The Genesee City Council met for their April meeting Monday evening with Mayor L. W. Sorensen presiding.

Several local residents attended the meeting as representatives of a group of local citizens to consult the council as to what could be done concerning the magazines and materials at a local business establishment on main street.

They alleged that these magazines are in reach of all who enter the place of business and in plain view of school children coming in. The two main objectives offered by the representatives attending the meeting were: that these magazines are in plain view of all school children as they enter the business house and the other objective is when covers are torn off the magazines they are thrown in the garbage where children can pick them up. There was nothing in the code concerning pornography and the council asked what is considered pornography and referred that the group contact the owner of the local business and work out a possible solution.

Alan Daniels, who recently purchased the Don Wright residence attended the meeting to inquire as to the possibility of installing a water sewer to his residence at his expense. He was told to get an estimate and meet with the council at the next meeting.

It was reported that the city's liability insurance will pay for part of the damage done at the Community church.

They have trimmed, thinned and removed trees from the upper park; have cleaned numerous manholes and have swept and removed rock from four blocks of the city streets. All Granges are reminded to attend the Spring Festival Jamboree at the Kendrick Grange Hall Saturday night.

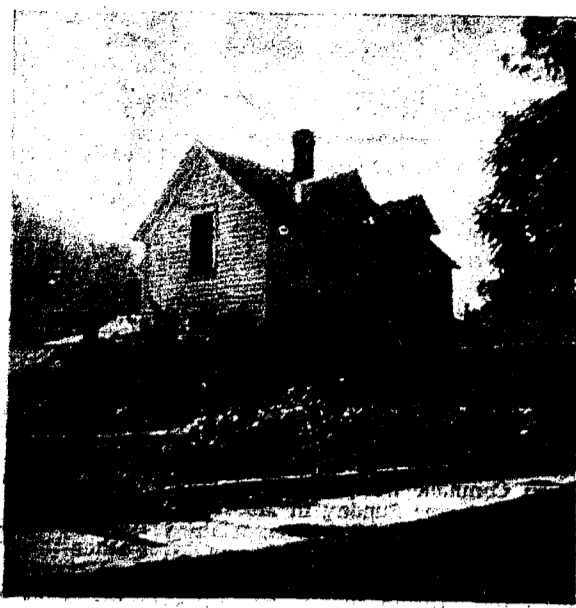

Kendrick Landmark House to be Torn Down



A landmark Kendrick house, built before the turn of the century on land purchased from the United States government when Benjamin Harrison was President in 1890, is now in the process of being torn down to be replaced by a new parsonage for the Assembly of God Church.

The church purchased the house and land from Mrs. Robert Cain in March of 1964 for its parsonage. Mr. and Mrs. Cain had acquired the property from Mr. and Mrs. Fred Zim-

merman in the spring of 1948 and had lived there until Mr. Cain's death in 1963.

Mathias Casper was the first private owner of the land, part of 160 acres purchased from the government in 1890. Mr. Cain, the abstract revealed was the 75th owner of the property.

The house is being razed by a crew under the direction of Bill Barnard. Plans are for a new parsonage to be constructed soon.

Carla Emery Returns After 4-Month Tour

Carla Emery returned last weekend from her nation-wide tour promoting her famous mimeographed book and her Country Living dream. It has been a successful trip as her book sales soared to the 19,500 mark this week. Her "Old-Fashioned Recipe Book" has been sold in every state and in 20 foreign countries. Orders are still flowing in.

According to a publicized statement in February, Mrs. Emery will be selling rights to her book to a publisher; however, because of last minute contract disagreements, she refused to sign and is setting out to bind and supply hardcover editions of the cookbook herself. The advantage of a hard-covered, bound book is its practical appeal to libraries and book stores. The price of the book will range according to binding and the kind of cover.

