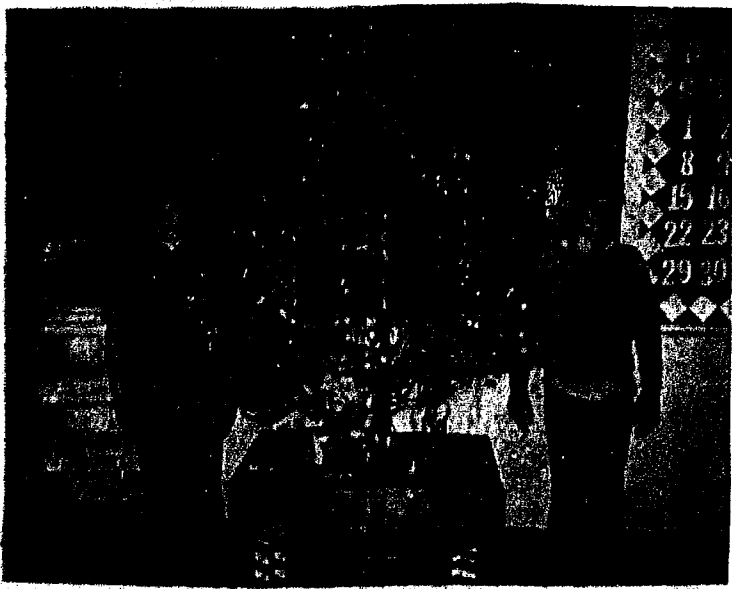


Jay and Jim Bailey Donated 3rd Grade Christmas Tree—

**Potlatch Nips Tigers; KHS Upsets Lapwai**

Kendrick's surprising Tiger basketball team won and lost in hoop action this past week. Friday night they traveled to Potlatch and were defeated by a single point 76-75. The next night the Tigers hosted the No. 1 ranked team in the state, Lapwai, and defeated the Wildcats by a convincing 54-38 score.

**Potlatch Wins**  
Coach Bill LaMunyan wasn't happy with the defensive effort of his Tigers against the Potlatch Loggers Friday night. "It was free throw shooting and poor defense that beat us," LaMunyan said later. It was a wide open high scoring game and the Tigers saw an 11-point lead disappear in the fourth quarter. LaMunyan said the Potlatch pressing defense in the final frame didn't bother his team too much, but Nicholson of the Loggers, hit five long jump shots which really hurt KHS.

The Loggers used a four-man zone and a man-to-man on Kendrick ace Kelly Clemenhagen which cut Kelly's output to 6 points. But freed the other team to score more. Ken Brown took advantage of the situation to rack up 19 points.

Kendrick shot a respective 54 percent from the field but LaMunyan wasn't pleased with the 92 shots his Tigers allowed Potlatch to try. Kendrick scoring: Ken Brown 20, Mike Boe 11, Kelly Clemenhagen 6, Tim Eichner 5, Paul Hutchison 15, Mike Silflow 9, Earl Lawrence 4, Bob Phlips 1 and Doug Craig 7.

Kendrick won the JV game 57-51 behind the 17-point effort of Doug Silflow.

The Tigers knocked over defending champions Kamiah in the first game of the season and then Saturday night took another big win as they upset the highly regarded Lapwai Wildcats 54-38 before a happy hometown crowd. The Tigers never trailed as they brought their record to 3-1 on the season.

"Fantastic defense," was the way Coach LaMunyan sized up the game Tuesday morning. Kendrick's tight defense allowed the Lapwai team only 4 of 20 attempted field goals in the first half. the work of Mike Boe, who held McNair of the Wildcats to a single field goal in the first half.

