Civic Group Hears Plea to Preserve Area History

Approximately 60 people attended a joint meeting of the Genesee-Civic Assn. and the Latah Co. Museum Society Thursday evening at St. Paul's Lutheran church in Genesee. Mrs. Les Allen, president of the Civic Assn., welcomed the guests and turned the meeting over to Leonard Ashbaugh, president of the Museum Society. Mr. Ashbaugh explained the purpose of the meeting, and its accomplishments to date. These include: restoration and management of McConnell Mansion as a county museum; educational activities including school history class tours and county fair exhibits. He related that oral history projects are being done by taping interviews with early day residents. A quarterly bulletin is printed by the Society. Ashbaugh introduced Kenneth Platt, program chairman, Platt urged Genesee residents to try to secure an old building with historical significance and perhaps begin a collection of early day farm equipment and machinery, tools and other memorabilia to be housed there. Funds may be appropriated to aid in establishing historical landmarks in an area through the Bi-Centennial Commission. Platt reminded the group that Genesee is rich in area history for several reasons. Genesee had the first railroad in Latah county, proximity with Indian and the fact that it is the "heat of the Palouse" country in fertile soil. Genesee will celebrate its 100th anniversary in 1975 and plans should begin for observance of this. Among the buildings suggested for possible preservation were the railroad depot in Genesee and the R. E. Nordby barn north of town. He suggested assembling and preserving old photos, documents, records, etc., collecting and identifying pioneer farm household articles, writing records of pioneer families, assembling and writing up facts about pioneer architecture examples and preparing a guide showing sites and buildings of historic interest and around Genesee. Slides were shown by Ray Noritake of the UI Dept. of architecture. Ray was introduced by Dale Hickman. The slides were taken in Idaho City and Silver City, Idaho this past summer by a group of students and their professor, Bert McCrookery of the Architecture Dept. Measured drawings are made from the slides. Noritake explained, and placed on file in Washington, D. C. Recopied photos by Clifford Ott were on display. Mrs. Grace Wickes spoke and encouraged Genesee residents to begin some of these projects. Action has already been started to place the Nordby barn on the National list of Historic Buildings and a proposal to acquire the Nordby homestead for preservation as an example of Genesee farmsteads of the horse farming period has been launched, with encouragement by the State Bi-Centennial office.

Bulldogs, Tigers Co-Champs

Kendrick and Genesee each ended the 1974 season with a part of the Whitepine League championship and identical 5-1 league records. Last season the Tigers had the title to themselves, defeating Genesee in the final game of the year, but this season the Bulldogs had hung the only loss of the league season on the Tigers. Kendrick gained its share of the crown Friday afternoon by squeezing past Nezperce 12-12 and the Bulldogs upended Troy 26-6 Friday evening. Troy and Genesee each went into the game with only one loss. The Tigers Come From Behind Coach Dick Buark's Tigers had to use a two-point safety and a 30-yard field goal of the tie of Mike Roe Friday afternoon to edge out an inspired Nezperce Indian team 13-12 on the Nezperce field. Nezperce put together a 60-yard first quarter drive which climaxed with a 3-yard plunge for the touchdown by Russ Chandler. Nezperce failed to convert but led 6-0. Kenny Brown then trapped a

Nezperce back in the end zone in the same period for a 2-point safety to make the score 6-2. Both teams battled to a scoreless second quarter and then in the third quarter a 20-yard pass by Nezperce scored for the Indians and it was 12-2. Kendrick gambled on a pass on a 4th down situation and succeeded to keep a 70-yard drive alive. It was Ken Brown who caught the pass from Kelly Clemenhagen and the Tigers moved on down to the 3-yard line where Dan Steigers packed the ball across the line for the score. Dan also ran over the conversion for the extra two points. With seven minutes remaining in the game and trailing 12-10 Mike Roe booted a 30-yard field goal which won the game for the Tigers. Pat Souders had set up the opportunity earlier when he recovered a Nezperce fumble on the Indian 35. Kendrick drove to the 13-yard line before gambling on the field goal. Roe's kick split the uprights perfectly and Kendrick had the win 13-12. The Tigers were down on the Indian 1-yard line and threatening to score again when the clock ran out. The Steigers brothers, Dan and Rick, picked up 160 of Kendrick's total 180 rushing yards. Clemenhagen completed 5 of 9 passes for 130 yards with 110 yards going to Ken Brown. Bulldogs Crush Troy Genesee's Bulldogs rose up to play their best game of the season Friday night to defeat the visiting Troy

