

Area Representatives Get Committee Assignments

District 7 State Legislators Senator Claud Judd and Rep. Lester Clemm and Carl Braum returned home Saturday after attending pre-legislative organizational meetings at the capitol in Boise from the previous Wednesday to Saturday.

Judd, newly elected to the State Senate, will be on Transportation, local government, taxation and agriculture committees.

Braum will serve on the House Agriculture and the State Affairs committees.

Clemm will serve on Resources and Conservation and Revenue and Taxation committees.

This organizational meeting is a "good thing" Judd said Monday. He said this type of meeting allows the legislators to get some coordination started prior to the actual convening of the legislature. It allows committee assignments to be made and some of the preliminary work to be accomplished so the elected officials can get to work with as little delay as possible.

"Sunshine Initiative"
The so-called "Sunshine Initiative," Judd said, which requires lobbyists to register with the state, does not include small groups like local school boards, grange chapters and the like and he added that he hoped the passage of this initiative does not prevent interested citizens from writing to legislators or visiting in Boise.

Tigers Open Hoop Season With Two Victories

Coach Bill LaMunyan's KHS Tiger basketball team opened the season last Friday night with a come-from-behind victory over the highly rated Kamiah Kubs and then traveled down to Timberline Saturday night to defeat the Spartans 63-59.

Kamiah Beaten 44-42
Kendrick took a first quarter lead in the opening game with Kamiah last Friday night, then fell behind and didn't catch up again until the final period of play as they won 44-42.

The Tigers had an 11-8 lead at the end of the first period; they managed only 8 points in the second quarter while Kamiah was racking up 14 to lead 22-19 at the half.

The lead saw-sawed back and forth in the final quarter with Kendrick's sagging man-to-man defense holding the big Kamiah team's scoring down. Coach LaMunyan said free throws made the difference with Kendrick hitting 56 per cent while the Kubs could manage only 33 per cent from the line.

Kelly Clemenzen and Ken Brown each scored 12 points to pace the winners. Other scoring was: Mike Boe 3, Tim Eichner 6, Paul Hutcherson 5, Earl Lawrence 2, Don Benjamin 2 and Doug Craig 2.

In a thrilling double-overtime game the Kendrick JV's won the opening game 36-35 on Doug Sillow's three-point play.

Win Over Timberline
Saturday night the Tigers were at Timberline and took a 63-59 victory after another close, hotly contested match.

Paced by the 21 points of Kelly Clemenzen, the Tigers tightened up their defense and rallied for 18 points in the third period while holding Timberline to just 9 to overcome a 34-26 half-time deficit. Kendrick poured in 19 more points in the final period of play.

Kendrick scoring: Clemenzen 21, Ken Brown 11, Tim Eichner 10, Mike Boe 6, Paul Hutcherson 9, Earl Lawrence 2, Don Benjamin 2 and Doug Craig 2.

Doug Sillow and Vern Ekner each scored 10 points to lead the Kendrick JV's to a 40-36 overtime win. Doug Lohman's two free throws led the victory for the young Tigers.

Friday the Tigers will travel to Potlatch and then return home to host the Lapwai Wildcats Saturday night.

A free-will offering to cover expenses will be taken.

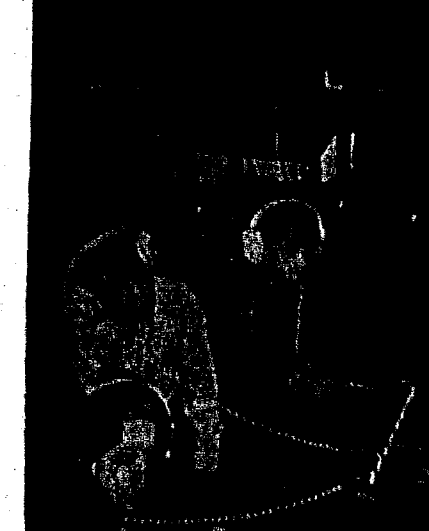
Final practice for the cantata will be held at 7 Sunday evening in the multi-purpose room.

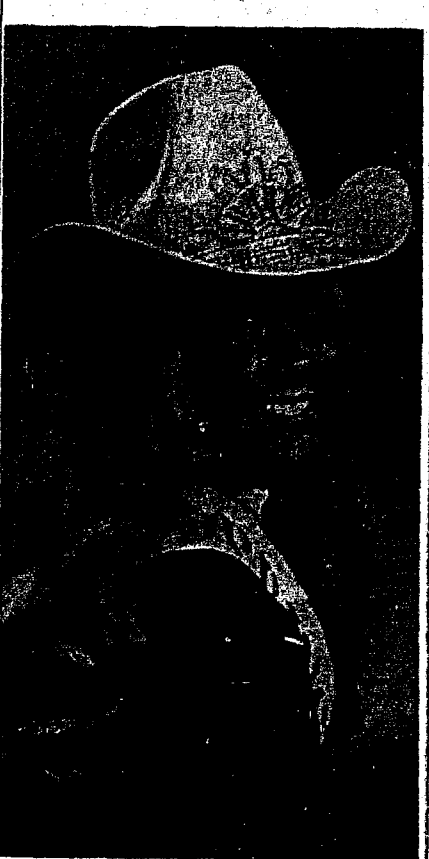
Bret Gertje scored 7 points for the Kendrick team.