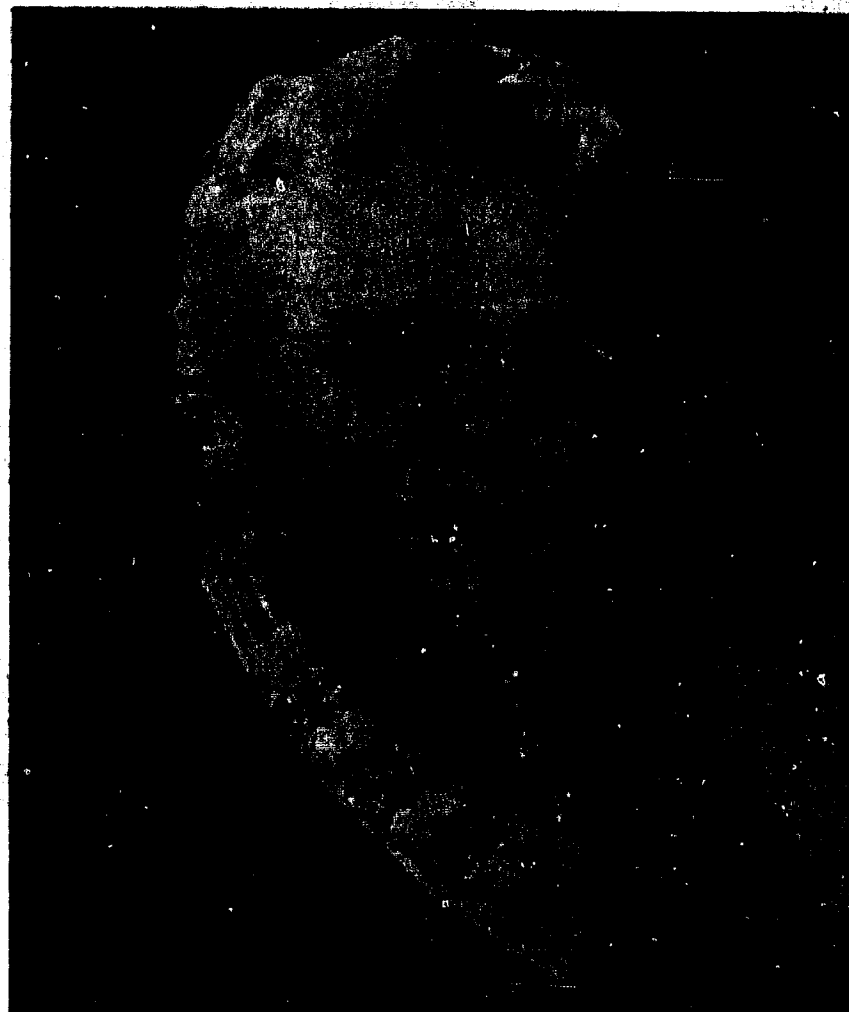
Kendrick, despite its small size, controlled the backboards with Tim Eichner picking off 13 rebounds in the game for the Tigers.

A LITTLE OVER 1900 YEARS AGO, the Apostle Paul wrote these words to the people in the church which he founded in the city of Corinth. Without his leadership, these early followers had wavered in their ability to hold the eternal flame of belief, hope and love that remain as the Lord's gift to mortal man and the strong heart of the Christian faith. Their problem was, in some ways, little different from that which many face today. Corinth in the year 50 A.D. was a city of 500,000, a provincial capital of the Roman Empire, a strategic center of trade and commerce, a melting pot of races, colors, pagan religions and creeds. The people were proud of their worldly accomplishments, their culture and their power. They were involved in their businesses but indulgent in their pleasures, vices and dissolute way of living.

The Apostle Paul took the saving Gospel of Christ into this hostile setting; and, with the power and faith and Christian love, he brought the light of the Lord's teachings into the lives of those whose minds and hearts were open. For all who seek, the same redemptive light burns today. It glows with living warmth as the ennobling spirit of this holy season turns the thoughts of men and women the world over to the Son of God in his letter to his confused and sometimes quarrelsome flock, the Apostle Paul sought to give understanding of the central core of Christ's teaching—that to follow in His footsteps one need only have within him the power of charity or Christian love.

