



Doctors know that most efforts to prevent athlete's foot -chlorine foot baths at the swim-ming pool, disposable slippers, boiling of socks and treatment of shoesare not helpful. Athlete's foot is almost never "picked up."

The most common form causes red-

ness, cracks in the skin, itching and burning of the feet particularly between the toes. The same fungus can cause blister eruptions of the soles of the feet.



The proposed amendment provides that counties may issue revenue bonds upon approval of a majority of elec-fors at a special bond election for the purpose of acquiring, constructing, installing, and equipping facilities designed for environmental pollution control. Such facilities could then be sold, leased, or otherwise disposed of by the county to private persons or

The proposed amendment further provides that such bonds may not be secured by the taxing authority of the State or its political subdivisions. It is islended that the revenue from the sale, lease or other disposal of the facilities will provide the only source of payment of the bonds.

Section 1. Article XX of the Constitution of the State of Idaho pro-sently requires the legislature to submit proposed constitutional amendments to the people for ratification at the next general election following the legislative session at which the amendment is proposed, and in con-nection therewith, to publish said

(1) For at least six consecutive weeks prior to the next general election; and

(2) In not less than one newspaper of general circulation published in each county in the

The proposed amendment would change the above stated requirements by providing that the legislature publish the text of proposed constitutional amendments, as well as arguments for and against such amendments:

(1) Three times, rather than 'at least six times" prior to the next general election; and (2) In all newspapers qualified to publish legal notices, rather than "in not less than one newspaper of general circula-tion published in each county of the state."
