Kendrick scored in every inning of the second game including a triple by Czowski with the bases loaded in the second as the Tigers won 19-4. Exner fanned 3 as he went all the way on the mound.

Monday afternoon the Tigers went to Clarkston and were defeated twice. In the first game was holding a slim 1 run lead picked up in the 1st inning when Clemenhagen poked out a double to score Jerry Hamilton from third. Clarkston scored in the second and then got the winning run in the third inning on passed ball for the 2-1 victory.

Leading 4-2 going into the bottom of the fourth in the second game, Kendrick saw Clarkston push across four runs on four hits, a sacrifice and a walk to finally win 6-4. Kelly Clemenhagen was three for three at the plate that game with two singles and a double.

**January Weather Hurl Some Wild Game**

Winter weather in January pinch-

ed at least 2 areas where big game are on their limited range.

The Department of Fish and Game has begun a heavy feeding program in the area near the border between Utah and Idaho to help the Snow-ville deer herd through the winter. Trapping and moving the deer to the Black Pine area is also underway.

The second critical spot was in Region 6 where game wintering conditions deteriorated during January. Snow in the North Fork area, north of Salmon, was deep and crusted. Lost Trail pass snow depths rose to 63 inches, and department field men report hard crusted snow in the valley bottoms in that area.

Field reports indicate the remaining Salmon River canyon chukar population may be hurt by the weather unless conditions improve soon. A potential problem exists in northern Idaho with the latest storms during the first part of February,

field reports said.

There, most animals were reported in fair condition, but if the bad weather continues and temperatures stay low for the next two or three weeks, wildlife may begin to feel wintertime's pinch.

Most of the rest of the state reports no major problems so far this winter, but snow depths have been building recently, field men say. However, a winter that was milder than usual through December gave the animals a head start into the worsening conditions of January.

Usually, January will tell the story of the winter. Normally if game in the state can make it thru the first month of the year with little trouble, they should get through the remainder of winter with minimum losses.

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**\$22,000 In UP Scholarships Given To 55 HS Seniors**

MOSCOW — Fifty-five Idaho high school seniors have been named to each receive a \$400 Union Pacific Railroad scholarship to attend the college or university of their choice. Twenty of the Union Pacific scholarship winners are Future Farmers of America members; 35 are 4-H members.

To be eligible for scholarships, in addition to 4-H and FFA membership, applicants must rank scholastically in the top fourth of their graduating class, use the award the fall term or semester immediately after high school, and live in counties served by the Union Pacific Railroad.

Future Farmers of America scholarship winners, announced by John Lawrence of the Agricultural Education Department in the College of Agriculture at the University include Donald Benjamin and Mark Mustoe, both of Kendrick.

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**Nine Workers Given Job Help in County**

Job placement activity declined somewhat at the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment during the past week. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow Office Manager, said that only nine workers were placed on jobs during the week, compared with 13 workers given job finding help during the previous week. A year ago, 10 workers were assisted in locating gainful employment.

At the end of the week there were still 10 jobs available, including such diverse occupations as cooks, domestic workers, pole cutters, an auto mechanic, and an accountant. Several other jobs had been listed, but workers had been referred to them and the office was not aware of their status at the end of the week.

Forty-eight persons filed new claims for unemployment insurance benefits, Hartstein reported. The total number of jobless pay claimants declined slightly, however, as the total now stands at 613, compared with 621 a week ago. At this same time in 1974, 474 persons were seen during the week filing claims. Many of the workers who left the rolls were construction workers returning to jobs in the area, as spring seasonally good weather permitted the resumption of some jobs, and the commencement of others. The noticeable decline occurred in the Moscow area, where the current figure is 234 compared with 247 a week ago. Last year the total in Moscow was only 187. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area, the total edged upwards slightly from 269 last week to the present 215, quite a few more than last year's figure of 172. About the same condition prevailed in the Potlatch area, where 130 residents are now seeking jobless pay checks, compared with 124 last week and 98 last year. At Genesee the figures are 18, 21 and 10 and in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area the totals are 17, 20 and 7.

Hartstein said that his office didn't expect any significant changes within the next couple of weeks. He did predict, however, an increase when classes are completed at the two area Universities.

