



Futter stated there are 100 acres of the weed along Bear Creek above Kendrick that have been touched with herbicide. Spotted knapp weed resembles a Canadian thistle, has a light blue flower and not much leaf surface The weed takes over land that is not cultivated. He discussed the weed problem Monday with the Latah County commissioners and told them that, with the exception of two or three hour's work, he had sprayed most of the spotted knapp in the country outside of the Bear Creek area. 

News for the Hearing-Imparied on KUID-TV

Moscow-The Captioned ABC Eve ning News, a special edition of the ABC Evening News captioned for the hearing-impaired, will be seen nightly at 10 p.m. on KUID-TV 12, begin-

ning Aug. 5. The broadcasts, originating from WGBH-Boston, use the sound and pictures of the regular ABC Evening News. Printed captions are added to communicate the sound portion of the broadcast for those who are hearingimpaired. The nightly news services provides hearing - impaired viewers with a regular daily news program.


"We'll use the captioned news as often as it is available to us," said Pete Haggar', KUID-TV station manager. "Right now it will be shown Monday through Friday evenings at 10, or whenever our regular programming schedule ends."

By special arrangements with the American Broadcasting Co., WGBH tapes the ABC Evenings News at 6 each evening. A team of caption writers in Boston produces captions in time to present a full broadcast each night.

Programs specially prepared for the hearing-impaired in the past have traditionally used a second "commentator" who would interpret the news by sign language. But for the thou-sands of hearing-impaired who have never had to learn sign language, the system was impractical.

The Captioned ABC Evening News is an outgrowth of WGBH's earlier success with captioned versions of general audience television. In July and August of 1972, the station pre pared eight captioned versions of the French Chef. The resulting success led the station to the agreement with ABC. WGBH developed the techniques and the technical system now being used under a grant from the Media Services and Captionel Films Branch of the Bureau of Education for the Handicapped.

year on the South Fork of the Salmon River or its tributaries.


