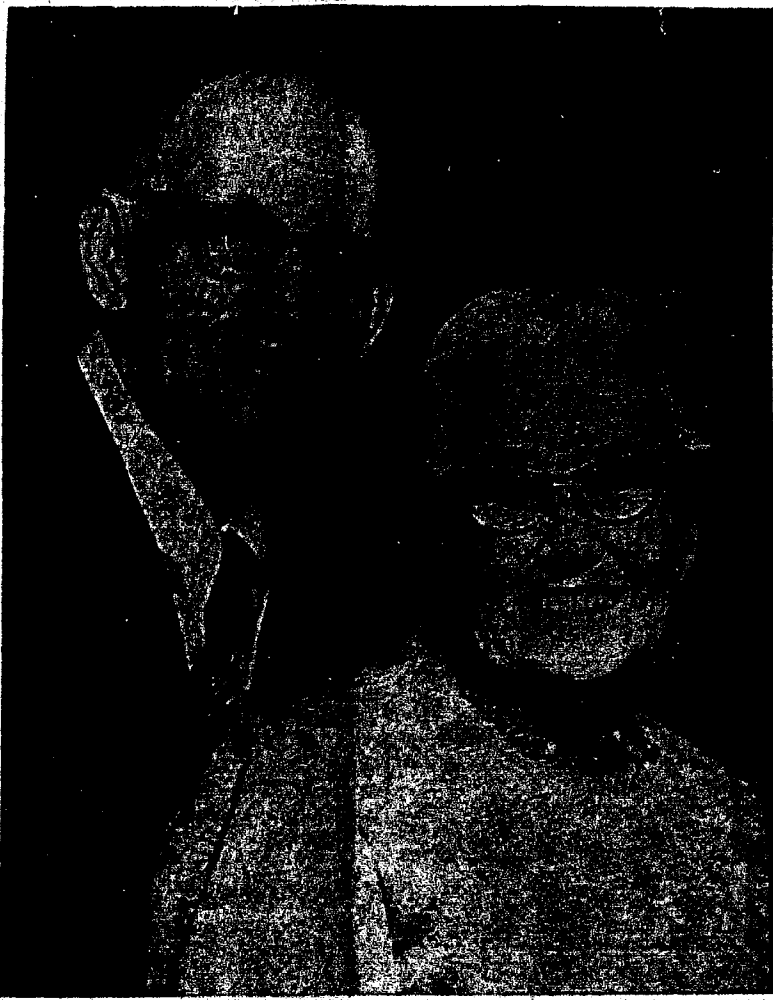

Hesitantly, Ozzie gave a probably starting lineup for the Grangeville game of Ralph Stout, Dan Stout, Doug Green, Pat Aherin and Pat Mervyn.

"I'm pretty well satisfied," Kanikkeberg said Tuesday afternoon, referring to the way his team was shaping up. "We're shooting pretty good but could use some more work on defense," he added. With three of his tentative starting five over 6 foot, the Bulldogs will be slightly taller than last year's version.

After the Grangeville game, the Bulldogs will meet the Lapwai Wildcats Dec. 6 in another home game and then go to Grangeville Dec. 7.

Ozzie said two rule changes were made this year. The first is that play calls are not required to raise their hands after being charged with a personal foul. The second is that in a jump-ball situation, the players may move after the ball leaves the official's hands, rather than having to wait until the ball is tapped.

## Tour Orient

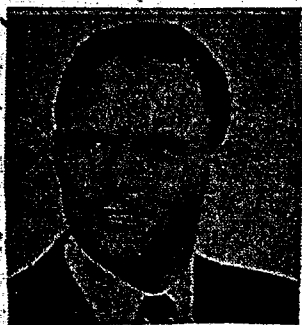

A tour of the Castle of the King of Siam was enjoyed—where most of the trim on the castle and buildings is done in pure gold.