Without this, no amount of prayer, or sacrifice, or religious ritual counts for any more than " . . . sounding brass, or a tinkling cymbal." Christian love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things and endures all things. It can live in man, and it is the spiritual body of the Lord. Now, as in the beginning, it is the world's best and only hope. This Christmas may it enter you and be with you for all time.

**Assembly of God Christmas Program December 22**

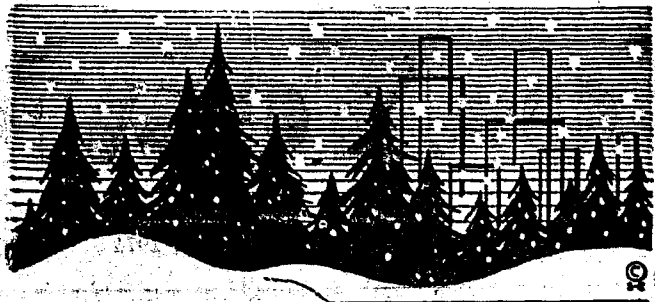

On the morn before winter, the last night of fall.

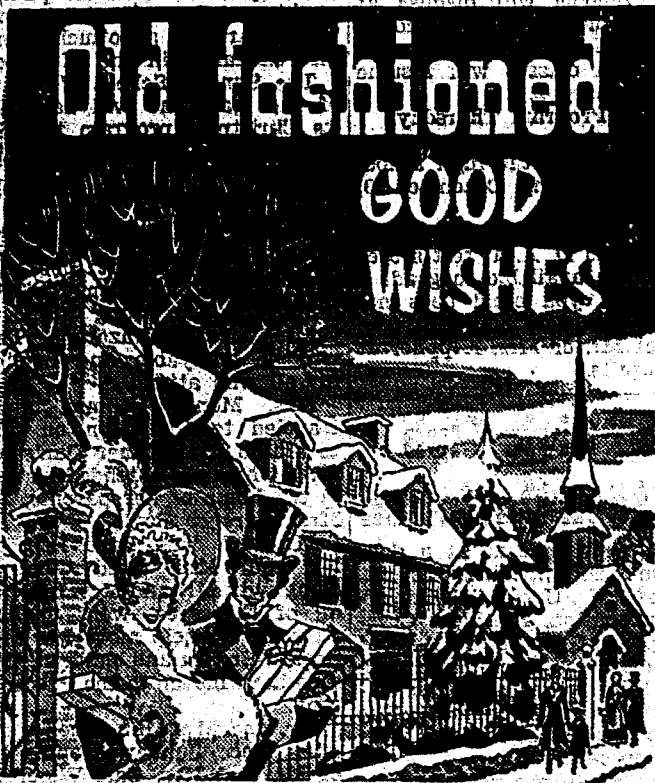

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 186

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 148 PROHIBITING DOGS FROM RUNNING AT LARGE ANY TIME OF THE YEAR.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO:

SECTION 1. The first sentence of Section 5, Ordinance No. 148, is hereby amended to read as follows: No owner or keeper of any dog shall permit such dog to run at large within the corporate limits of the City of Juliaetta at any time of any year, whether licensed or unlicensed.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and first publication thereof.

PASSED under suspension of rules upon which the roll call vote was duly taken and duly enacted an ordinance of the City of Juliaetta at a regular meeting of the City Council held on December 10, 1974.

**Protection of Farm Crops Topic of UI Seminar**

For agricultural fieldmen and the others who work at controlling weeds, insects and plant diseases, the University of Idaho is scheduling a five-day seminar in Boise in January.

The January 20 to 24 event will be held in the Student Union Building at Boise State University. Qualifying students will receive one semester-hour of UI credit for studies at the plant protection seminar.

Dr. Lambert Erickson, professor of weed science, said the teaching faculty will include College of Agriculture specialists and other experts from government and industry.

