The time to use a soil fumigant is when the soil has warmed up in the spring. The last past of May, after the morning glory is up and the soil temperature reaches 50 degrees, is

DEPT. OF UNEMPLOYMENT During the past week there has been a sharp drop in the number of

jobs available or received as compared with the previous week. Only 11 persons were placed as compared with 10 a week ago and fewer new jobs were received. At the end of the week, only 20 jobs remain unfilled including a nurse's aide, gournet housekeepers, day-workers, autoparts person, cashier, secretary (full time), experienced bookkeeper, heavy equipment operator, forestry tech-nician, and bartender. Last week

there were 32 unfilled openings. The number of persons seeking unemployment insurance benefits for

the second time declined from last week's 39 to 16. The total number of persons continuing to seek henefits has also made a sharp drop from last week and for the first time in almost two months was below 600. Only 546 persons were claiming as compared to 614 the previous week. However, this is still much higher than the 439 of a year ago. In the immediate Moscow area, the total declined from 224 to 198, but was still higher than last year's total of 166. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area unemployment was down to 212 as compared to 228 but still higher than last year's 167. 106 checks are going into the Potlatch area, down

from 124 the previous week but again, much higher than last year's figures of 84. The totals for Genesee are 14, 19, and 12, and for Kendrick are 16, 19, and 10. Weather conditions continue to be a factor in the unemployment picture in Latah
