

Water Problems Occupied Juliaetta Council Meeting

The Juliaetta city council met Wednesday evening with Mayor Harold Freeman, Councilmen Art Boe, Fred Clomenhagen, and Eugene Taylor. Doug Johns was not present.

Lewisohn engineers from the firm of Hoffman, Fiske & Wyatt reported the recent results of the pumping of Juliaetta's third well. This well has been a continual concern for the city since the drilling had begun in July.

At first it was thought the well was a gas hole because of the periodic surging and air bubbles found in previous testing. However, with an installation of a smaller pump, there was no surging whatsoever. With the earlier tests, it is thought the well was overpumped causing bubbles of air and no gas at all.

This most recent test was done at a greater depth than before and was run on a continuous 24-hour, high-demand basis. The water capacity proved to be from 70 to 75 gallons a minute on a sustained flow.

Ridge Construction Company of Clarkston, whose bid was \$106,986 for the water distribution system, has begun to lay water pipe across the creeks and river. The completion date is set for this coming February.

The council also passed a loan resolution from FIA to issue bonds for the water and sewage project.

The council, along with consultant engineers, have set Thursday, Dec. 19, to open bids for the Juliaetta sewer system.

Open For Bids

Glenn Utzman, the city's legal advisor, reviewed with the council the first draft for Juliaetta's sewer ordinance. Some of the main points discussed were: the increase in water rates; penalty fees for delinquent bills; chemicals not to be released into the sewer lines so bacteria destruction in the treatment plant will not occur. They were particularly concerned with those chemicals found in mobile home disposal systems. And finally regardless of the council's decision on mandatory hook-up or not, those residents within 300 feet of the sewer line will be required to pay the yet-to-be-determined sewer bill.

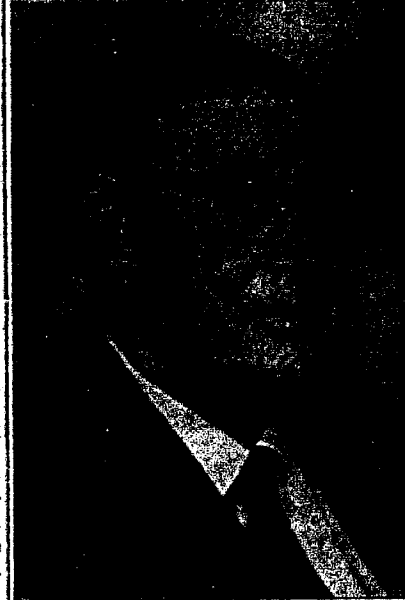
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Heart Attack Claims Hugh R. Parks, 73

Hugh R. Parks, 73, a life-long resident of Nez Perce County and active in agricultural affairs at the county and state level for most of his life, died at 11:20 Saturday night after suffering a heart attack at his home, 1811 Alder Ave., Lewiston.



Parks and his wife farmed 31 years on Potlatch Ridge near Kendrick before retiring and moving to Lewiston.

An active member of the Grange, Parks was a past and the present master of the Lapwai Valley Grange and served as a representative of the Grange of Idaho in the Idaho Legislature; 15 grandchildren and 17 more for several sessions.

He was a member of the Nez Perce County Fair Board and served three years as board president. He was also a past president of the Nez Perce County Wheat Growers Assn. He was active also in the Nez Perce County Soil Conservation District.

He was a member of the Lewiston Orchards Methodist Church and the Lewiston Elks lodge.

Parks was born April 23, 1901 at Peck, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ruth-erford B. Parks.

He married the former Katherine E. Hund at Leland, Feb. 12, 1922.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by two sons, Earle Parks, Coltonwood, and Byard Parks, Deary; two daughters, June Cedars, Pullman, and Ferol Oliver, Yakima, Wash.; 12 grandchildren and 17 great-grandchildren; two brothers, Homer and Harold, both of Kendrick.