"Protection of our crops has become an extremely complicated subject," Erickson said. "It involves environmental regulations and legal problems as well as the basic scientific aspects of plant biology and ecology. All of these topics will be reviewed at the seminar."

Numerous changes in regulations and recommended procedures have occurred since a similar seminar was held a year ago in Moscow, he added.

"It is essential that every person working in the plant protection field keep up to date with the new developments," the UI professor emphasized.

Specialized workshops at the seminar will deal with plant diseases, identification of insects and weeds, plant nutrition and the planning of pest management programs. Speakers will discuss pesticide chemistry, safety, insurance, weather forecasting and plant physiology.

At the conclusion of the training seminar, certificates of competence will be issued to qualifying students. Each student will pay a \$30 fee for the week-long event.

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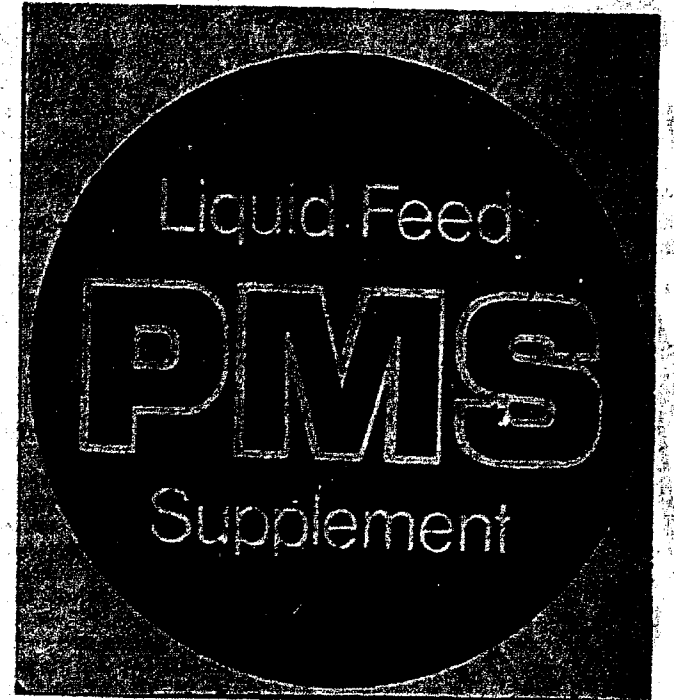


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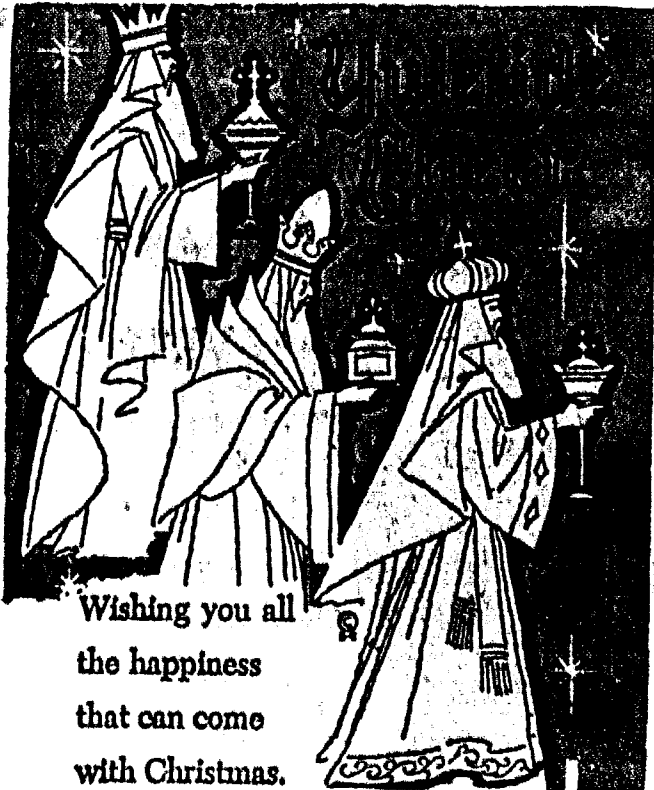

## Adequate Food Supply Heart of Game Management

Most Idaho wildlife species of animals either fatten up in the fall and hibernate or migrate long distances to less harsh environments.