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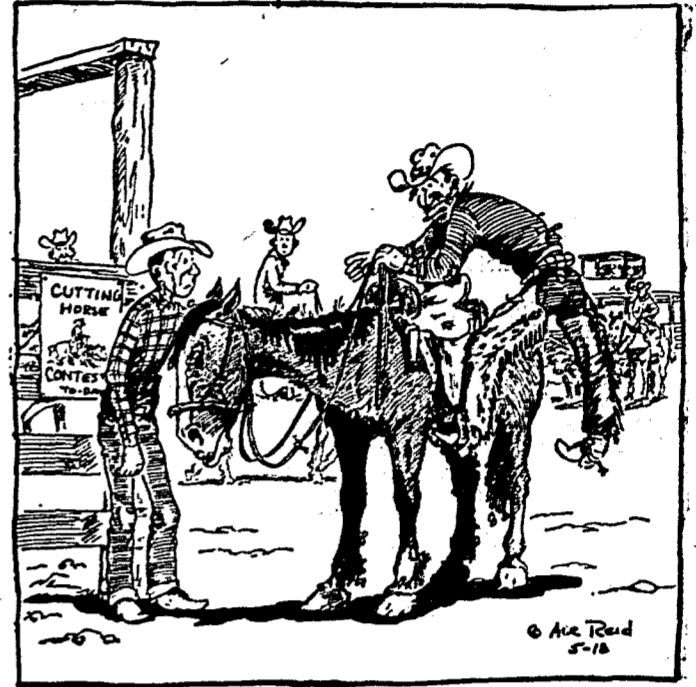

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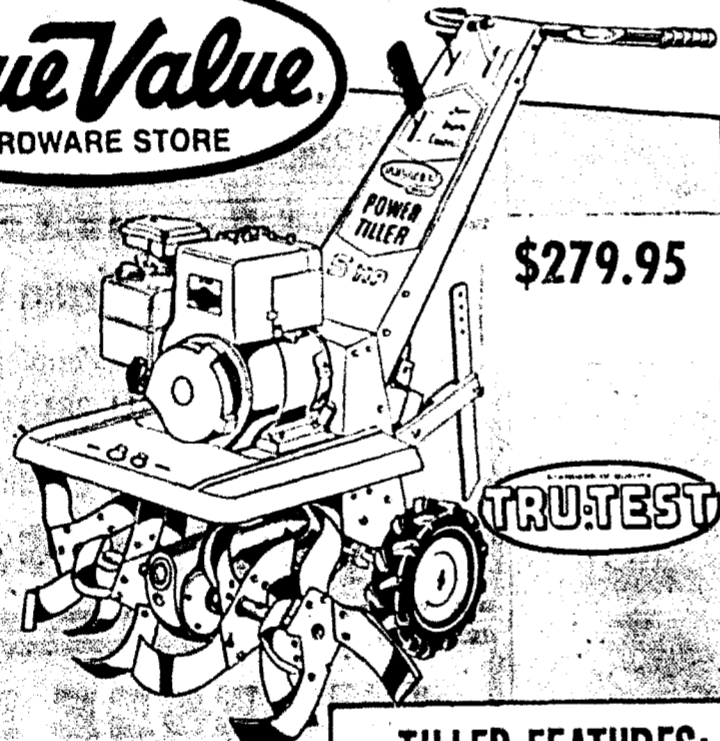
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**Local Life Insurance Week Planned**

**McClure to Submit Signatures Against Ammo Ban Efforts**

U. S. Senator James A. McClure this week told the Consumer Product Safety Commission that he is "submitting letters and petitions from over 20,000 Americans who have written in opposition to any ban of handgun ammunition by the Commission—a response McClure called "massive."

"If there were ever a mandate against a Federal action, this incredible outpouring of protest from the grass roots of America against backdoor gun control is it. The commission will be deluged in paper," he said.

Jim McClure, the author of legislation that would specifically prohibit the commission from acting on any ban of firearms, ammunition or ammunition components, warned that "this battle against backdoor gun controls is far from over."

"If anybody thinks the threat of a ban by the Consumer Product Safety Commission is bad, something much worse is in the works. This Congress is about to take up legislation creating an all-powerful Federal Consumer Protection Agency—an agency that if created, would have a hand in literally every Federal decision by every Federal agency."

