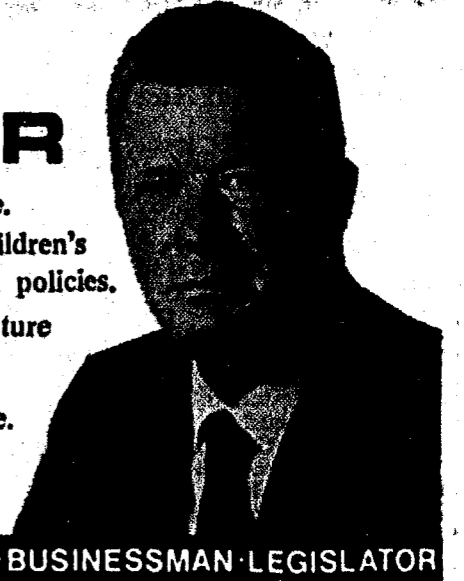

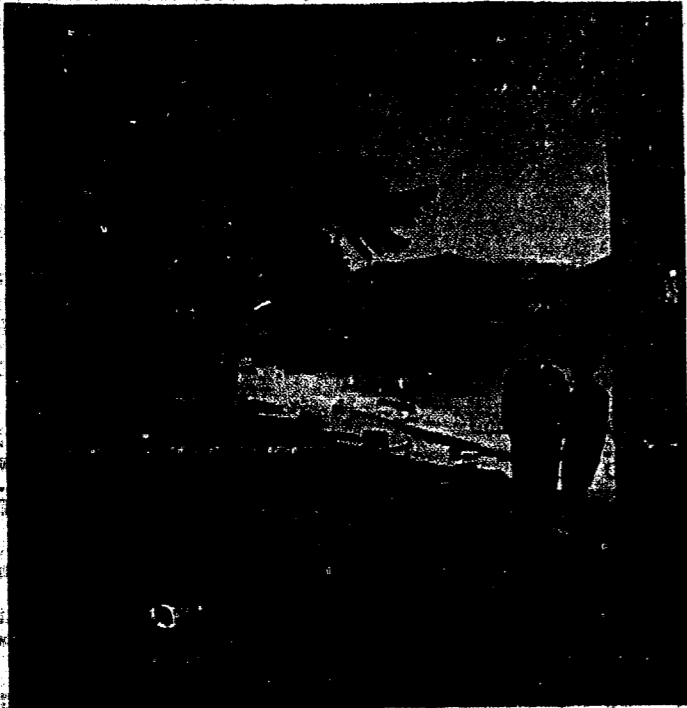

## Potato Outlook Favorable for Consumers, Growers

For consumers and producers alike, good news was contained in a potato outlook report issued this week by Robert L. Sargent, extension agricultural economist at the University of Idaho.

Sargent said consumers will be pleased by the high quality of the 1974 potato crop—and they'll also find retail potato prices to be somewhat below the levels which prevailed earlier this year.

From the grower's standpoint, high yields and a strong market demand are indications that 1974 is shaping up as a good potato year. The College of Agriculture economist added.

"The 1974 Idaho potato crop is expected to total about 80.4 million hundredweight, or two percent larger than last year's crop," Sargent said. "With production in other states showing larger increases, the entire U. S. fall potato crop should be more than 12 per cent above last year's."

Processors of frozen potato products will contribute to the market demand as they replenish their potato holdings, he said.

"Cold storage stocks of frozen potato products on Aug. 31 were above last year's extremely low levels, but they were below the levels of 1971 and 1972," Sargent pointed out.

With production at an all-time high level, orderly movement of potatoes to market is essential this year, the UI economist said.

"A program of selling part of the crop at intervals through the marketing year would be a good plan for growers to follow," he said. "If market runs can be avoided, potato prices for the year should average out much better than in other years of peak production."

#### TERM "BAG LIMIT" DEFINED

The term "bag limit" is applied to the total number and species of birds which the hunter may take in one day of a legal, open hunting season. "Possession limit" applies to the total number of birds that a hunter may have in his possession—possession limit is usually double the daily bag limit.

The following are the proposed Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the next General Election to be held November 5, 1974.

#### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

To vote on the following, mark a cross (X) in the square at the right of "Yes" or "No."

**S.J.R. No. 114**  
 "Shall Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended by the addition of a new Section 3A to provide for the issuance of revenue bonds by counties in the manner prescribed by law, with the assent of a majority of the qualified electors of the county voting at an election to be called and held for that purpose, for the acquisition of environmental pollution control facilities to be financed for, or to be sold, leased or otherwise disposed of to, persons, associations and corporations other than municipal corporations or other political subdivisions; provided, that such revenue bonds shall not be secured by the full faith and credit or the taxing power of the state or of any political subdivision?"

#### ATTORNEY GENERAL'S STATEMENT OF MEANING AND PURPOSE

**S.J.R. No. 114**  
 Senate Joint Resolution 114 is a proposed amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Idaho, which provides a new section to Article VIII relating to environmental pollution control facilities and tax free county revenue bonds for obtaining such facilities.

The proposed amendment provides that counties may issue revenue bonds upon approval of a majority of electors at a special bond election for the purpose of acquiring, constructing, installing, and equipping facilities designed for environmental pollution control. Such facilities could then be sold, leased, or otherwise disposed of by the county to private persons or industry.

The proposed amendment further provides that such bonds may not be secured by the taxing authority of the State or its political subdivisions. It is intended that the revenue from the sale, lease or other disposal of the facilities will provide the only source of payment of the bonds.

Among the results intended by this amendment is to enable business to obtain anti-pollution equipment at lower cost and in some cases enable some businesses to obtain such equipment which could not otherwise be financed.

