

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 186

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING OR-DINANCE NO. 148 PROHIBITING DOGS FROM RUNNING AT LARGE ANY TIME OF THE YEAR.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIABITA, IDAHO:

SECTION 1. The first sentence of Section 5, Ordinance No. 148, is hereby amended to read as follows: No owner or keeper of any dog shall permit such dog to run at large within the corporate limits of the Ciy of Juliaetta at any time of any year, whether licensed or unlicensed. SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and first publication thereof.

Protection of Farm Crops Topic of **UI Seminar**

For agricultural fieldmen and the others who work at controlling weeds insects and plant diseases, the University of Idaho is scheduling a five-day seminar in Boise in January.

The January 20 to 24 event will be held in the Student Union Building at Boise State University, Qualifying students will receive one semester-hour of UI credit for studies at the plant protection seminar,

Dr. Lambert Erickson, professor of

Dr. Lambert Erickson, professor of weed science, said the teaching faculty will include College of Agriculture specialists and other experts from government and industry.

"Protection of our crops has become an extremely complicated subject," Erickson said. "It involves environmental regulations and legal problems as well as the basic scientific aspects of plant biology and ecology. All of these topics will be reviewed at the seminar."

Numerous changes in regulations and recommended procedures have occurred since a similar seminar was held a year ago in Moscow, he added. "It is essential that every person working in the plant protection field keep up to date wish the new developments," the UI professor emphasized.

Specialized workshops at the semi-nar will deal with plant diseases, idnar will deal with plant diseases, identification of insects and weeds, plant nutrition and the planning of pest management programs. Speakers will discuss pesticide chemistry, safety, insurance, weather forecasting and plant physiology.

At the conclusion of the training seminar cartificates of commetence.

seminar, certificates of competence will be issued to qualifying students. Each student will pay a \$30 fee for

the week-long event.
