

Wm. E. Kauder, Idaho's Oldest Citizen, Dead at 106

William E. Kauder, 106, one of the oldest, if not the oldest citizen of Idaho, died Thursday, January 30, at 1:35 p.m. at the Lewiston Convalescent Center. A retired Southwick farmer, he had lived in that area from about 1891 until a year ago when he was taken to the Lewiston nursing home.

"Uncle Billy" was born December 12, 1868, at Quincy, Illinois, when Andrew Johnson was the 17th president of United States, just three years after the death of Abraham Lincoln and the end of the Civil War. The Nez Perce Indian War was still nine years in the future when this son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Kauder was born. His father, a veteran of the recently ended Civil War, had a bad heart, so his son remained with the family until both parents died. The Kauders lived for a time in Missouri and Iowa, then they moved west

in 1890. They lived at Dayton, Wash., for a year before moving to the Southwick area, along with another family, five cows and several wagons.



The Kauders homesteaded June 10, 1891, in the Crescent area, five miles northwest of Southwick, a community that was known then as Grafton. His parents died on the homestead. Although the younger Kauder later acquired a farm of his own, he remained on the family homestead for 33 years.

He was married May 15, 1918, at Moscow to Anna Vertle Cramer. She died in July of 1953.

In his younger days, Kauder played his banjo for dances and also for the amusement of many children in the area. In 1903 he bought an Edison windup phonograph and was so enthralled with it that he took it around the country to let others enjoy the entertainment it provided.

Along with his farming, Kauder worked as a carpenter, helping to build houses in the Southwick area and around the old community of Crescent. He sold the farm in 1929 and moved to Southwick. He continued to work as a carpenter, and later was custodian for the Southwick School District.

Fifteen years before he was moved to the Lewiston nursing home, he moved into Alma Betts home in the Golden Rule area, where he spent his declining years under Alma's good and loving care.

Surviving are two step-daughters, Alice Tarry of Southwick and Verna Driscoll of Lewiston; two granddaughters, Jane Nielsen of Clarkston and Elaine Hill of Lewiston, four great-grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

A graveside service was conducted Saturday at 2 p.m. at the Southwick Cemetery under the direction of Vassar-Rawls Funeral home.

The purpose of the project is to preserve history of Idaho women and to show what an important place women have held in the development of our state.

It is especially fitting at this time since Genesee will be celebrating its 100th year soon and our country, its bicentennial in 1976.

Nez Perce County Zoning Prodded Into Life by Citizens Voice

Because of inquiries about the proposed "School of Country Living" zoning, concerned valley residents have uncovered the defunct Nez Perce County zoning commission and the non-existence of the Nez Perce County building code. Alarmed by the lack of enforcement of the County's Zoning Text, citizens drew up a petition to the Nez Perce County Commissioners requesting the re-activation of the county's Planning and Zoning Commission.

Before the petition could be circulated, Eugene Taylor met to discuss the matter with the three County Commissioners: Chairman Wilfred J. Ducloux, J. R. Alfrey and Otto Brammer. The outcome of the meeting helped accomplish the petition's purpose with its circulation.

Citizens' interest and the willingness to circulate a petition for a lawful result have initiated rejuvenation of the Nez Perce County Zoning Board.

Last Thursday, Charles Cline was hired to establish a building permit and inspection system; his job begins February 10.

Mrs. Carla Emery, creator of the School of Country Living, will soon be making application for conditional use of the agricultural land for her 400 acre school site. An application of this nature does require a public hearing; it does require approval from the County Commissioners themselves. No time or place for the hearing has been set.

However, it is not too early to voice your opinion about the issue. The Commissioners should know how the community and surrounding areas feel and think. Petitions "for" or "against" the "School of Country Living" can now be drawn up and sent to the Commissioners before the hearing takes place. If people do not wish to sign a petition, then a letter, phone call or visit will be welcomed — anything to help the County Commissioners carefully review and decide approval or disapproval of Mrs. Emery's development in Nez Perce County.

New Unemployment Claims Show Slight Decrease

With a slight easing up of the number of new claims for unemployment insurance, placement activities in the Moscow area came alive. Five Latah County residents were placed on jobs through the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment, according to Frank J. Hartstein, office manager. Hartstein said that this compares with only one placement during the previous week, and with the two to three placements made during each of the past few weeks. Jobs available at the end of the week numbered four, up one from last week, but still short of the opportunities at the end of January last year.

