A great peace descended on the man as he went on down the street smiling. He had measured up to the responsibility of fatherhood. Be Sure! Inmate With Don!

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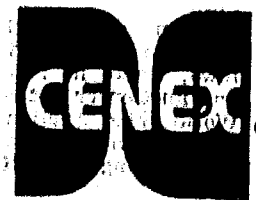

ORDINANCE NO 188

AN ORDINANCE TERMED "ANNUAL APPROPRIATION BILL" APPROPRIATING MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF DEFRAYING ALL NECESSARY EXPENSES AND LIABILITIES OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, LATAH COUNTY, STATE OF IDAHO, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING THE FIRST DAY OF JANUARY, 1975, AND ENDING ON THE THIRTY-FIRST DAY OF DECEMBER, 1975, AND CREATING AND ALLOCATING SAID APPROPRIATION TO CERTAIN FUNDS OUT OF WHICH SUCH EXPENSES SHALL BE PAID.
 BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO:
 SECTION 1. There is hereby appropriated out of any monies in the treasury of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, not otherwise appropriated and out of any revenue which the city of Juliaetta may acquire between the first day of January, 1975, and the thirty-first day of December, 1975 the sum of \$777,129.50 for the purpose of defraying all necessary expenses and liabilities of such corporation for the fiscal year beginning on the first day of January, 1975, and ending on the thirty-first day of December, 1975.
 SECTION 2. There are hereby created the following funds:
 A. GENERAL FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$56,000.00 out of the above appropriation for the general expenses of said city.
 B. WATER FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$16,700.00 out of the above appropriation for the expenses, maintenance and improvement of the above system of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho.
 C. FIRE DEPARTMENT FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$1,700.00 out of the above appropriation for fire department purposes.
 D. WATER REVENUE BOND REDEMPTION FUND, to which is here-

by allotted the sum of \$402.50 out of the above appropriation for the bond interest and redemption of bond numbered 14.

E. FEDERAL REVENUE SHARING FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$25,000.00 out of the above appropriation for general expenses of said City in accordance with the laws and procedures applicable for the spending of such funds.
 F. ED WATER PROJECT 07-11-01487 FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$146,327.00 out of the above appropriation for the drilling of a water well, pump, casing and pipe from well to reservoir.
 G. SEWER PROJECT C-160184 FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$531,000.00 out of the above appropriation for the construction of a sewage collection system and waste treatment plant.
 SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and the first publication thereof.

 Do I need a hunting license to hunt predators?

The answer is yes. A hunting li-

cence is required to hunt, shoot, trap or kill any wild animal, the regulations say. However, there is an exception to the rules. A landowner may kill the predators on his property without a hunting license.

Ducks Banded

Trapping and banding operations are going on now in the Hagerman Wildlife Management Area and in the Pocatello area.



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
