

## 5th Annual Cut-Throat Basketball Tourney Begins In Kendrick Mar. 17; 16 Teams

Sixteen teams will be competing in two different classes as Kendrick hosts the 5th annual Cut-Throat basketball tournament which begins next Monday, March 17, at the KHS gym. This annual event is sponsored by the Kendrick Booster Club as a part of its fund-raising activities.

Kendrick Coach Dick Ruark said Tuesday that the two divisions, a class A and Class B, were created this year to give smaller teams a better chance. Games will be played at 7:15 and 9:00. The Class B tournament will be held from Monday to Thursday and the Class A tournament from Friday until Sunday.

Monday, March 17, Kendrick will

meet Deary at 7:15 and Elk River will meet Craigmont at 9:00 p.m. Tuesday Art & Dan's of Moscow will meet Moser's Madmen at 7:15 and Spreiter's Sports of Lewiston will play Manfull's Marauders of Orofino in the 9:00 o'clock game. Semi-final games will be played at 7:15 and 9:00 on Wednesday and the championship game at 8:00 p.m. Thursday.

The Class A competition will get underway Friday night at 7:15 with LCSC I meeting the Corner Club of Moscow and LCSC II matched against Genesee at 9:00. Saturday the games will begin at 1:00 p.m. with LCSC III paired against Baker Truckers and St. Maries playing Spokane at 3:00 p.m.

Semi-finals will be played Saturday night with first round winners meeting at 6:30 and 8:00.

The championship game will be played Sunday afternoon at 3:00 p.m. College players from Idaho, LCSC; Montana, Kansas and Utah will be on the various team rosters. Former Kendrick coach Wayne Dust will also be down with the team from Spokane.

Lewis-Clark State College is the defending champions in this year's tournament.

Admission prices are 75c for adults and 50c for high school students and under.

## Street Signs Talked At Council Meeting

The Genesee Council met Monday evening with Mayor L. W. Sorensen presiding and all councilmen present.

John Luedke, chairman of the Genesee Planning & Zoning Commission attended the meeting to discuss with the council the possibility of erecting street signs in town. Council suggested that the Planning & Zoning Commission work out a street numbering system so that street signs could also be numbered. Council stressed that due to the tight budget this year that this be budgeted for next year.

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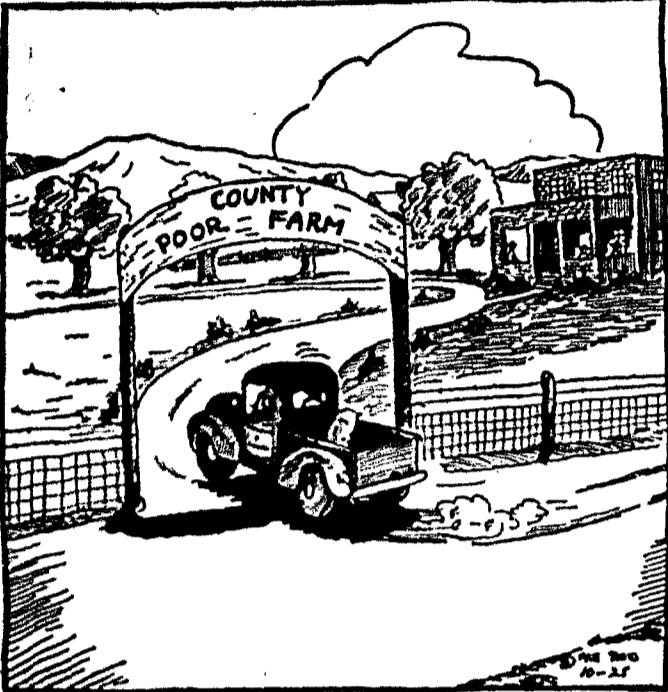