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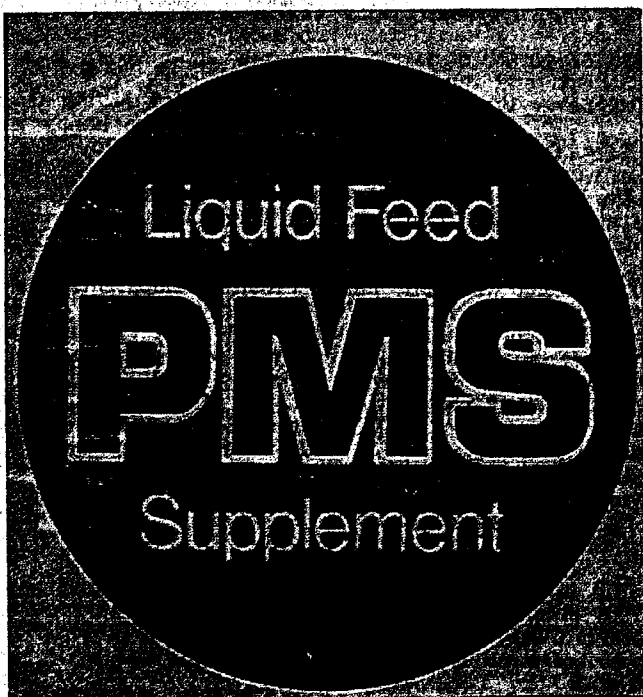
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## Cheryl Mayer Is Genesee Jr. Miss

### Butter Cookies

- 1 1/2 cup sifted powdered sugar
- 1 cup butter
- 1 egg
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1/2 tsp almond
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 1 tsp soda
- 1 tsp cream of tartar

Mix sugar and butter and egg and flavorings. Cream well. Sift flour, soda and cream of tartar. Add and mix well. Chill an hour in refrig. Roll out thin. Bake at 375 degrees until light brown (about 8 min.)

### Kromkaha (Cones)

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup cream (whipping)
- 4 eggs
- 3 tsp melted butter
- \* tsp salt
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 cups flour (about)

Separate eggs, beat yolks until light and lemon colored. Add sugar then cream butter, salt and flavoring. Add flour and then fold in stiffly beaten egg white. Bake on a cone iron (very hot). Roll as soon as they are taken off iron. Makes about 6 dozen.

- Lefse (Norwegian bread)
- 2 cups mashed potatoes (cold)
- 3 Tbs. butter
- 2 Tbs. milk
- 1/2 tsp salt

mix above three items; heat until butter melt and cool

2/3 cup flour  
Mix all together. Roll out on floured board (very thin). Bake on a grill at 450 degrees until brown, turn over and brown other side (a couple of minutes for each side).

- Sandcakes (Norwegian cookie)
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/2 cup lard
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 egg
- 1/2 sp salt
- 1 tsp vanilla or 1/2 vanilla and 1/2 almond

4 cups flour (about)  
Cream butter, lard and sugar, add egg and beat, add salt and flavoring. Add flour by hand. Pat in sandcake tins (thin), and bake at 375 degrees about 10 min. or until light brown. Cool completely and care must be taken to take cookies out of pan. Makes about 60.

- Broccoli and Rice Casserole
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 can Cream of Chicken Soup
- 2 T. margarine
- 2 C. cooked rice
- 2 pkgs. frozen chopped broccoli
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 lb. Velveta cheese

Saute onion in margarine. Add soup, milk and cheese. Heat and stir until cheese has melted. Fold in rice and add broccoli which has been thawed enough to break into pieces. Pour into greased casserole 13x9x2. Cover with slices of Velveta cheese and toasted almonds. Bake at 350 degrees for about 30 minutes until it is bubbly hot.

Serves 8-10 people generously. I use half of recipe for 4-6.

- Sea Food Salad
- 1 pkg. lemon Jello
- 1/4 C. boiling water
- 1/2 C. sour cream
- 1/2 C. salad dressing or mayonnaise
- 1 can chicken gumbo soup
- 1 can shrimp, crab or tuna
- 2 T. chopped celery
- 1 T. dehydrated onion
- 2 T. chopped green pepper or pimento

1. Dissolve Jello in boiling water. Stir in sour cream, mayonnaise and soup. Cool. When nearly set, add balance of ingredients. Serves 8. Very good luncheon salad.

### Buy Duck Stamps for Conservation

Non-hunter conservationists are being urged to purchase duck stamps to benefit wildlife conservation. Purchase of the \$5 stamp, which is required of all waterfowl hunters 16 years of age and over, puts that amount of money into the federal fund to purchase and develop wetlands for waterfowl resting, nesting and wintering.

