## Kindergarten Bill To Come Before Education Committee This Week

Lester Clemm, State Representative from District 7, reported to the Gazette Monday afternoon that a bill to fund kindergarten programs in the state has been printed and will come into the Education committee this week. Rep. Clem said he would like to hear from local people who are interested in kindergarten programs. Les is a member of the Education committee.

The proposed kindergarten program would be strictly voluntary for school districts in the state. It would provide a half-day session and would be funded on the regular school formula using average daily attendance figures (ADA). Funds not used by non-participating districts would be put into pool and pro-rata to all districts for ongoing programs.

Idaho is one of only four states in the nation that does not have a kindergarten program.

In other action, Clemm reported House Bill 66 which would eliminate the mandatory 35 limit for exceeding the 55-mile-per-hour on highways previously posted for greater speeds, passed the House by a 37-32 vote.

Also coming up soon will be HB 21A which would eliminate the 10 per cent usury interest rate in Idaho. None of the neighboring states have such a law, Clemm said.

## Land Use Planning Bills Hearing February 18

Sen. Claud Judd reported this week that Senate Hearings on several land use bills now pending before legislation will be held in the Gold Room of the Capitol Thursday evening, Feb. 18. The Local Government and Taxation committee, of which Judd is a member, will be conducting the hearing. Bills now before the legislature, time of the hearing is 6:30.

There will also be a hearing on the City Auction Tax Feb. 13 at 7:30. Judd also reported that his bill to increase car and pickup licenses will also soon come up for vote. This added revenue would go for better roads.

In relation to this, Claud said there were reports that some \$2 billion dollars in federal highway funds would soon be released and Idaho's share might be somewhere between 18 and 20 million for matching funds. Judd added this money might be earmarked for Interstate Highway construction.

## Legislative Bills May Be Seen at Brocke's Office

Geo. Brocke, Jr., has reminded area citizens that almost all of the legislative bills which have been introduced in the 43rd session of the State Legislature thus far, can be seen and reviewed at the main plant's office just off Main street. The Brocke office staff are keeping the bills in rotation order and anyone interested is welcome to drop in the office and look the proposed bills over.

## Transportation For Senior Citizens Goal Of County Group

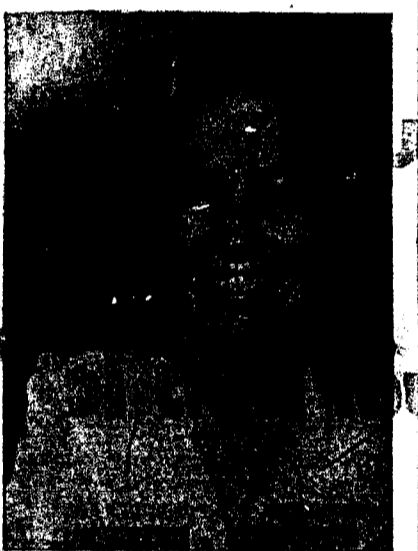
After many months of work on the project of providing transportation for senior citizens, Lloyd Craig, Latah County's recently appointed Community Action director, reported progress is now being made in this field. Lloyd, working with Eric Lessor of Moscow, Latah Transport Service Planner under the Community Action Agency for the five northern counties, has a preliminary proposal ready now which would provide for the transportation needs of the people 55 years or older of the handicapped in the area.

Lloyd, a retired Nez Perce County Highway supervisor, was appointed to his new post by the Latah County Commissioners to replace Charles Bond of Moscow.

Three meetings have been scheduled in the county this week; one at Troy, one at Moscow and one at Kendrick. After the meeting the plans will be more definite, Craig said. Routes will be established and, hopefully, Craig added, contracts will be let for the service. "Feeder" bus routes will be worked out after the main routes are set. Lloyd added that he hoped Kendrick and Juliaetta will be the first areas served.

Under the preliminary proposal it is suggested that the transport plan for elderly and handicapped in the county could conceivably be implemented through contracting on a mileage basis with one of more of the school districts in Latah County on a contracting mileage basis. It is hoped that these arrangements for use of the school buses could be worked out with no disruption to the school use.

## Heavy Snows Blanket Region

The heaviest snow of the season fell across the region last week, bringing six to eight inches in Genesee and the higher elevations and dropping about four inches in Kendrick and Juliaetta. Up on the hill the snow was whipped along by strong winds which drifted across the highways and made travel difficult and hazardous.