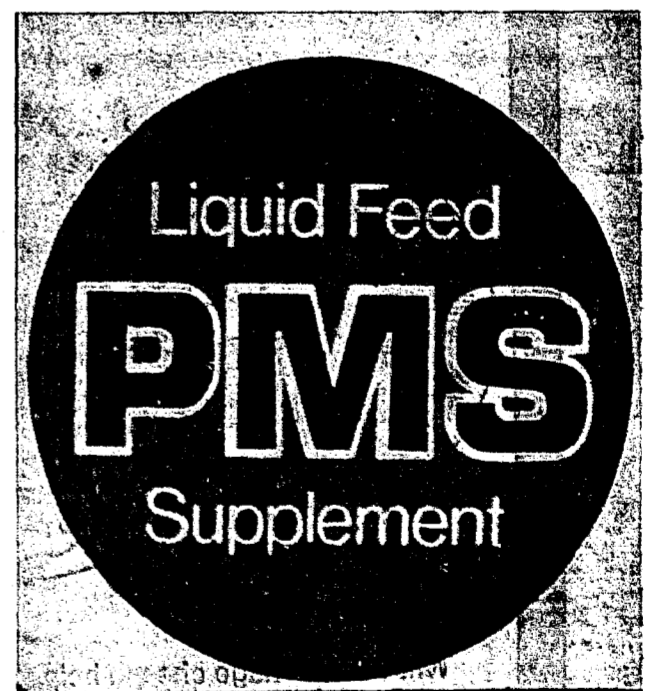
"To end the obvious threat of this new agency acting to ban firearms or ammunition, I am introducing an amendment that would prohibit this Federal super agency from considering or passing any rule or regulation whatsoever dealing with any aspect of firearms or with any aspect of shooting sports. 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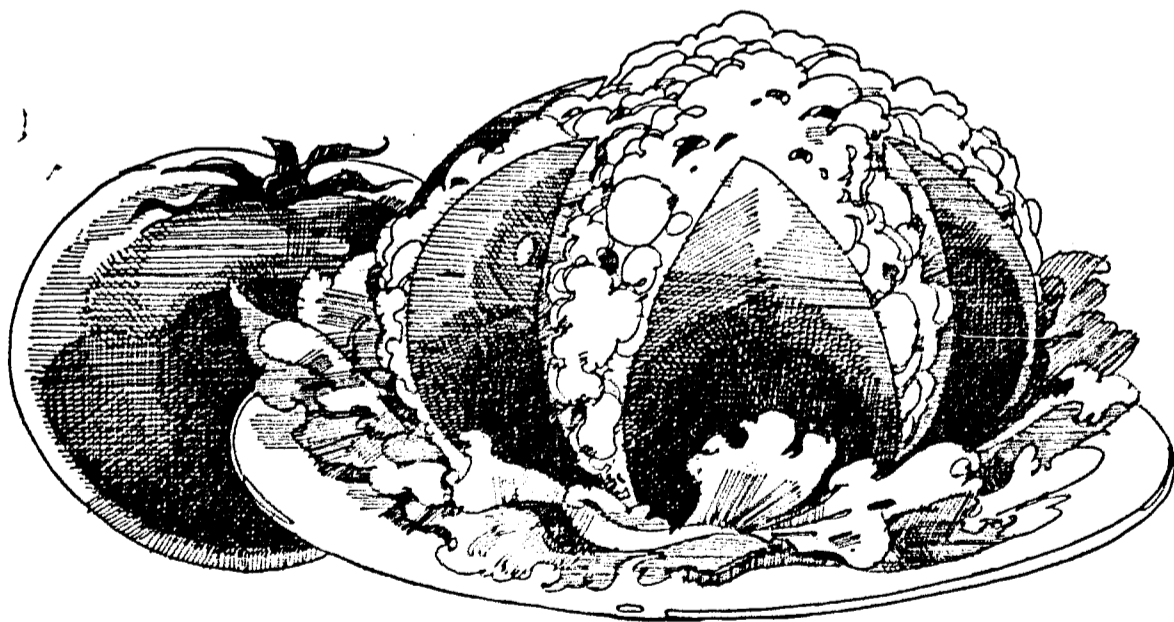