Sixty-three persons filed new claims for benefits during the week, according to another part of Hartstein's report. He said that this figure included 20 who filed under the Special Unemployment Assistance Act and 13 who filed claims under the Federal State Extended plan that went into effect a week ago. The total number of persons seeking benefits rose only slightly, as a number of persons returned to work. The current total is 594, up only 12 from the previous week, but compares with 519 at the end of January, 1974. In the immediate Moscow area, the totals remain nearly constant, 298 now, 274 last week, and 275 a year ago. At Potlatch, the total now is 114, down from last week's 123, but up from last year's 114. At Genesee, the figures are 25 now, 20 a week ago and 23 a year ago. At Kendrick, the figures are 2, 27 and 15. Little change is expected during the new few weeks, according to Hartstein, unless weather conditions cause some labor force reductions.

Sen. Judd Working For More Highway Funds for Roads

State Senator Claud Judd last week proposed a bill to transfer sales tax paid on motor vehicles from the general fund to the state highway fund. He told the House Transportation Committee his proposal would pump about \$9 million a year into the road-building fund.

Judd told the Gazette Monday afternoon that he would also be introducing a bill to increase car and pickup license fees which would go into the highway fund as ongoing money to supplement the funds the governor has already recommended for the highways of the state.

Judd indicated the prime purpose of his legislation would be to see that state highways, such as Highway 95, the connecting link between North and South Idaho, are improved.

Pressure to Reind ERA

Sen. Judd said that it might be of interest to persons who support the Equal Right Amendment, which has been ratified by the State, that there is strong support from certain groups to rescind this ratification. Senator Judd has been a supporter of the Equal Rights Amendment. Area residents who are in favor of this amendment to the constitution should be aware that opposition has still not quit fighting this legislation.

Anti-Spraying Petitions

Judd said he has also received a petition from Juliaetta urging legislation banning the use of DDT. There is already a bill introduced which would virtually eliminate the use of 2-D. Judd said he was aware that there had been abuse of unrestricted spraying in the past and the danger it represented, but he asked that petitioners take into consideration the need of farmers, especially in these critical times, to have access to the most efficient methods of pest and weed control. He did not, however, advocate unrestricted and irresponsible use of pesticides.

Bulldogs Top Trojans 51-45

Troy's Trojans got the first basket of the evening but that was the only time they led that evening as the Genesee Bulldogs won the contest on the Troy court 51-45 last Thursday night in a non-league contest. It was the 11th loss against just 3 wins for the hard-luck Trojans.

Genesee quickly took over the lead and were ahead 15-9 at the end of the first quarter, a six-point lead they held through most of the game. Both teams scored an even 11 points in the second period but Genesee took the 6-point lead into the second half.

Body Language—Listen and Live

With heart attacks—there's no time for second guessing. And there is no such thing as a "safe" gamble—you could be dead wrong.

Just as children are put through endless fire drills at school to prepare for such an emergency, we too are conditioned to respond to certain sights and sounds—a red flashing light, traffic signals and sounds the wall of a siren, the clang of a fire bell.

Our bodies, also give off warnings. When we have a headache, we reach for the aspirin bottle. A toothache conjures the thoughts of a dentist. Pain and discomfort send messages and trigger responses. Without this signal that something is wrong our lives would often be in danger.

When heart attack strikes, too many of its victims ignore the early warning signs, or pass them off as indigestion or heart burn, even if symptoms persist for more than six hours. That's when it can become a fatal mistake!

More than 680,000 die from heart attack each year, another 200,000 will die from stroke. The average heart attack victim waits 3 hours before seeking help. As a result, over half die before reaching the hospital.

These are the warning signs of heart attack: prolonged, oppressive pain or unusual discomfort in the center of the chest; pain may radiate to shoulder, arm, neck and jaw; sweating may accompany pain or discomfort; nausea, vomiting and shortness of breath may also occur. These are the warning signs of stroke: sudden, temporary weakness or numbness of face, arm or leg; temporary loss of speech, or trouble in speaking or understanding speech; temporary dimness or loss of vision particularly in one eye; an episode of double vision; unexplained dizziness or unsteadiness; change in personality, mental ability or the pattern of headaches may also occur.

