Spalding site of Nez Perce National Historical Park. The young sculptor has come up with some new and provocative figures of animals and people according to Park Superintendent Jack R. Williams. The work may be seen daily at the Visitor Center between 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.

to prevent these bad weeds from covering thousands of acres. Now is the time to spray Canada thistle and morning glory. In a few days it will be too late to prevent seed formation. Be sure to use the amine non-volatile form of 2, 4-D and a sticker spreader added to the mix will give better coverage. As this spreader sticker creates foam, put in after you have filled sprayer. Any Canada thistles unsprayed should be cut to prevent seed from spreading. Trying to eradicate weed patches is futile if we let weeds go to seed to reseed the county.