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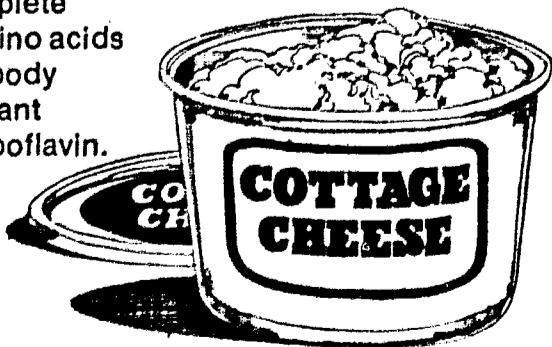

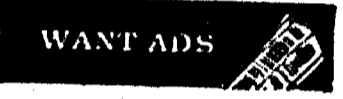

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## National Recession Influences Idaho Economic Outlook

The outlook for Idaho's economy in the second quarter will continue to be influenced by the national recession.

This is the report of the quarterly First Security Bank Newsletter being distributed this week, according to James Hoogland, Jr., manager. The publication is edited by Dr. Elroy Nelson, First Security vice president and economist.

Lumber demand will remain sluggish, but is expected to improve by the third quarter. Livestock prices will probably increase but crop prices are expected to remain below last year levels. Construction activity and production in the silver and phosphate industries are expected to remain at high levels, says First Security.

The Newsletter reports that economic activity in the state was mixed in the first quarter. Lumber production, transportation, equipment manufacturing, food processing and agricultural cash receipts, were all sharply below year ago levels.

Conversely, residential construction silver production, retail trade and service employment, all experienced sharp gains.

Cash receipts from farm marketing in Idaho totalled \$89.8 million in January, which is a 30 per cent drop from the previous year. Receipts from crops fell 31 percent, while receipts from livestock from livestock and livestock products were down 25 percent. These reductions reflect downward price trends rather than decreased quantities marketed, reports the Newsletter.

Mine production of various metals in Idaho during January was substantially above that of one year earlier for silver, about the same for zinc, and slightly lower for lead, copper and gold. Preliminary data indicated an increase in February and March for silver and zinc.

Prices of silver and gold have fluctuated considerably. Silver reached \$5 an ounce but has declined to \$4.40 and is currently at \$4.22. Gold reached almost \$200 an ounce from \$144 a year ago, and is currently \$177 per ounce.

Lumber production in the Gem state for the month of January totalled 84.2 million feet board measure, a 28.5 percent decrease from production levels in the corresponding month of 1974. A sharp decline in housing construction nationally is a major factor in the drop in lumber production, according to the newsletter.

Total employment in Idaho in February was 324,000, an increase of 5 percent above last year. This continuing strong employment picture is in major contrast to the national pattern. Nonagricultural wage and salary employment increased by 5.8 percent, while manufacturing employment declined by 4.5 percent. Major decreases also occurred in lumber, transportation, equipment and food processing.

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased to 7.9 percent—up from 7.5 percent in January and 6 percent one year ago, says First Security.

## HUNTERS URGED TO DEFEND SPORT

Keep those cards and letters rolling in, but make them short and to the point, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game advised duck hunters interested in commenting on an environmental impact statement on migratory bird hunting.

The department urged Idaho's more than 45,000 duck hunters and 26,000 dove hunters to support the present methods used to set migratory game bird seasons.

Idaho hunters have until April 14 to write to the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Washington, D. C. and make their feelings known, the department said.

"It's time for hunters to stand up and be counted," Dick Norell, game bird supervisor, said.

"If the great number of Idaho bird hunters fail to make their feelings known, then they don't care much for their sport," Norell said. "After all, the price of a postage stamp isn't much to pay to keep hunting."

The department's assistant director, Bob Salter, said, "Up to now we haven't felt the pressure of anti-hunting groups here as hunters have in the East, but the movement is gaining strength and it is a growing threat to the sport of hunting."

"It's going to take a lot of hunters writing a lot of letters in support of hunting and it is now to counter anti hunters, whom we expect to be out in force on this one," Salter said.

"In a case like this, you usually expect people who are against something to write more letters than those who are for something," he said. Responses to the recently published impact statement, the result of an out of court settlement of a suit brought last fall by New Jersey anti hunting groups, seem to be taking on the aspects of an election, the department said.