The Idaho Heart Association cautions, however, that these are only what the name applies—warning signs. They are not always true signals of heart attack or stroke. But acting on them—calling your doctor or getting to a hospital emergency room—is important. As the cliché goes, it's better to be safe than sorry.

The Idaho Heart Association has more information about the warning signs and other things you can do to safeguard your heart-health. So ask your Heart Association—and give generously when your Heart Fund Volunteer calls.

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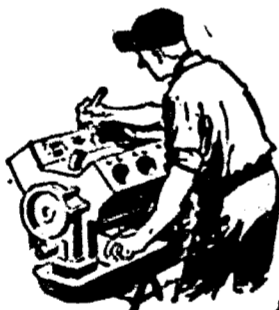

Opening Dates For Idaho's 1975 Big Game Hunting

Due to many people wanting to schedule their vacations during the general deer and elk hunts, also for those wanting to know why the dates have been changed, maybe this article will be of some help.

Opening dates for Idaho's 1975 big game hunting seasons were recently established by the Idaho Fish and Game Commission in Boise. In setting the specific opening dates, the Commission changed the weekend opening dates, a policy set in 1968, to a calendar date opening. The seasons will open on a certain date, regardless of whether it falls on a weekend or a weekday. This year in our area—Region 2—most of the general elk and deer openings fall on a Monday and Wednesday, with the archery and muzzle loaders opening on a Saturday.

Archery season will open on August 30 (Saturday) for both elk and deer in Units 8-A, 10, 10-A, 11-A and 15. Muzzle loaders will have Unit 8 to themselves, opening on September 13 (Saturday) for deer and elk. On September 15 (Monday) general elk and deer hunting will open in Units 16-A, 17, 19, 20 and a portion of 12. On October 1 (Wednesday) general deer and elk hunting will open in Units 9-A, 10, 10-A, 11-A, 14, 15, 16 and a portion of 19 and 12 with additional Units 8 and 8-A for elk only. Fall hunts for black bear and mountain lion open on August 30 (Saturday).

The intent of this regulation is to reduce the hunting pressure on the opening days. We have expanded our use of the land to the extent that there has been reductions in food and cover for the wildlife. Due to the increase in the number of people who hunted under the old system, we found too much pressure on some of the game herds. This large number of people hunting the more accessible areas compared with fewer people hunting the more remote and rugged areas has led to dividing the units with longer seasons in the remote areas. If the shorter seasons do not reduce the hunting pressure enough, we will probably be forced into other types of hunts. Hopefully, the old general hunting season will not become a thing of the past.

Closing dates for the big game seasons will not be set until later, allowing time for harvest information, productivity counts, browse analysis, and winter losses to be analyzed before setting season length.

Resident Hall Advisor

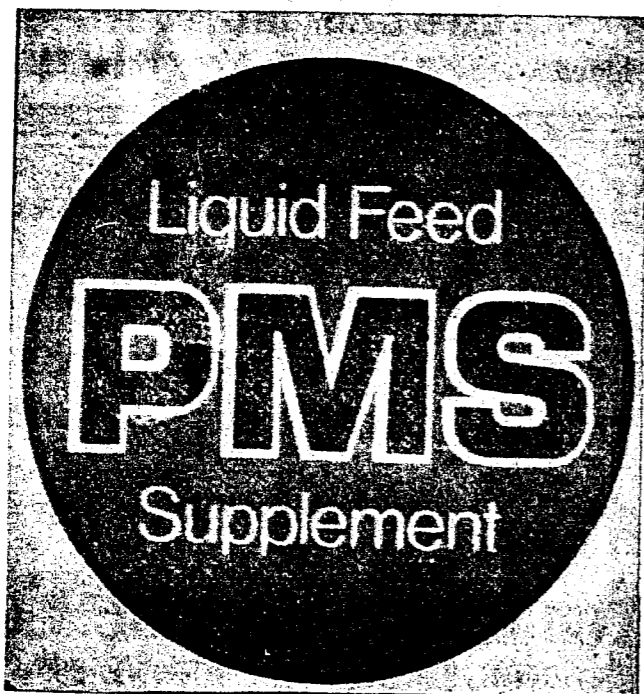