Clouds remained Friday and Saturday and early Sunday morning another struck, bringing more snow. The temperature warmed Monday and by Monday evening the moisture was coming down in the form of rain. This turned the snow on the streets and highways to icy slush and made roads extremely slick.

Tuesday was still warm with the thermometers registering over 40 in the valley.

## Weed Control Meeting In Kendrick Feb. 20

Yellow star thistle and spotted knapweed survey meeting is set for 1:30 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 20, at the Kendrick Fire Hall.

"The first move necessary in eradicating weeds is to know the area covered by the infestation," reports Homer Futter, Latah County Weed supervisor.

Farmers and ranchers need to show us on the map the areas infested so we can get a program started. With funds available from the State of Idaho and new clearance on the use of herbicides, we are now in a position to start an eradication program.

Yellow star thistle is, as the name implies, a thistle with many sharp spines. This weed takes over range and pasture land making it worthless. This weed has been in the area several years and is spreading rapidly.

Spotted knapweed is another newcomer in the noxious weed family and pollutes Little Bear Creek, plus showing up along the highways. This weed covers thousands of acres in Montana and is a real threat to both farm and pasture lands.

A cooperative program with Nez Perce County is being explored as infestations of yellow star thistle are along the county lines.

Specimens of these weeds will be on display to help with identification and control measures will be reviewed.

## Glen Sampson Was A Pioneer Genesee Businessman

Glen Sampson, the son of pioneers of the Genesee area, passed away in Spokane Tuesday, February 4, at the age of 92. He had been a Genesee businessman from 1901 until 1968. He was active in civic, business and sports in Genesee until his retirement and was one of the most respected members of the community.



Glen was born April 18, 1882 to Ephriam A. and Eunice Warner Sampson. The family first came to Genesee in 1876, settling in what is known as Old Town. They moved to Lewiston for a very short time where Glen was born and then returned to Genesee to remain. The original family farm is what is now the Becker place next to the Shirrod farm.

He married Emma L. Geltz in 1901. Shortly afterwards Glen turned from farming and opened a barbershop in Genesee. He was Genesee's barber for over 55 years and managed the State Liquor Dispensary for over 32 years, finally retiring at age 84.

He and his wife celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in 1931 and she preceded him in death in 1961. He spent the last few years at Mausson South Nursing Home in Spokane where he died Feb. 4.

Two daughters survive, Gertrude Gribble, Genesee, and Margaret Bergman, Spokane; three grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Graveside services were held at the Genesee City Cemetery Saturday, Feb. 8, with the Rev. Bryce McProud, pastor of the Genesee Community Church, officiating. Pallbearers were Don Springer, Ronald Geltz, Willard Sampson, Burrell Sampson, Terry Geltz, Joe Kalafus, Tom Boyd and Carl Simons.

## Last of Barbershop Gang

Big, friendly Glen Sampson never lacked for companions. This, coupled with the appeal of the barber shop, made his shop a natural "hangout" for many of Genesee's men. It was a special meeting place for several of his contemporaries: Glen was the last to pass on . . . they're all gone now, but the town will remember them . . . Bill Gray, Roy Evans, Bob Emmett, Glen's brother, Virgil, who barbered with him, Roy Emerson and others. There was always laughter, talk, gossip and good-natured joking whenever they all got together. Those who have heard it will never forget the good-natured bantering that went on between Roy Evans and Glen.

Through all his laughter and good humor, Glen had a very kind and understanding side. He had a deep concern for youth and especially under-privileged children. More than one young man had a graduation suit given to him by Glen and a few ever forgot this kindness. Many a person can remember that his first hair-cut was a free one.

Sports of all kinds interested Glen, and he managed the town baseball team for many years back in the days when town team baseball was almost professional quality. In his younger days he was one of the organizers and members of the hunting club in Genesee.

For me, personally, the barbershop was a mecca of information. Glen and Virgil could recall accurately just about anything you needed to know about the history of the town. I know many haircuts were delayed because I would go over to ask a question and Glen would stop his work to patiently explain exactly how and why a certain incident in Genesee history had come to pass.

Glen was a kind and understanding man and always a gentleman in the true sense of the word. He was a friend to me and an asset to the community. From here on, whenever I hear anyone say "they don't make things like they use to," I'll think of Glen Sampson . . . they aren't making men like that anymore, either. —Bill

Dear Gertrude and Margaret Sampson:

Long since you have worn other names than Sampson, but when I read the obituary of your father, I think I shall write you as his daughters and send a copy to the Gazette-News. We find that paper a part of our hometown thinking don't we?