"A letter is a vote," Salter said. "If more letters are received in Washington, D. C. from antihunters than from hunters, the final statement on migratory bird hunting could be changed from its present general support of hunting," Salter said.

## President's Aid Proposal Called Too Little, too late

Calling President Ford's request to Congress for \$1-billion aid to Vietnam "an unrealistic request made too late," U. S. Sen. James A. McClure said this week, "we wouldn't be facing a virtually lost cause situation in Southeast Asia had the Congress acted responsibly when there was time to act."

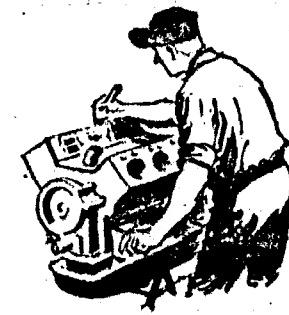
The Idaho Republican, in a statement released following the President's address to a joint session of the Congress, said:

"There is obviously a need for a cooperative and effective foreign policy effort between the President and the Congress. That's nothing new. But, when we look at the grim situation in Southeast Asia, it becomes very apparent that it's high time for the president to assess just how we got into the position where it's vir-

tually a lost cause. And most important, it's high-time the President points the finger toward the people in the Congress who allowed the situation to deteriorate to the point where it calls for over \$1-billion in aid to hold the line. I supported a smaller amount when it could have made the difference. Then it might have had a chance. But now, there is no chance this congress will support the President's request.

On another area of the President's hour-long foreign policy address—the need for a strong intelligence community—the Idaho Republican agreed with President Ford:

"I think Mr. Ford was entirely right when he warned the Congress that we must have an intelligence gathering network. While it's necessary to investigate the CIA, to have a Congressional oversight and review of what they are doing, we would gravely threaten the security of the United States if the CIA and the intelligence community were dismantled."

ORDINANCE NO. 191

"AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO, AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF WATER-SEWER REVENUE BONDS OF \$315,000.00 FOR THE PURPOSE STATED IN ORDINANCE NOS. 168 AND 179 AND PAYABLE OUT OF THE REVENUES OF THE WATER-SEWER SYSTEM; PROVIDING FOR THE FORM OF BOND AND INTEREST COUPONS TO BE ATTACHED THEREON; COMBINING THE WATER AND SEWER SYSTEMS, CREATING CERTAIN SPECIAL FUNDS THEREFOR IN THE OFFICE OF THE CITY TREASURER; SETTING FORTH CERTAIN COVENANTS IN REGARD TO SAID BONDS; PERMITTING THE ISSUANCE OF REVENUE BONDS ON A PARITY WITH THESE BONDS; AND PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE."

WHEREAS, special elections conducted in Juliaetta, Idaho on November 7, 1972 and May 14, 1974 authorized the issuance of two bond issues in the amounts of \$195,000.00 and \$120,000.00 respectively, for the purpose of providing funds to pay a part of the costs of construction of additions and betterments to the water system and the construction, acquisition and installation of a sewage collection and treatment system, pursuant to provision of Ordinance Nos. 168 and 179, and

WHEREAS, the City Council deems it expedient to merge the sewage collection system and the sewage treatment disposal plant with the municipal water system for the purpose of making the bonds more saleable, and

WHEREAS, the City Council deems it expedient because of possible savings to the City to combine the two bond issues into one bond issue.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF JULIAETTA DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: PURPOSE OF ISSUE. For the purpose of providing funds for the payment of part of the costs of the construction and additions and betterments to the water system and the construction, acquisition and installation of a sewage collection and treatment system, as more fully appears in Ordinance Nos. 168 and 179, the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, will issue and sell its Water-Sewer Revenue Bonds of 1975.

Section 2: MERGER OF WATER-SEWER SYSTEMS. After the construction of additions and betterments to the water system and the construction, acquisition and installation of a sewage collection and treatment system, the whole project will then be operated as a single public utility. The charges for sewer services rendered and water supplied in connection with the water and sewerage will be billed as a unit.

Section 3: REDEMPTION. In the event the bonds are sold to other than the Federal Government or one of its agencies, the City reserves the right to redeem Bonds maturing on or after ten (10) years from date in the inverse order of their numbering, highest numbers first, on any interest payment date thereafter.