Animals bent on hibernating seek out niches in hollow trees or other

protected places and retire for the winter. Ground squirrels, for example, slow down respiration and heart rate drastically, metabolism drops a hundredfold, and body temperatures hover just above freezing. Months later, at the first hint of spring, the whole process is reversed. In a few hours the hibernator awakens—a bit thinner than before, but otherwise none the worse for his long season in cold storage.

The degree of hibernation varies greatly with the species and climate, from the "twilight sleep" of bears to completely torpid hibernation of six months.

A third group of animals neither migrates nor hibernates. This group includes both birds and mammals. One of the most hardy winter residents of Idaho is the ring-necked pheasant. This bird can survive ten days or more of severe winter weather without food. Adult pheasants have survived 35 days of average winter weather without food without losing their ability to fly and take care of themselves.

Deer migrate relatively short distances (but sometimes up to 70 miles) moving from summer to winter ranges where browse plants are not entirely covered by snow and where temperatures are not so hostile. They turn more and more toward the browse or "woody" plants more commonly called brush.

The breeding season and migration period normally occur over the same time span. This is one of the most crucial periods of the year for bucks. The change from a state sexual inactivity to one of total sexual activity during a period of a few weeks, is a great physiological strain on the animal.

During the rut, bucks are "off their feed" and may go several days without any food at all. They burn up energy, during their wanderings, and fat reserves are depleted. Without fat reserves, bucks often become "winter kills."

These animals live in many places under many conditions. Within certain limits, they are highly adaptable.

A single deer, for example, must adapt to a variety of situations during the course of a year. He will survive and thrive as long as there is an adequate supply of food and cover. High quality food and cover is the key to deer management.

A slight reduction in the number of workers continuing claims was also noted. This was pronounced in the Troy-Deary-Bovill area where some logging operations resumed during

the week. Little change is expected in the local employment picture during the next two or three weeks.

## Adequate Food Supply Heart of Game Management

Most Idaho wildlife species of animals either fatten up in the fall and hibernate or migrate long distances to less harsh environments.

Animals bent on hibernating seek out niches in hollow trees or other

protected places and retire for the winter. Ground squirrels, for example, slow down respiration and heart rate, drastically; metabolism drops a hundredfold, and body temperatures hover just above freezing. Months later, at the first hint of spring, the whole process is reversed. In a few hours the hibernator awakens—a bit thinner than before, but otherwise none the worse for his long season in cold storage.

The degree of hibernation varies greatly with the species and climate, from the "twilight sleep" of bears to completely torpid hibernation of six months.

A third group of animals neither migrates nor hibernates. This group includes both birds and mammals. One of the most hardy winter residents of Idaho is the ring-necked pheasant. This birds can survive ten days or more of severe winter weather without food. Adult pheasants have survived 35 days of average winter weather without food without losing their ability to fly and take care of themselves.