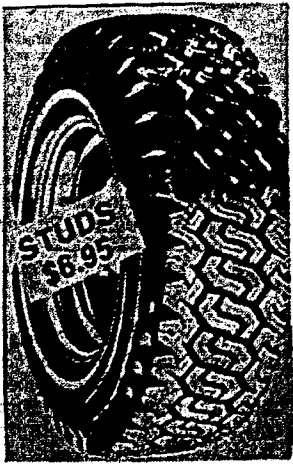

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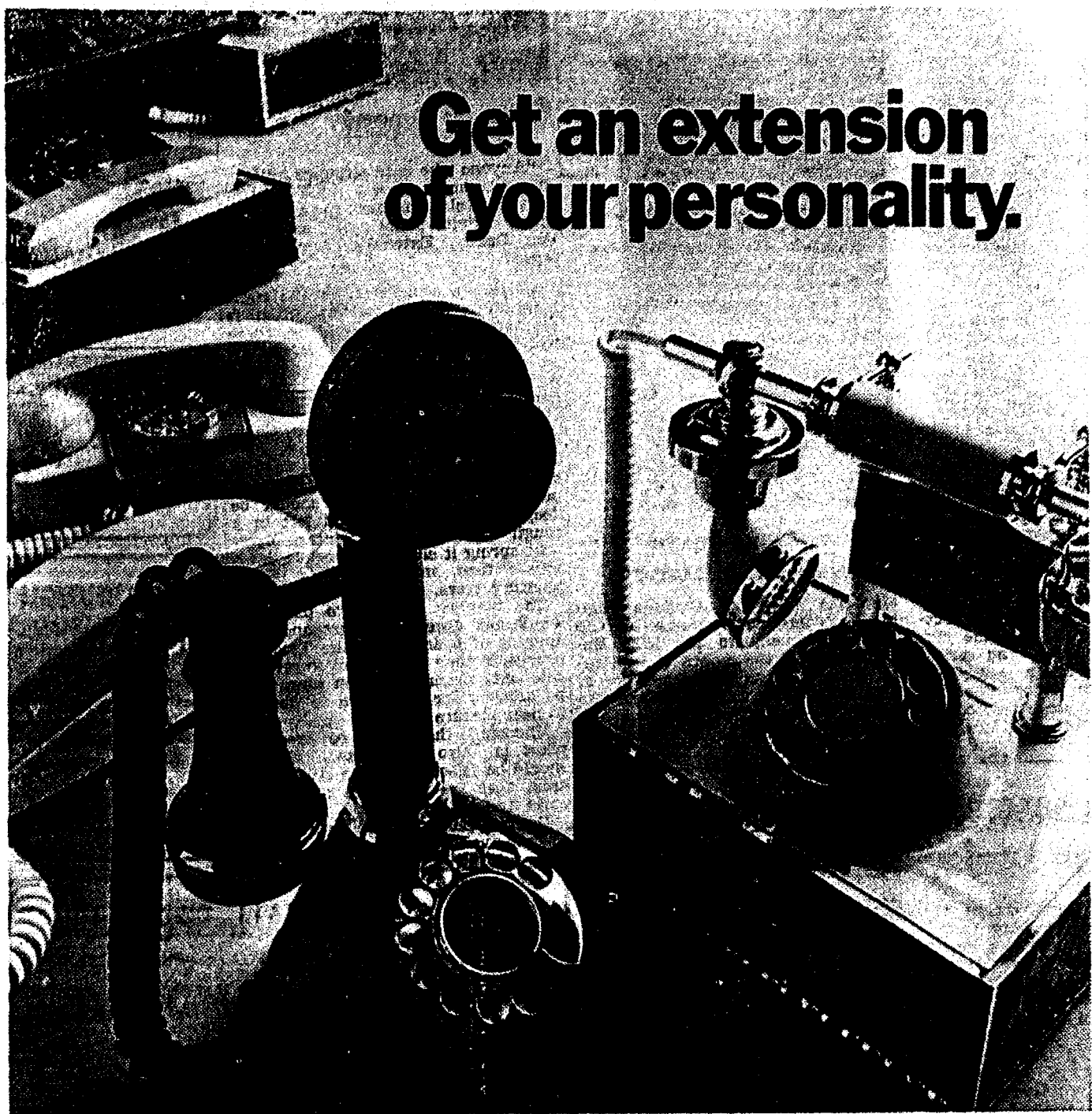

1 cup sugar
1 cup white Karo

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Plan '75 Tree Plants Now, Advises County Agent

"Anyone who is thinking of putting in a windbreak or any other kind of farm tree planting next spring should make definite plans now," says Gordon Dalley, Extension Agricultural Agent.