Notice of such redemption shall be given by one publication thereof in a newspaper of general circulation within said City at least thirty (30) days prior to the date of intended redemption, and by mailing a like notice at the same time to the purchaser, or purchasers, of said bonds.

However, in the event that the bonds, or bond, are sold to the Federal Government or one of its agencies the bonds shall be redeemed in accordance with the United States Government directives.

Section 4: PAYMENT OF BONDS. The foregoing bonds shall be payable, both principal and interest, at the office of the Treasurer of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, or at Boise, Idaho, if said bonds are sold to the State of Idaho, or at the fiscal agency of the State of Idaho in the City and State of New York, or at some other bank, trust company or other place in the State of Idaho, as may be designated by the purchaser and City at the time of sale.

Said bonds shall be signed in the corporate name of the City by the Mayor, countersigned by the Treasurer, by their facsimile signatures, and attested by the Clerk under the corporate seal of said City, and the interest coupons shall be signed by the facsimile signature of the Treasurer of said City, all as permitted by statute, and consistent with the provisions herein elsewhere made, said bonds, or bond, and the interest thereon shall be payable only out of the Bond Redemption Fund referred to in Section 8 of this Ordinance. Said bond issue shall run for a period of thirty (30) years.

Said bonds and interest coupons thus issued against such Bond Redemption Fund herein named shall be a valid claim of the holder thereof only as against such Fund and the moneys required hereby to be paid thereon, and shall not constitute an indebtedness of the City of Juliaetta within the meaning of the Constitution or Laws of the State of Idaho; and such bond and interest coupon shall state on its face that it is payable from said "Bond Redemption Fund of 1975" as herein-after created.

The Council does hereby state and certify that in setting aside and providing for the payment into said Fund of the amounts necessary for the payment of the principal and interest of said bonds, this Council has taken into consideration and has had regard to the cost of operation and maintenance of the water-sewer system of said City, and this Council will set aside into said Fund moneys sufficient and necessary to

retire said bonds, both principal and interest, after payment for salaries and wages and operation and maintenance costs of said water-sewer system.

Section 5: FORM OF BOND. That the form of said bonds and interest coupons to be attached thereto and the Certificate of the Clerk and Treasurer of said City which shall be printed on the back of each bond, shall be substantially in the following form, viz:

The foregoing bonds have been issued for the purpose of providing funds to pay part of the costs of the construction of additions and betterments to the water system and installation of a sewage collection and treatment system, as authorized by Ordinance Nos. 168 and 179 and as authorized at special elections held with said City on November 2, 1972 and May 14, 1974. This bond is issued under the authority of and in strict compliance with the Constitution and Laws of the State of Idaho and with Chapter 47 of the Session Laws of Idaho of 1951, and the Ordinance and Resolutions of this City.

The City of Juliaetta further covenants and agrees to keep and perform all of the covenants of this bond and of Ordinance Nos. 168, 179, and \_\_\_\_\_.

Any future charge or special fund indebtedness which may be created by said City, to be payable out of the revenues of said water-sewers system, except for party bonds, shall constitute a charge and lien subject and junior to the charge and lien thereon created by said Ordinance.

Section 6: WATER-SEWER SYSTEM FUND. There is herein created in the office of the Treasurer, in the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, a "Water-Sewer System Fund," the gross revenues and other income derived by the City from this ownership and operation of the water-sewer system shall be paid into said Fund, the monies shall be paid out of said fund in accordance with the following priorities.

Section 7: PAYMENT OF CURRENT EXPENSES: As a first priority, current expenses shall be payable as a first charge from the Water-Sewer System Fund as the same becomes due and payable. Current expenses shall include all necessary operating expenses, current maintenance charges, expenses of reasonable upkeep and repairs, insurance charges and all other expenses incident to the operation of the water-sewer system, but shall not include depreciation.

Money in the Water-Sewer System Fund over and above the requirements set forth in this Ordinance may be used for making additions, extensions and improvements to the water-sewer system.

Section 8: BOND REDEMPTION FUND OF 1975. As a second priority, and subject to the aforesaid provision, there shall be paid into the "Bond Redemption Fund of 1975" which is herein created, moneys for payment of the annual installment of the 1975 bond or bonds and the interest thereon, a sum equal to at least 1/12th (or such larger amount as is necessary) of the annual installment and interest thereon becoming due on the next succeeding maturity date.