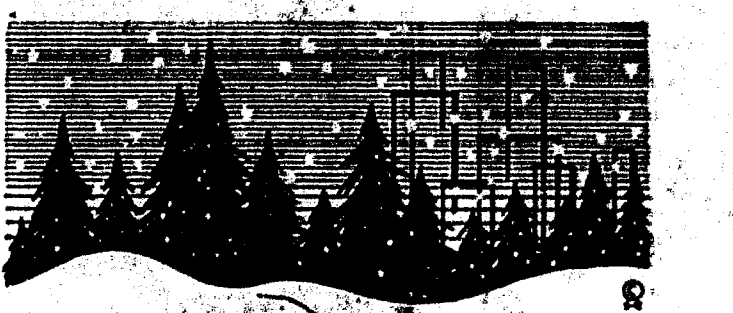

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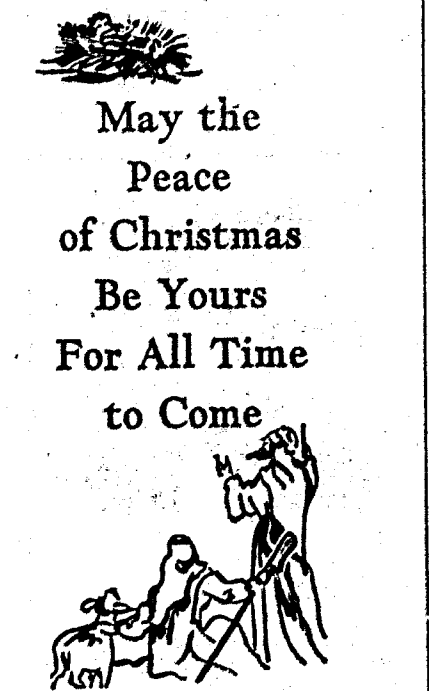