Other wildlife benefits, too, since more than 160 species of birds, many mammals and fish are directly dependent on wetland habitat for their survival. Stamps may be purchased by anyone at post offices and at some sporting good stores.

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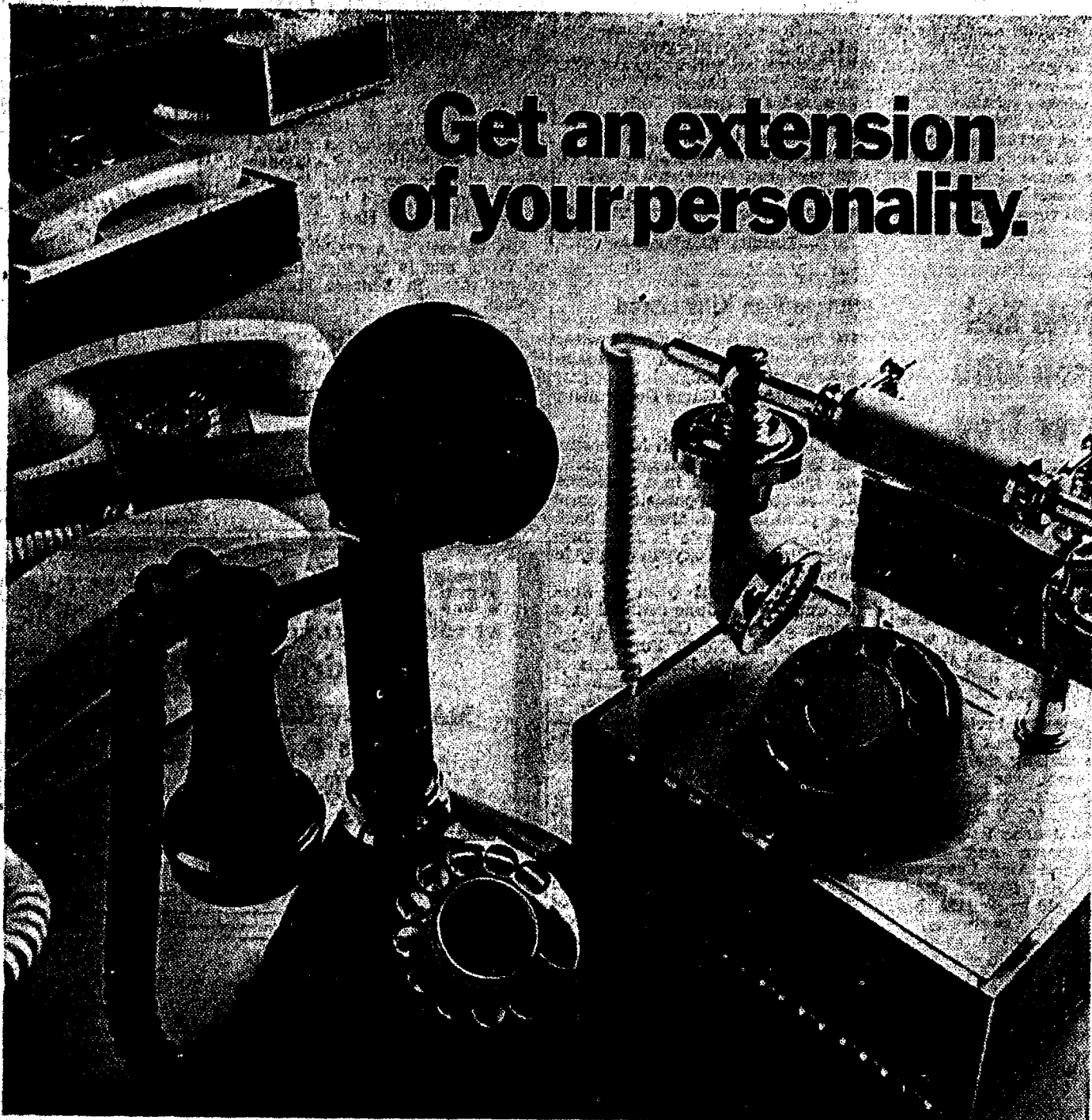

