Weather Adds To Area Unemployment

8 Latah Co. workers were given job finding help during the past week through the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager, reported that this was two more than the 4 placed on jobs during the previous week, although it was fewer than the 8 sent to work during the same week a year ago. As 1974 draws to a close, Hartstein said his office had 6 jobs on hand, compared with 15 at the end of 1973.

Hartstein felt that jobs would be somewhat hard to come by for a while but laid the blame more on the weather than serious economic problems in this area.

Seasonal layoffs in the lumber industry accounted for a good share of the 121 persons who filed new claims for unemployment insurance during the week. Some operations were curtailed because of weather, while others were closed down because of the holidays. The soft lumber market undoubtedly contributed to the decision to curtail in some instances. The total number of persons now seeking jobless pay rose to 498 compared with 443 last week and 424 a year ago. In the immediate Moscow area, there are a total of 179 active claims compared with 184 last week, and 234 a year ago. At Potlatch, the total is up to 115 compared with 79 a week ago and 74 last year. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area, there are now 163 persons seeking jobless pay up from last week's 148 and nearly double last year's 84. At Genesee, the totals are 13, 15 and 17 and in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area, the totals are 28, 17 and 15.

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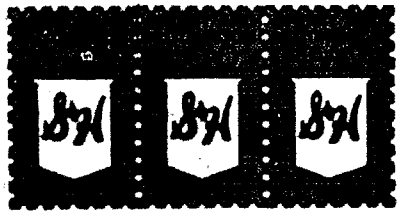

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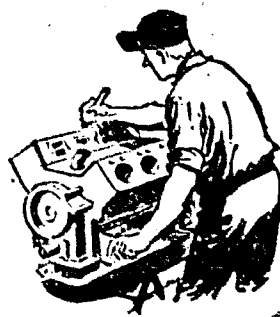

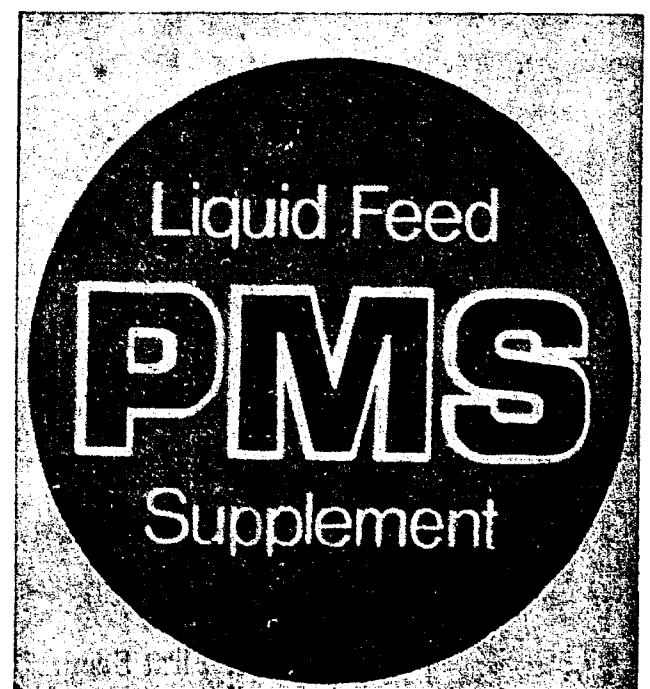

The pea leaf weevil threatens pea and lentil production in the Palouse. Pea leaf weevil control measures being explored by University of Idaho researchers in the College of Agriculture: identifying problem fields early, proper timing of treatments, and use of chemicals other than DDT.

Research on range plants and their effects on rangeland increases knowledge of their importance. It has been learned, for instance, that harvester ants consume up to 10 per cent of the range plants in some areas. Using that and other information from research, control programs can be developed to improve Idaho's range pastures for wildlife and livestock.

**Vendors Receive
Fishing Regulations**

Supplies of fishing regulations for resident species for the 1975 calendar year are being distributed to some 600 license vendors throughout the state. Fishing seasons for seagoing chinook salmon and steelhead trout will be covered in a separate pamphlet to be distributed in January. There are no winter or spring seasons for steelhead. The first opening will be in September. It will be "business as usual" for chinook salmon unless the run develops problems before it reaches the Idaho waters.

General fishing season for lakes, reservoirs and sloughs of Area 1 (the Kootenai, Pend Oreille and Spokane river drainages) is May 3 to November 30; and for streams and rivers, May 24 to October 31, except for local variations noted by name in the regulations.

The general statewide fishing season is May 24 to November 30, except for local exceptions specified in the regulations.

Fishing seasons and bag limits for resident species will be about the same as 1974 except for local change such as those affecting Roseworth, Little Wood and other special ice fishing waters, beginning on January 1. Waters open for year-round angling can be fished in December as soon as ice conditions permit.

Thorn Creek Reservoir north of Gooding will not be open for fishing through the ice this year because of unsafe ice conditions. Aerator equipment has been installed recently to pump air through a long, perforated hose on the reservoir bottom. Air bubbles rising to the surface will prevent an ice cover from forming, allowing an exchange of oxygen at the surface.

The department anticipates that winter fish kills may be prevented by keeping a portion of the reservoir free from ice.

**General Telephone Rates
Will Show Decrease; Tax Off**

These days it seems prices everywhere are going up, but telephone customers will notice a slight decrease in their telephone bills beginning January 1, 1975, a General Telephone Co. of the Northwest spokesman said today.

A "temporary" wartime tax on telephone service that began in the 1940's as an emergency measure will drop from 8 per cent to 7 per cent to meet the provisions of the Excluse, Estate, and Gift Tax Adjustant Act of 1970.

The tax, collected for the government by telephone companies, stood at 10 per cent until the act went into effect in January 1972. It will be reduced one per cent a year until completely erased in December 1982.
