surance shot upwards during the week. 108 persons filed new claims for benefits during the week. In-cluded in that figure were those who extended benefits after exhausting with the previous week week and their regular insurance ,and some who filed claims under the newly instituted plan for Special Unemploy ment Assistance. The total number of persons seeking jobless benefits same as the previous week although in the county now totals 620, a new one less than during the first week high for the past few years. A week in March of 1974. At the end of the week there were 8 jobs still open. in early March only 420. Much of the increase was in the Potlatch area and in the Troy-Deary-Bovill area where most of the woods workers live. 