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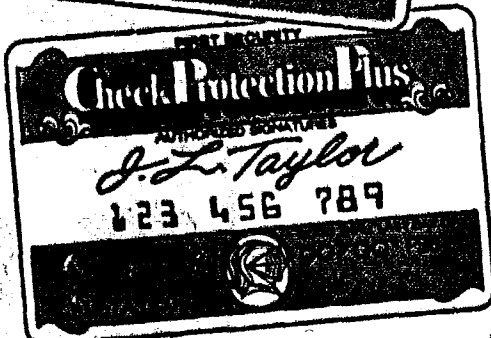


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### Calves Get 'Shots' Before Birth in UI Experiments

Moscow—Calves can be vaccinated or inoculated before birth through a surgical procedure developed by University of Idaho researchers.

Pioneering in the new procedure were Dr. William Cegnar, postdoctoral researcher and Dr. Erik Stauber, assistant professor of veterinary science in the College of Agriculture.

The two scientists said unborn calves were not harmed by the operation. Inoculation, made through the uterine wall and between the hooves of the fetus, proved to be 100 per cent effective.

"The surgical operation can be performed in only 15 minutes," Dr. Cegnar said. "Surgery is performed through the abdominal muscles of the pregnant cow's right flank. In our experiments, cows recovered rapidly after the simple operation."

The new procedure enable researchers to study unborn calves' susceptibility to various disease-causing agents. Other surgical methods which have been used to expose the fetus are more complicated, risky and time-consuming, Dr. Cegnar said.

"Without surgery, it is possible to inoculate the fetus by means of a needle inserted through the abdominal wall," he said. "However, because it is more difficult to accurately inoculate a small size fetus, this no-surgery method has limited effectiveness if used before the last month of pregnancy."

In the UI experiments, the veterinary surgeons used a "grid-type" entry—varying the angle of their incisions in each layer of muscles so that post-surgical healing would be speeded up.

Cegnar and Stauber reported the results of their research in a paper which is to be published in a scientific journal.

**Pollution Fish Kills Listed**

Five fish kills resulting from water pollution were recorded in Idaho from July, 1973, through June of this year, the Fish and Game Department reported today.

The largest known fish kill occurred on Benawah Creek in north Idaho where 4,000 fish died in a half-mile stretch of stream, apparently caused by log pond effluent. Decaying bark and other wood waste in log ponds severely deplete the oxygen supply in the water.

A derailed freight train in Shoshone County last June resulted in a chemical spill into Cliff Creek, a tributary of the North Fork of the St. Joe River. early 10000 gallons of aluminum sulfate and more than 16,000 gallons of caustic soda were released into the stream and dead brook trout and cutthroat trout were observed up o four and a half miles downstream.

A small fish kill occurred in Big Creek, also in Shoshone County, just below an antimony plant. Two fish kills were recorded in Ada County. One was the result of aquatic herbicide being used in an irrigation ditch and the other came about because of inadequate aeration due to low flow and ice cover below a Boise sewer plant.

The department said the overall fish kill was one of the lightest in recent years.

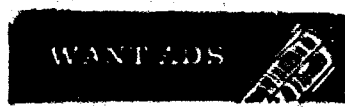

**Testing Feeds Called**

**Key To Dairy Products**

Moscow—To help dairymen stretch their winter feed supplies, the University of Idaho Cooperative Extension Service is encouraging analysis of feeds.

"Feed testing is a necessary first step in any program to provide the best ration at the least cost," said Edward Fiez, an extension dairy specialist headquartered at Caldwell.

"Extension workers will help farmers evaluate their rations," he continued, "but we would like to have accurate information on the feeds' nutritional content. A farmer can get these facts by taking samples of his feed to a commercial feed testing laboratory."

In laboratory tests, feed samples are analyzed for dry matter, protein, calcium and phosphorus.

Max Gardner, extension agricultural agent in Payette County, reports a countywide feed testing program is now in its third year of operation.

"In our program, all dairymen are invited to participate," Gardner said. "Feed samples are collected and sent to a laboratory. When the test results come back, I meet with each dairyman and discuss his total feeding operation. The program is succeeding because our dairy farmers know they can increase production by improving their rations."