**S.J.R. No. 118**  
 "Shall Section 1, Article XX, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho, relating to how amendments may be proposed, be amended to strike the requirement that amendments shall be published for at least six consecutive weeks, and provide that amendments shall be published at least three times, such publication to provide arguments proposing and opposing the amendments?"

#### ATTORNEY GENERAL'S STATEMENT OF MEANING AND PURPOSE

**S.J.R. No. 118**  
 Senate Joint Resolution 118 is a proposed amendment to Section 1, Article XX of the Constitution of the State of Idaho, which would change the manner in which the legislature is required to publish the text of proposed constitutional amendments, and would add a new provision requiring the legislature to publish arguments for and against proposed amendments.

Section 1, Article XX of the Constitution of the State of Idaho presently requires the legislature to submit proposed constitutional amendments to the people for ratification at the next general election following the legislative session at which the amendment is proposed, and in connection therewith, to publish said amendments.

(1) For at least six consecutive weeks prior to the next general election; and  
 (2) In not less than one newspaper of general circulation published in each county in the state.

The proposed amendment would change the above stated requirements by providing that the legislature publish the text of proposed constitutional amendments, as well as arguments for and against such amendments:

(1) Three times, rather than "at least six times" prior to the next general election; and  
 (2) In all newspapers qualified to publish legal notices, rather than "in not less than one newspaper of general circulation published in each county of the state."

Section 60-106, Idaho Code, currently details the qualifications of a newspaper that may publish legal notices in Idaho.

The reports include home addresses, test scores, and anticipated college major and career intentions of the Commended students.

**Home Cookin' ...**

Mrs. Everett Robinson has generously shared two of her favorite recipes this week and having sampled much of her good cooking, I know they are good—so why not try them:

- Dilly Bread**
- 1 pkg. dry yeast
  - ¾ warm water
  - 1 C cottage cheese warm
  - 2 Tbl sugar
  - 1 Tbl butter
  - 1 Tbl minced onion flakes
  - 1 tsp dill seed
  - ¼ tsp salt
  - 1 unbeat egg
  - 2½ C flour
- Mix well and bake in well-greased bread pan at 350 degrees.

- Baked Doughnuts**
- 1½ C scalded milk
  - ½ cup shortening
  - 1½ tsp salt
  - ½ tsp cinnamon
  - 2 tsp nutmeg
  - 4½ C flour
  - 2 eggs
  - ¼ C warm water

Mix and raise as in bread dough, roll and cut with doughnut cutter, place on baking sheet; let raise and bake at 425 degrees for 10 minutes. Roll in sugar or glaze as desired.

### Economic Upturn Predicted by Bank Newsletter

Increases in Idaho employment, production, trade and personal income are anticipated in the fourth quarter of 1974.

This is the report of the quarterly First Security economic News Letter being distributed this week. It was announced by James Hoogland, Jr., Manager of Kendrick's First Security Bank of Idaho.

The News Letter reports that percentage increases from last year will be lower, but will continue above the national average. Declines in output in lumber and the mobile home industry are expected but should be offset in part by increases in food processing, apparel, electronics and household goods. Some increases in employment are expected primarily in the service industries, says First Security.

The publication reports that business conditions in Idaho for the first three quarters of 1974 have been good. Increases have been shown in employment, production and trade somewhat above the national average. Cash receipts from farm marketing through July were considerably above 1973 levels, due principally to increased receipts from the sale of crops.

Total employment in August at \$44,000 represents an increase of 2.7 per cent above last year. Nonagricultural wages and salary employment increased by 3.1 percent from one year ago. Total manufacturing employment was down slightly, while employment in the mining segments was above last year.

Cash receipts from farm marketing in the Gem State for the January-July period totaled \$692.2 million, an increase of 38.2 percent from the same period last year. Receipts for crops for the first seven months of 1974 amounted to \$431.1 million, or 68.5 percent above last year. Livestock and livestock product receipts totaled \$258.1 million, an increase of 6.29 percent.

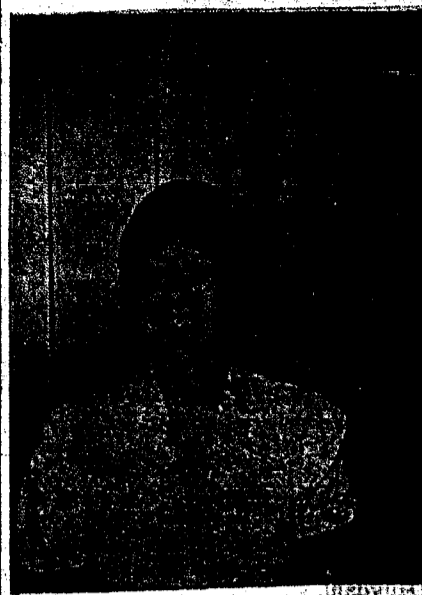
Silver production for the January-July period totaled eight million ounces, an increase of 6.5 percent from last year. Idaho's production of gold increased by 8.5 percent, but production of lead and zinc both decreased from last year.

Building permit construction authorized in Idaho's leading cities totaled \$141 million for the first eight months of 1974, an increase of 25.5 percent from one year ago. Value for residential construction was up 38 percent, while commercial and industrial construction was valued at \$43.8 million, or 13.6 per cent above last year.

Retail trade for fiscal 1974 in Idaho, reports the News Letter, totaled \$2.3 billion, an increase of 25 percent from the fiscal year ending June of 1973.

On the national scene, First Security said that economic uncertainty has continued to mount during the third quarter. No easy answers exist, says the News Letter, but it does seem clear that expanding productive capacity is necessary to alleviate the dilemma of shortages, recession and inflation.