Trojans 26-6 and take half of the Whitepine crown. Troy, defeated only by Kendrick, was favored to edge out the Genesee team, but Genesee's defensive squad smothered the Troy attack completely. The Bulldogs took the opening kickoff of the game and controlled the ball for the first six minutes of the quarter, although they saw their drive for goal stopped on the Trojan 20-yard line. Don Smith's shoe-string tackle of a touchdown-bound Troy player stopped the only scoring threat Troy was able to muster in the initial period. Genesee finally stopped the Troy drive on the 20 and took over after Max Schweene had dropped the Troy quarterback of a loss. Moving back up the field, Jay Roach, playing with a badly bruised foot, swept around right end from his own 46-yard line and went 54 yards for a touchdown. Genesee drove deep into Trojan territory twice in the second quarter, once down to the three and again to the six before giving up the ball and the half ended 6-0. Big Third Quarter Genesee scored three times in the third quarter but only got to count two of them. First touchdown came on a highly questionable ruling that Roach stepped out-of-bounds on his 40-yard run to the goal. Loren Morschick made up for the loss seconds later as he went 20 yards for the touchdown and Genesee was ahead 12-0. Troy fumbled the kick-off and Genesee recovered on the Trojan 12. Morschick went through the middle of the line to the 2 and Danny Stout, on a keeper play, scored on the next play. In the final period Wayne Jensen grabbed a Stout pass and took the ball to the 4-yard line where Don Smith bulled it across the line on the next play. Stout ran over the extra two points to give Genesee a 26-0 lead. With just 47 seconds left in the game Dana Heath of Troy intercepted a Stout pass and returned the ball 33 yards for Troy's only score.

Closed Fire Season Is Extended to Oct 31

The closed fire season which normally ends on October 20 has been extended to October 31 by Gordon C. Trombley, director of the Idaho State Department of Lands. Trombley said the extension of the fire season was necessary due to lack of rain and the warm daytime temperatures that have prevailed thus far. The United States Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management concurred with the decision. The extension applies to all Forest Protective Districts in the state and anyone wishing to burn debris must secure a burning permit from the local fire warden, United States Forest Service ranger or Bureau of Land Management district officer. Trombley asked that anyone entering forest or range lands be extremely careful when smoking or building campfires.

Accidents Blocked Am. Ridge Grade

Three trucks, two carrying potentially dangerous cargoes, were involved in a series of accidents on the American Ridge grade Thursday afternoon. The resulting confusion blocked traffic on the grade for a period of five hours before the scene could be cleared. The series of mishaps began just after 12:30 p.m. when a Consolidated Freightlines truck loaded with ammonia enroute to Kendrick from Spokane, lost its brakes on the top of the grade. The driver, David L. Englehart, Spokane, not wanting to ride the runaway truck into town and risk injury to others, deliberately overturned the truck about two miles up the grade. He was not injured in the resulting overturn. An Idaho Department of Lands truck, driven by Asst. Fire Warden Roger Kechter, Juliaetta, was called to help dilute the ammonia as it was running into the ground in an adjacent gulley. About 1 p.m. an International truck, driven by Steve L. Blaker of Lewiston, carrying several bottles of hospital-type pure oxygen, was unable to stop after the driver spotted the overturned tanker. Blaker swerved and missed but went on to hit the water truck. Neither Blaker nor Kechter were injured. State Patrol Cpl. James Barber, Lewiston, said 7,000 gallons of ammonia and another liquid fertilizer valued at \$2,560 were lost in the crash. The tanker and trailer, valued at about \$45,000, were damaged beyond practical repair. Blaker's vehicle sustained about \$800 damage and the state water truck was damaged to the estimated extent of \$650. Howard and Glenora Braden were going up the grade at the time of the initial and saw the truck flip over. They turned around and returned to the wreck to post warning signs and see if they could assist.