Getting a windbreak in the right location is quite important. If it is planted too close to the house, there will very likely be problems later such as unwanted snowdrifts in winter or a high temperature pocket in the summer.

"Take a close look at your planting site now," the agent cautioned. If the area to be planted is in pasture or hay, if it has volunteer alfalfa or perennial weeds, then it should be deep plowed this fall and left in a rough condition over winter. Early next spring it should be worked down into a firm, smooth seedbed before planting trees.

The number of rows to use in a windbreak depends in part upon the amount of space available. Trees do poorly if they become overcrowded. Adequate spacing between rows must be allowed for the trees to develop to near mature size.

Choosing the kinds of trees to plant is also important. Species should be selected that do well in this area, that are adaptable to our climate and soils.

Detailed help on planning tree plantings is available at the Latah County

Office of the University of Idaho Cooperative Extension Service.

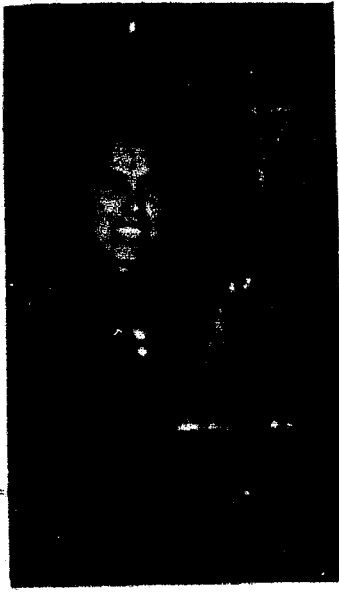

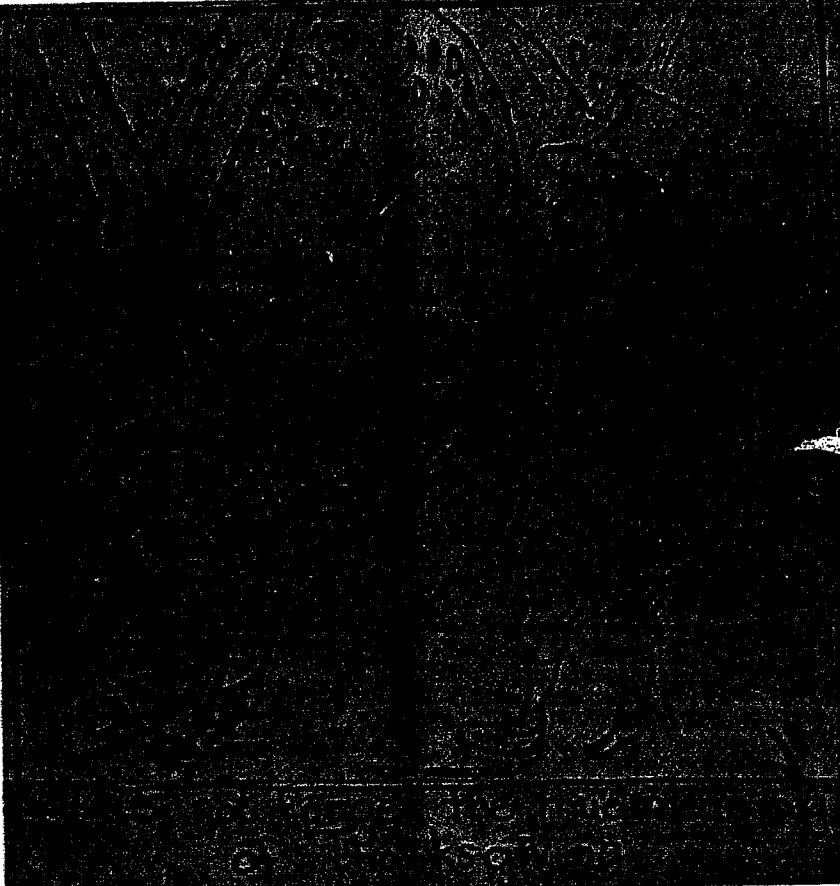
We are pleased to welcome Mrs. Hardie to KHS this year and we hope she finds her job here an enjoyable one.

Concessions Proposal