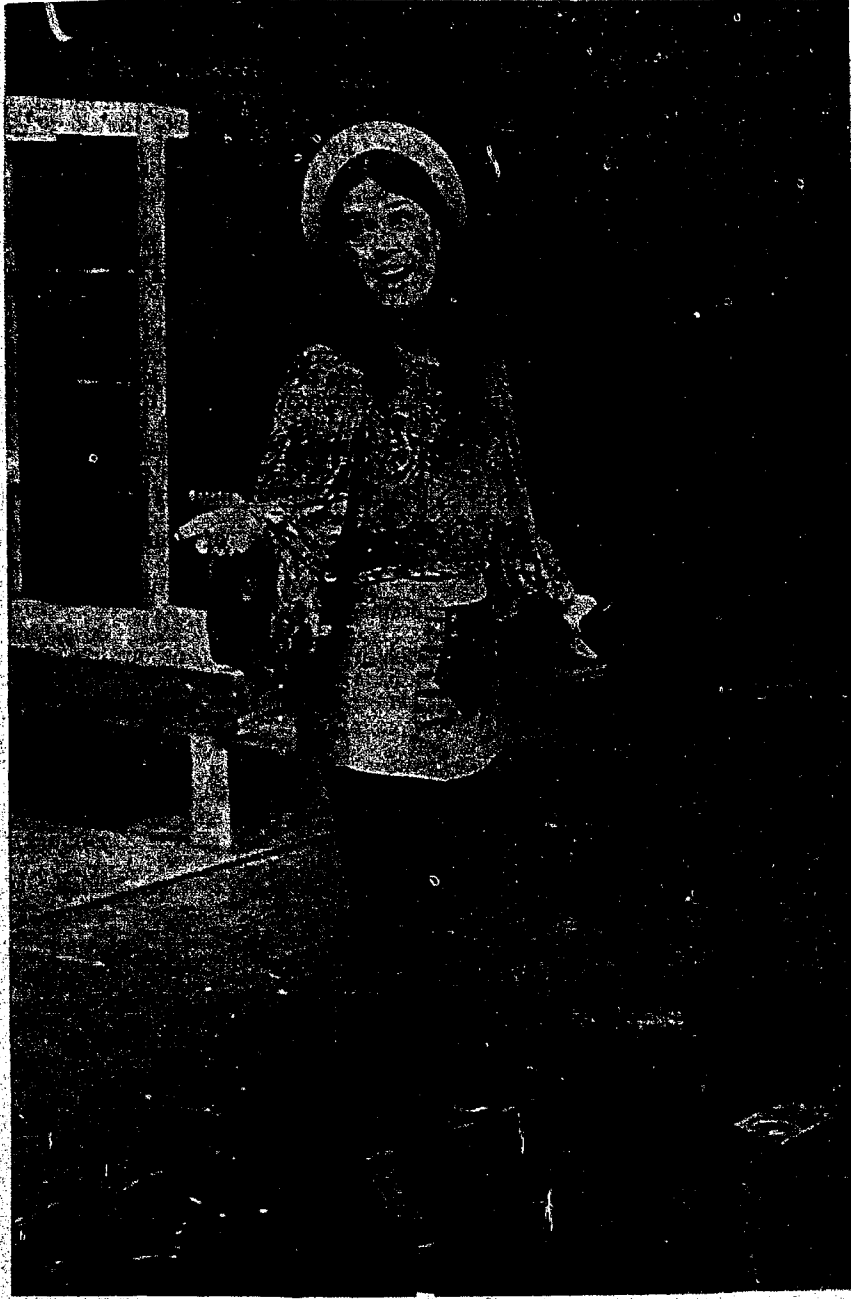

Home Cookin'...
Mrs. Stanton Becker has so generously shared these recipes with us this week. They are both the kind the grandchildren come to, Grandma's hoping to find. The meat balls are both economical and delicious.

Three Layer Cookies
1 c. shortening
1/2 c. white sugar
1 c. brown sugar
2 eggs, separated
1 T. cold water
1 tsp. vanilla
2 c. flour
1 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. salt
1 pkg. chocolate chips

Cream shortening, sugar—egg yolks, vanilla and water. Sift dry ingredients together and add. Spread in greased 8x13 pan. Pat out smoothly. Sprinkle top with chips. Top with beaten egg whites and 1/2 cup brown sugar. Bake 25 minutes 375 degrees. Cut in squares.

Sweet and Sour Meat Balls
Mix together—1 lb. hamburger—with crumbs—eggs, onion and salt. Shape into balls, brown slightly. Put in flat casserole. Pour over following mixture.
1/2 c. white sugar
2 T. flour
1/2 cup vinegar
6 T. water
4 tsp. prepared mustard.
Oven 350 degrees. Bake covered 35 minutes. Uncover last 10 minutes, if too tart cut down on vinegar (as desired).