If the City, for any reason, shall fail to make such monthly deposits, then an amount equal to the deficiency shall be set apart and deposited in the said Bond Redemption Fund out of the gross revenues in the ensuing month or months, which amount shall be in addition to the regular monthly deposit required during such succeeding month or months.

It is hereby made the mandatory official duty of the Treasurer of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, for the time being, to maintain said Bond Redemption Fund of 1975, continuously in his office, and to pay, and to cause to be paid, into said Bond Redemption Fund of 1975, out of the said revenues of said water-sewer system, the interest thereon, and to apply said moneys for the payment and retirement of the said Water-Sewer Revenue Bond or bonds according to their terms.

The foregoing Bond Redemption Fund of 1975 and the funds paid therein, as required hereinbefore, shall be used solely for the purpose of the payment of the principal of said bond or bonds authorized hereby as they mature and become payable, and for the payment of the interest thereon as the same accrues and becomes payable, as provided in the interest coupons which multiple bonds are issued which coupons shall be attached to said bonds, without preference or priority of the interest upon one bond over another bond maturing in any one year, by reason of its numbering, priority of issuance or otherwise.

Section 9: RESERVE ACCOUNT. As a third priority, there shall be paid into the Reserve Account the sum of \$4,161 each year until there is an accumulation in that fund the sum of \$20,805, after which no further deposits need be made into said account except to replace withdrawals.

The Reserve Account shall be used and disbursed only for the purpose of paying the cost of repairing or replacing any damage to the facility which may be caused by an unforeseen catastrophe or when necessary for the purpose of making payments of principal and interest on the bond or bonds hereby authorized in the event the amount in the Bond Redemption Fund is insufficient to meet such payments. Whenever disbursements shall have been made from said account, said yearly payments shall then be resumed until there is again accumulated the maximum amount required. The moneys in said Reserve Account may be applied to principal and interest payment upon the last maturities.

All moneys in the Reserve Account may be kept in cash, invested in United States Government obligations, or any other obligations permitted by law. Interest earned upon amounts held in the Reserve Account shall be transferred when received to the credit of the Bond Redemption Fund Section 10: CHANGE OF DATE OF FUNDS. In the event the bonds, or bond, are not issued and sold until after 1975, then in that event, the City may by Resolution, change the date of the funds.

Section 11: COVERAGE. The City covenants and agrees to maintain said water-sewer system in a good condition and repair; to operate the same in an efficient manner; to establish and maintain and collect rates and charges that will provide revenue equal to 1.4 times the amount required each calendar year for the principal and interest due on all outstanding Water-Sewer Bonds and on any revenue bonds which may later be issued on a parity with these bonds, after operation and maintenance costs of such water-sewer system have been paid, but before depreciation. This coverage provisions applies in the event that the bonds are sold to a purchaser other than the United States Government or one of its agencies. In the event the bond issue is sold to the United States Government or one of its agencies, there will be provided revenue equal to 1.1 times the amount required each calendar year for the principal and interest due on the balance of this revenue bond issue and on any revenue bond or bonds sold to the United States Government and which may later be issued on a parity with this bond issue, after operation and maintenance costs of said water-sewer system have been paid, but before depreciation.

Section 12: CONSTRUCTION FUND. For the purpose of the administration of moneys from time to time to be received and expended in the construction of additions and betterments to the water-sewer system, as authorized by Ordinance Nos. 168 & 179 there is created a "Water-Sewer Department Construction Fund" to finance the construction and installation of the improvements, as provided by Ordinance Nos. 168 and 179. There shall be deposited therein the proceeds from the sale of the revenue bonds issued hereunder. There shall be charged to such Construction Fund all such items which by sound accounting practices constitute proper costs of the construction and installation of the improvements to the water-sewer system as allowed and ordered paid by this City. Moneys in the Construction Fund upon which there is no immediate requirement also may be invested as permitted by law. Any balances remaining in the Construction Fund upon completion

of construction shall be transferred to the Bond Redemption Fund of 1975. Section 13: ISSUANCE OF PARITY ADDITIONAL BONDS. Additional Water-Sewer Revenue Bonds on a parity basis may be issued for any legal purpose, upon the following terms and conditions: (1) At the time of the issuance of such additional Water-Sewer Revenue Bonds there is no deficiency in any of the funds established by this Ordinance with respect to any outstanding revenue bond issue, or issues, which bond obligations constitute a lien upon the funds arising from revenues derived from the operation of the water-sewer system as presently constituted, or as expanded and improved, or revenue derived from any part thereof.