Fully Feathered Wing To Identify Species

Both federal and state regulations require that a fully feathered wing or head must be left on each field dressed migratory waterfowl while enroute from field to home or commercial food processing or storage plant. The requirement that one fully feathered wing "or other discernible evidence of species and/or sex" be retained on all upland game birds harvested in Idaho is a state regulation that has been standard for many years. In both cases, the purpose is to identify species and/or sex. Other regulations provide that no person may transport game for another; receive for cleaning, processing, or storage; or accept as a gift any game animals, birds or fish, or parts thereof, unless the game animals, birds or fish are accompanied by a written statement showing the numbers, kinds, dates taken, and the name and address of hunting and fishing license of the shooter. In the case of waterfowl, federal law requires that each person 16 years of age or older who hunts ducks or geese must have in his pos-

Heart Attack Claims Ruth May Adams, 78

Ruth May Adams, 78, a former Lewiston resident, died of a heart attack at 2:30 a.m. Sunday at Moscow. She was admitted to the hospital at 11:30 p.m. Saturday. PARTY HUNTING ILLEGAL

By Bob Cordingley Regional Staff Conservationist

Hunters cheat themselves of personal experiences as well as break the law when they give their big game tags to a fellow sharpshooter who brings down an elk, deer, or who shoots a pheasant for them. It is illegal to try to fill out tags for each

Called "party hunting" the practice of filling out bag limits for unsuccessful members of a party thru the efforts of other members with more ability is unlawful. Both the shooter and the unsuccessful hunter who transfers his tag are liable for at least two violations.

Hunting to fill tags for others in the party may result in killing more game than you have tags for. This leaves the hunter with the decision to either transport the animals untagged or leave the game, birds, or fish to waste or rot in the field. No matter what the decision, the hunter will be in violation of the law. Numerous violations stemming from party hunting are prosecuted each fall.

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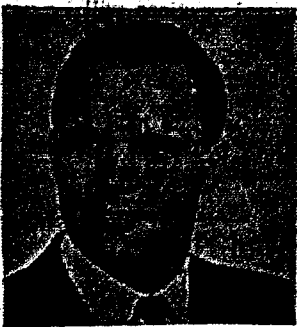

WISDOM FROM OUT WEST

Every once in a while a new face appears in congress that renews our faith in the democratic process. Today we salute such a person: Rep. Steve Symms from Idaho's first district.

Freshmen congressmen, so they are subtly reminded by their elders, are to be seen and not heard. The youthful Symms, elected to his first term in 1972, has shattered that tradition and, in the process, established himself as one of the most articulate and thoughtful conservatives on Capitol hill.

Symms and his constituents appear to have a good marriage going for them. He was unopposed for renomination this year—something of a rarity in Idaho—and in a recent poll throughout his district, respondents answered remarkably in line with Symms' own well-established views.

The Idaho first district poll indicated that 67 per cent of respondents oppose extending diplomatic recognition to Cuba; 97 per cent oppose tax-financed, multimillion dollar, low-interest loans to Russia and other Communist regimes; and 62 per cent said America's defense was not strong enough.

Although a Republican, Symms hasn't hesitated to ruffle the feathers of members of his own party and the GOP White House as well as the Democratic majority in congress. He consistently has let the chips fall where they may in defense of limited government, a strong national defense, and sound fiscal policy.

Witness this vintage wisdom from a recent Symms newsletter: "For too long we have acquiesced to the steady increase of federal authority over our economy, our property and our daily lives. This authority has created the ability of government to offer special favors to the 'highest bidders' and thus has corrupted our political system in more ways than just Watergate.

... the real issue of Watergate (is) excessive federal power, granted by congress and abetted by men in the executive branch who broke their trust . . . The ordeal is over now . . . we must hold our heads up high, reaffirming our faith in the principles of limited, constitutional government. Our future, like our past, will be what we make it."