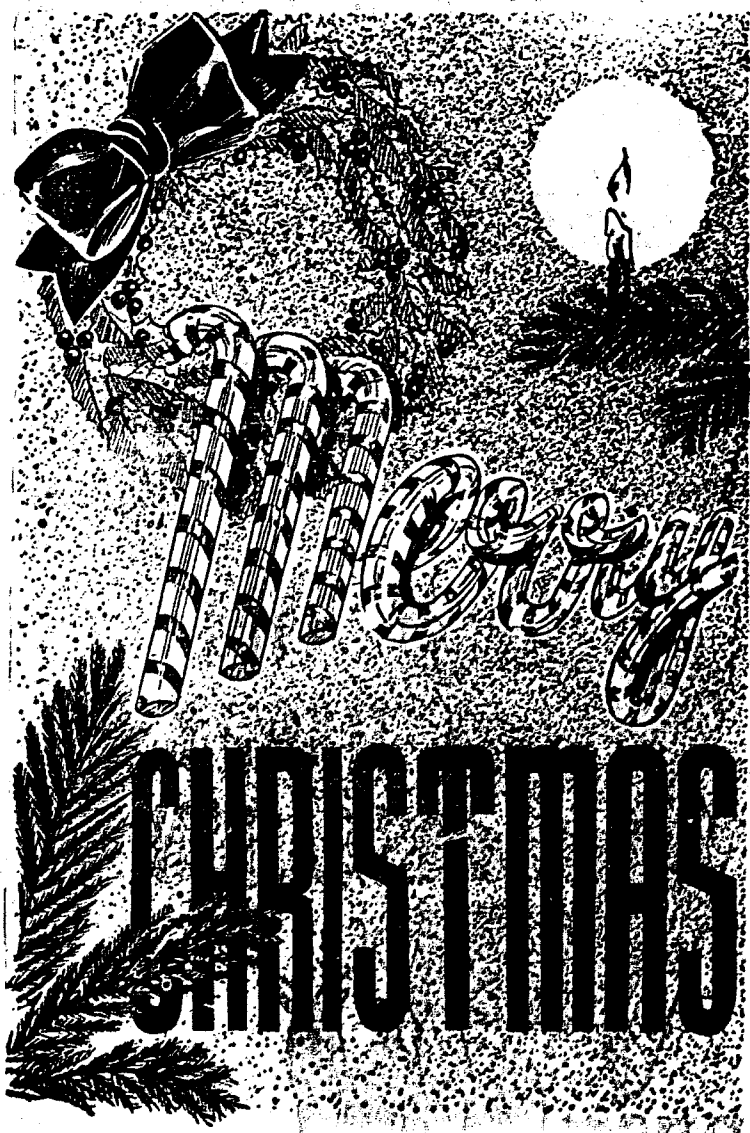

baugh explained. Approval of the extension plans and arrangements was given in the December 3 monthly meeting of the Society Trustees, following recommendations of the Project Advisory Committee on December 2. Project leader Sam Schrage reported to committee members Lola Clyde, Mrs. Grace Wicks, Melvin Alsager, Leora Stillinger, Lillian Otness and Kenneth Platt that 168 hours of interviews already have been taped from 89 people. From these interviews, 56 hours of typed transcripts have been recorded. Further transcript typing is being done for the project by the Idaho Bicentennial office in Boise, Schrage said.

A list of 62 additional names of "priority" informants recommended for interviews was presented by Schrage, who noted that the project could well run for another full year if funds permitted. Original funding was from a Bicentennial grant of \$5,750 which was matched by local donations to launch the project in July of 1973. Emphasis from now until the end of the project will be on recording the stories of as many of the remaining priority informants as can be interviewed.

Upon completion of the project, all tapes and transcripts will be duplicated in Boise for the State Historical Society. The originals will be filed at the McConnell Mansion, Moscow, as property of the Latah County Museum Society, Ashbaugh explains. They will be available at both locations for future references by students, writers and other interested persons. A project directory giving indexes and summaries of subject matter, to facilitate use of the materials, is being prepared by Schrage for filing with them.

Recognition of the project and its leadership came last September in the form of an invitation to Mr. Schrage to be principal speaker at a regional conference on oral history techniques in British Columbia. A recent letter from J. Meredith Neal, state director of the Bicentennial fund, has described the Latah County oral history project as "the most successful in Idaho and one of the best in the Western States."

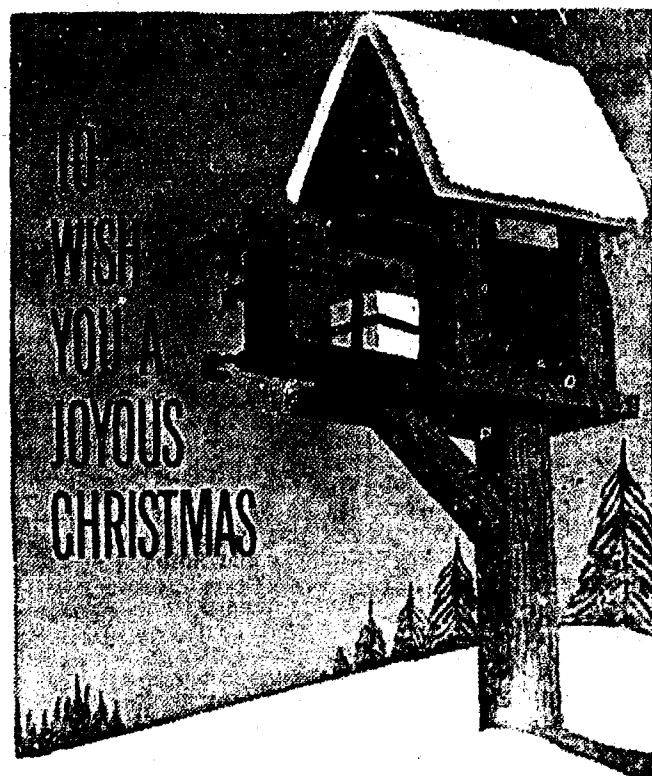
The Museum Society does not plan a drive for further funds to continue the project, Ashbaugh states, but will welcome additional donations if given. Such donations would be tax deductible, he said.

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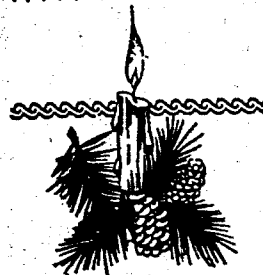