The headline reads, "Glen Sampson, 92, retired barber, dies." He lived a long time and what a world of memories thinking of him brings to mind. It was sad to have the end come during such rough weather for so many of us would have liked to have some to his last service who couldn't get there.

As a little girl, the barber shop, represented the local men's club, sort of sports support for local teams was born in "the barber shop" and local talent was augmented by a generous pooling of resources—I know that Guy's Wicks was brought over from the University to play second base together with various talent from WSC and his own teammates. That \$20 for playing on Sunday was mighty welcome and didn't hurt amateur standing those days. Glen was unofficial captain of the Coyote Club which we often referred to in IT HAPPENED WAY BACK WHEN with the local editor taking pot shots at unsuccessful hunting trips or the abundance of predators or such.

My husband came to Genesee just 50 years ago this fall to be principal of the High School and coach. By coach was meant that he taught every sport in which the school participated. There was a special problem—there was no gym. All indoor sports occurred in The Opera House. This meant for basketball the chairs from the movie or home-talent play or lyceum or what-have-you had to be stacked on the stage with only a single row lining the walls to handle the crowds. The chimney of the stove at either end of the hall had to stretch clear up to the high ceiling (high enough to accommodate a good arch on a ball hopefully thrown toward the two hoops) and when players came roaring down the floor and hit the chairs which were meant to guard them from the hot stoves, those chimneys would weave to chill the viewer. There never was a collapse, but that was a miracle. So Guy decided to see if the city wouldn't buy a gym. The only available place was the Opera House then owned by Bill Herman. He consulted with 'Fat' Sampson and other good citizens like Mahlon Follett and solicited up and down Main Street. The response was generous. But far short of enough. The only answer was to ask T. Driscoll. And that did it—for Mr. Driscoll was a quiet giver, but a generous one. And for the first time, Genesee had a place for sports and other events which the School Board controlled and which the town supported with the enthusiasm generated around Glenn Sampson.

To his daughter, I want to say thank you. It takes a long memory to go back that far, but how good it is to recall the wholesomeness, the awareness, and the fun which our childhood surrounded. Glenn helped to create the feeling of Main Street and thus touched all our lives gently and helpfully.

**Deal Only With Bonafide  
Trucker Is State's Advice  
To Idaho Farmers**

Boise—A reminder to Idaho farmers and warehousemen to deal only with truckers who are bonafide licensed and bonded "truck buyers" was issued here today by Jerry Williams, Boise, administrator of markets for the Idaho Department of Agriculture.

Williams warned there have been a few instances where farmers and warehouse operators have loaded trucks with grain and hay without securing the proper identification from the trucker. The loads were never delivered to the consignee and the truckers were never heard from again.

The state agriculture official explained that in some cases, the truckers were licensed and bonded by other states but this does not necessarily provide proper protection for Idaho farmers and warehousemen.

"Make sure they are licensed and bonded in Idaho," Williams cautioned. A truck buyer is defined by the state law which requires their licensing and bonding as one who obtains from a producer or warehouseman any farm products (specifically grain, beans, peas, seeds, wool or hay) for resale, storage or processing. The term "truck" is still used although very few rail cars are loaded by these buyers any more. A \$10,000 bond is required by the law.

Williams wonders if the \$10,000 bond is sufficient in these days of inflated prices. "Just a couple of loads can be worth more than that and it would behoove farmers and warehousemen not to let any one buyer have a second or, at most, a third load without receiving payment for the first load," he said.

The state official noted that in almost all cases where loads disappeared, the farmers or warehousemen failed to determine if the trucker or trucking firm was licensed and bonded.

"Trucks that are bonded must display an official, three-inch by seven-inch decal, bearing the words 'Idaho Bonded Truck Buyer' and indicating the expiration date of the license and bond," Williams said. "If the decal becomes illegible or is missing for any reason, a phone call to the state agriculture department will verify whether or not the truck is licensed and bonded." He added that truckers should request replacements for damaged or missing decals.

Williams provided some pointers for farmers or warehousemen who are about to load a truck for a truck buyer.

1. Check to see that the tractor has a valid decal. These should be displayed on each side of the power unit, just behind the door of the cab. Also, record the number of both tractor and the trailer license plates.  
2. Check the driver's personal chauffeurs license for positive identification.  
3. See that the invoice and/or bill of lading is properly signed by the driver.  
4. If the trucker is one that is hauling for hire—not involved in the purchase but strictly as a transporter—be sure you know the individual or firm he is hauling for. "Most important," Williams added, "know your trucker and get a signature."