Wise words from an uncommon young congressman we'll be hearing a lot more about—Steve Symms of Idaho.

Seniors May Apply For Early Graduation

Usually eight full semesters of attendance will be required for graduation. However, in compliance with the May 1971 motion of the State Board of Education that: "Any high school student who completes the number of credits required by both the State and school district prior to finishing eight semesters of high school work may petition the State Board to graduate from high school upon completion of the necessary credits, providing he or she has endorsement and the approval of the superintendent and local board."

The Following Procedures Will Be Followed:

1. Requests to apply for early graduation must be student initiated through the principal. Application for early graduation should be in by the end of the 6th semester of attendance. Any student making this request must have completed or be in the process of completing 18 units.
2. Students will receive their Diploma at the end of the 7th semester.
3. Participation in graduation exercises is optional. If students plan to participate, they must notify the principal by May 1st.
4. Specific reason for requesting early graduation need not be given.
5. Early graduates are eligible for Valedictorian or Salutatorian.
6. Early graduates will not be eligible to go on the Senior sneak.
7. Three forms must be completed for Early Graduation Requests.

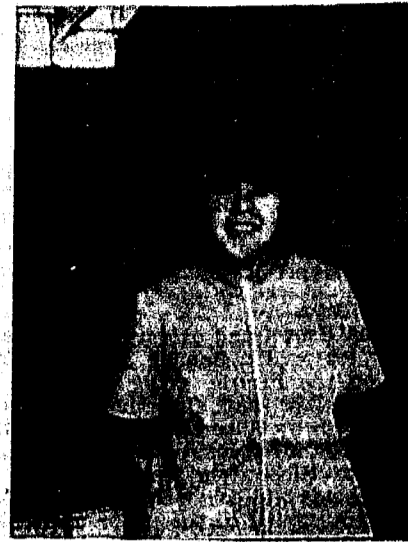

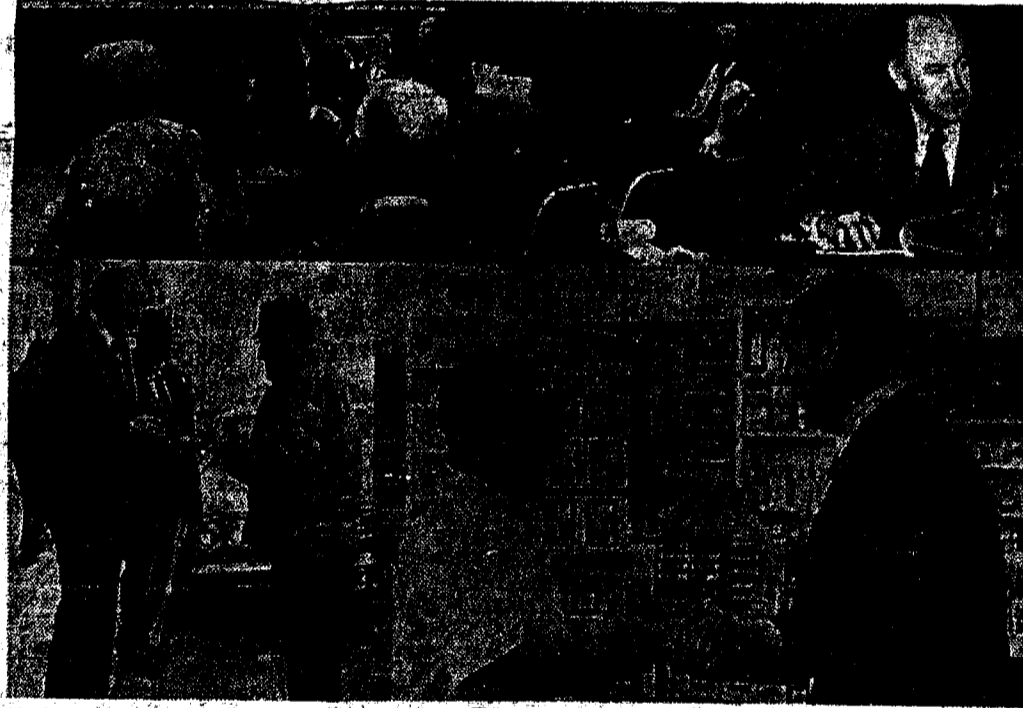

We've all eaten or made a shoofly pie at some time, and they are delicious but calorie filled! (That's what makes them so delicious) but have you ever tried a shoofly crumb cake? Well, if you haven't—try one. —It's loaded with calories—but try it, you are going to forget about your diet and calories during the holidays anyway. This recipe came from a Pennsylvania Dutch cook book.