Overseas Trip Planned By German Club

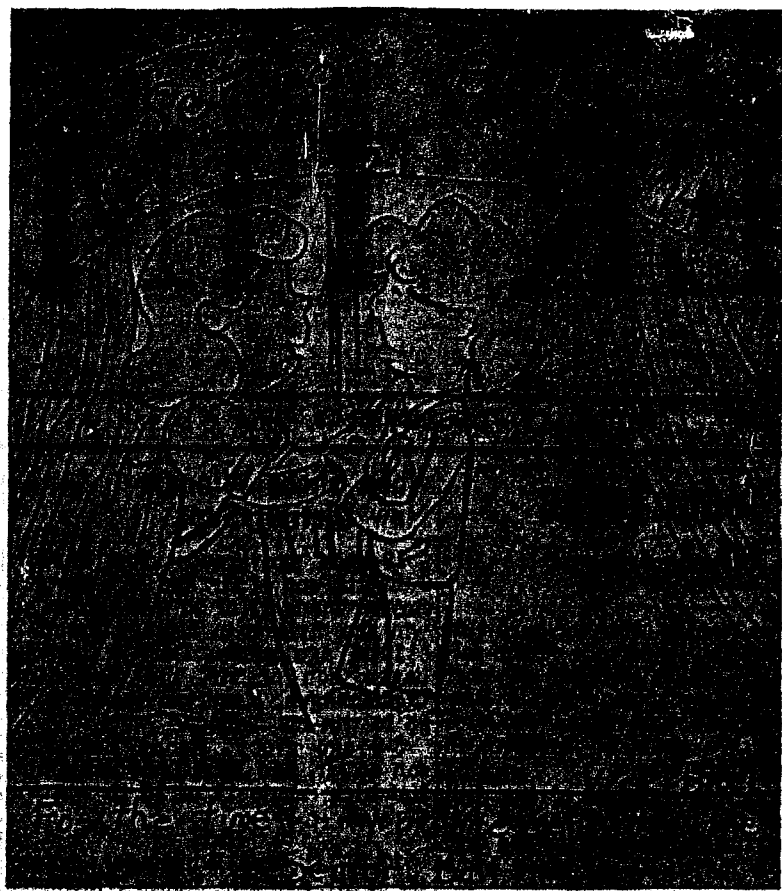

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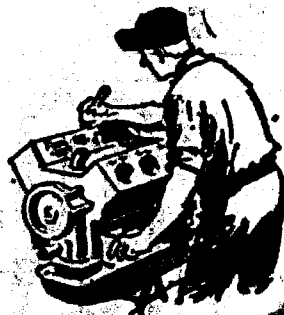
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HIGHWAY MAINTENANCE MATERIAL IN SHORT SUPPLY

Anti-freeze — The Division of Highways received only one bid at a price of \$4.05 per gallon.

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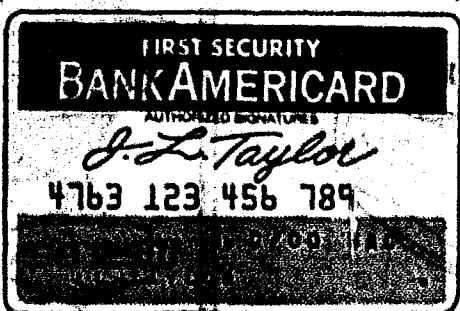
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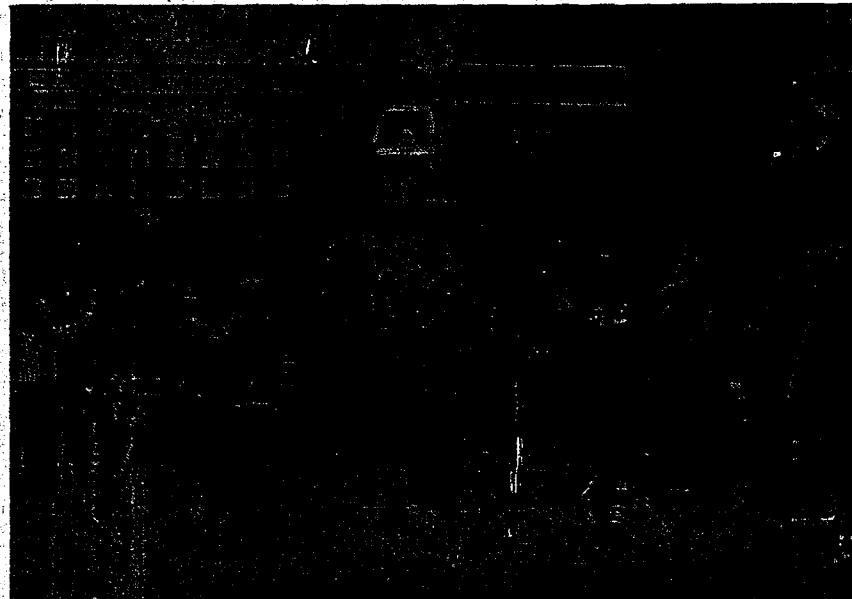