(2) The City shall provide in such Ordinance authorizing the issuance of additional bonds on a parity of lien with these bonds, that there will be established for each such issue a Bond Redemption Fund, which shall include a Reserve Account, or the existing funds may be increased to reflect the increased debt service of any new bond issue or issues. There shall be paid into said Reserve Account within a period to be provided by ordinance authorizing such parity issue, but in no event later than five years from date of issuance of said bonds, an amount equal to one years average debt service on the additional bond issue or issues. The City shall thereafter maintain such amount in said Reserve Account, (making payments therein in the event of transfers therefrom to the Bond Fund) during such time as such bond issue shall remain outstanding, except that the moneys in said Reserve Account may be used to pay the principal and interest upon the last maturing bonds.

(3) Before such parity bonds are issued, a certificate must be prepared by a qualified independent consulting engineer to the effect that the net income of the water-sewer system, as defined below, for any twelve consecutive months out of the immediately preceding thirty-six months, along with any additional income to be derived from the improvements to be constructed from the proceeds of the parity bonds and after giving effect to any rate increases, will at least be equal to 1.1 times average annual sinking fund or average annual principal and interest requirements on the outstanding bonds and the parity bonds proposed to be issued. Net income is defined as gross water-sewer revenues, and any other income less operating expenses, but before depreciation.

(4) The City shall have the power, and reserves the right to issue refunding bonds having a parity of lien as in this Ordinance provided: (a) Such refunding bonds may be exchanged for, or their proceeds used to retire, prior to maturity, an equal amount in principal value of outstanding bonds, or any part thereof, issued for acquisition, construction, betterment or extension of the water-sewer system, or any part thereof, or any or all other water-sewer revenue bonds herein presently issued, or any part of said bond issues; and, (b) Such issuance of refunding bonds does not require a larger debt service payment in any year thereafter over the life of the bonds to be refunded; and, (c) The City will, in the Ordinance providing for the issuance of such refunding bonds and the creation of a Bond Redemption Fund, further create a Reserve Account or add to the current reserve account in the manner provided in Section \_\_\_\_\_ of this Ordinance.

(5) Nothing herein contained shall prevent the City from issuing Water-Sewer Revenue Bond or Warrants, which are a charge upon the Bond Redemption Fund junior or inferior to the payments to be made

into said Fund or any other fund created on behalf of any party bonds issued subsequent to this issue.

Section 14: ACCOUNTING SYSTEM. A complete set of books of account of said water-sewer system shall be kept in the office of the Treasurer of said City and shall be open to inspection by the public at any time during office hours. The books of account shall be audited every two years by a public accountant appointed by the City of Juliaetta, Idaho. Said audit shall be made within sixty (60) days following the close of each period. Each such audit, in addition to whatever matters may be thought proper by the accountant, may be included therein, shall include the following:

- 1. A statement in detail of the income and expenditures of the water-sewer system for each fiscal year.
2. A balance sheet as of the end of such fiscal year.
3. The accountants comment regarding the manner in which the City has carried out the requirements of this Ordinance and the accountants recommendation for any charge or improvement in the operation of the system.
4. A list of the insurance policies in force at the end of the fiscal year setting out as to each policy the amount of the policy, the risks covered, the name of the insurer and the expiration date of the policy.
5. The number of metered customers at the end of the year, the number of unmetered customers at the end of the year. All expenses incurred in the making of the audits required by this section shall be regarded and paid as a maintenance and operation expense.

Section 14: EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force upon its passage, approval and publication in at least one issue of the official newspaper of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho.

Passed under suspension of all rules and regulations of the City Council upon such proper roll call votes being duly taken, at a special meeting of the Council of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, held on March 25, 1975.

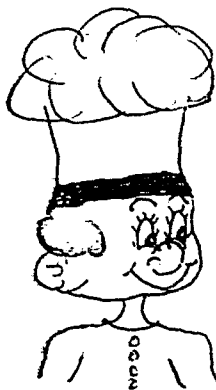
