those 9 workers, several youngsters were placed on training jobs through the special summer youth program.

There are still several jobs open but Hartstein indicated that most of them are for highly trained technical people, many requiring degrees. In addition, however, there are some requiring other skills and experience, such as openings for carpenters, auto mechanics, a sheet metal worker, legal secretaries, nurse aides, and some domestic and cafe workers. Practically all are for permanent full-time workers, he added.

There are still large number of young people seeking employment for the balance of the summer, and employers are urged to contact the Local Employment Office if they have need of the services of some young person for the rest of the vacation period.

Although 36 persons filed new claims for unemployment insurance during the week, Hartstein said that the total number of idled workers seeking benefits remained the same for the county, at 235. 