SHOOFLY CRUMB CAKE

4 cups flour
1 cup granulated sugar
1 cup brown sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup butter
1 cup molasses
2 cups boiling water
1 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
Mix flour, granulated sugar, brown sugar, salt and butter to crumbs using a pastry blender or your fingers. Reserve one cup of crumbs for topping. Mix molasses, boiling water and soda and gradually add to major part of the crumbs until well blended. Pour this mixture into a greased 9 1/2 x 12 3/4-inch baking pan. Sprinkle the reserved 1 cup crumbs on top. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 55 minutes. If you use layer cake pans, decrease baking time to 40 minutes. Moist and keeps well.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

S.J.R. No. 114

"Shall Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended by the addition of a new Section 3A to provide for the issuance of revenue bonds by counties in the manner prescribed by law, with the assent of a majority of the qualified electors of the county voting at an election to be called and held for that purpose, for the acquisition of environmental pollution facilities to be financed for, or to be sold, leased or otherwise disposed of to, persons, associations and corporations other than municipal corporations or other political subdivisions; provided, that such revenue bonds shall not be secured by the full faith and credit or the taxing power of the state or of any political subdivision?"

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S STATEMENT OF MEANING AND PURPOSE

S.J.R. No. 114

Senate Joint Resolution 114 is a proposed amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Idaho, which provides a new section to Article VIII relating to environmental pollution control facilities and tax free county revenue bonds for obtaining such facilities.

The proposed amendment provides that counties may issue revenue bonds upon approval of a majority of electors at a special bond election for the purpose of acquiring, constructing, installing, and equipping facilities designed for environmental pollution control. Such facilities could then be sold, leased, or otherwise disposed of by the county to private persons or industry.

The proposed amendment further provides that such bonds may not be secured by the taxing authority of the state or its political subdivisions. It is intended that the revenue from the sale, lease or other disposal of the facilities will provide the only source of payment of the bonds.

Among the results intended by this amendment is to enable business to obtain anti-pollution equipment at lower cost and in some cases enable some businesses to obtain such equipment which could not otherwise be financed.

S.J.R. No. 118

"Shall Section 1, Article XX, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho, relating to how amendments may be proposed, be amended to strike the requirement that amendments shall be published for at least six consecutive weeks, and provide that amendments shall be published at least three times, such publication to provide arguments proposing and opposing the amendments?"

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S STATEMENT OF MEANING AND PURPOSE

S.J.R. No. 118

Senate Joint Resolution 118 is a proposed amendment to Section 1, Article XX of the Constitution of the State of Idaho, which would change the manner in which the legislature is required to publish the text of proposed constitutional amendments, and would add a new provision requiring the legislature to publish arguments for and against proposed amendments.

Section 1, Article XX of the Constitution of the State of Idaho presently requires the legislature to submit proposed constitutional amendments to the people for ratification at the next general election following the legislative session at which the amendment is proposed, and in connection therewith, to publish said amendments.

(1) For at least six consecutive weeks prior to the next general election; and
(2) In not less than one newspaper of general circulation published in each county in the state.

The proposed amendment would change the above stated requirements by providing that the legislature publish the text of proposed constitutional amendments, as well as arguments for and against such amendments:

(1) Three times, rather than "at least six times" prior to the next general election; and
(2) In all newspapers qualified to publish legal notices, rather than "in not less than one newspaper of general circulation published in each county of the state."

Section 60-106, Idaho Code, currently details the qualifications of a newspaper that may publish legal notices in Idaho.