Homesteading School Still On
Carla continues promoting her homesteading school. Her most recent "Dear Friend" letter attached to brochures read: "Welcome students to Country Living! . . . we will be open accepting people from June 2, 1975 until August 30, 1975 . . . You will have to have your own accommodations in Moscow or Lewiston. There is no charge for classes, but donations will be gratefully accepted." Since feeding and lodging the students will be impossible this year, a list of Lewiston and Moscow hotels, motels and camp areas is provided on the back side of the letter. The Kendrick Hotel is not included in her list.

Carla is much happier having her school free as she feels it is more a part of the kind of person she is. She said, "Perhaps people will now understand that it is a public service I am offering out of the love of my heart." Asked about financing such an endeavor, she merely replied, "I'm going to pray a lot."

The current issue of "The Mother Earth News", has an article featuring Carla's Country Living project and has probably prompted letters to the editor appearing this last week in local newspapers supporting her plan. The national magazine suggested ways to help the fate of her project which included: (1) Arranging carpools and organizing help to encourage attendance at the public hearing; (2) writing letters to the editors of local papers specifically giving the Idahoan's and Lewiston Morning Tribune's addresses; (3) calling or writing the Living Room Mimeographer for further details on plans and legal proceedings.

At the end of the article, the magazine's editor makes note about local residents objecting, residents "who apparently fear that the school's presence will change the area for the worse." However, according to some in this community, any organized, voiced objections have shown concern over the Nez Perce County Zoning Text, and that citizen pressure was being directed toward enforcement of present zoning laws by the County Commissioners and not toward Carla Emery and County Living.

Mrs. Emery will be meeting with Charles Cline, Director of Nez Perce County Special Services, and with Charles Hudson, assistant planner with the Latah County Department of General Services, this Thursday, April 10. If a public hearing is necessary, time and location will probably be determined then. A public hearing would help the Commissioners decide approval or disapproval of a conditional use permit for the approximate 400-acre of agricultural land the Emerys purchased from Don Paffie last December.

According to Mr. Cline, there is no situation to make a decision about yet; he has no papers or written applications to which to make any referral. "After Thursday's meeting," he inserted, "perhaps then there will be something to go by."

Carla will soon be on the road again with her five children. Leaving April 20th she will start another big West Coast promotion tour.

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
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S. R. A. Testing Program

The Resource Teachers at K. H. S. and the Juliaetta Elementary School are finalizing plans for the SRA Achievement Tests which are to be given to grades 1-9 on April 15 and 16.

The SRA Testing was previously done one year ago and this test will enable us to see the amount of growth and achievement during the year.

Copies of test results will be made available to students, parents, teachers, and administrators. These results can be used in many ways.

For instance, a teacher can use the test results to evaluate the progress of individual students and of the class as a whole. The results can help develop positive plans for educational improvement and growth. The test results can be used the superintendent to inform the school board and the community of the educational standing of the district. Comparisons can be made with national norms or with local norms. Test results can be used in planning conferences between the principal and teachers. They can help focus the teacher's attention on specific problems and encourage a search for solutions. The principal can use test results as a basis for examining the effectiveness of the total school program.

Any questions regarding testing can be directed to the principals or the resource teachers.

Kendrick High School girls' track team began their season Wednesday with a triangular meet win over Troy and Deary.

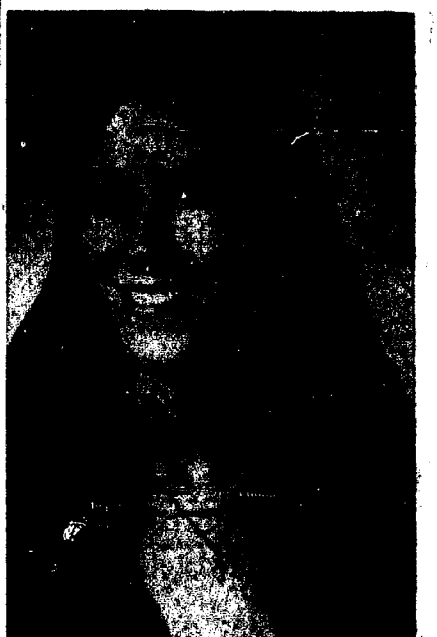
