**SPRING WILD TURKEY HUNT**  
 The spring turkey season begins on May 3 and runs through May 11, 1975 in Units 11, 13, 14, 18, 19-A, 22, 23 and 39. All of these units are described in the spring turkey hunt regulation leaflet. If you are interested in hunting these birds, be sure and pick up a copy of the regulations before you finalize your plans.  
 It's a season for one male bearded turkey only, and a person must purchase a turkey tag before hunting. If you purchase a tag this spring and are unsuccessful in taking a male turkey, the tag will still be good for the general season either-sex turkey hunt in the fall.  
 There is a restriction on the type

of weapon you must use. You are required to use a shotgun or a long-gun are allowed. If you use a shot gun, the shot size must be a BB size shot or smaller, nothing larger than bow and arrow—no rifles or hand-a BB is allowed.

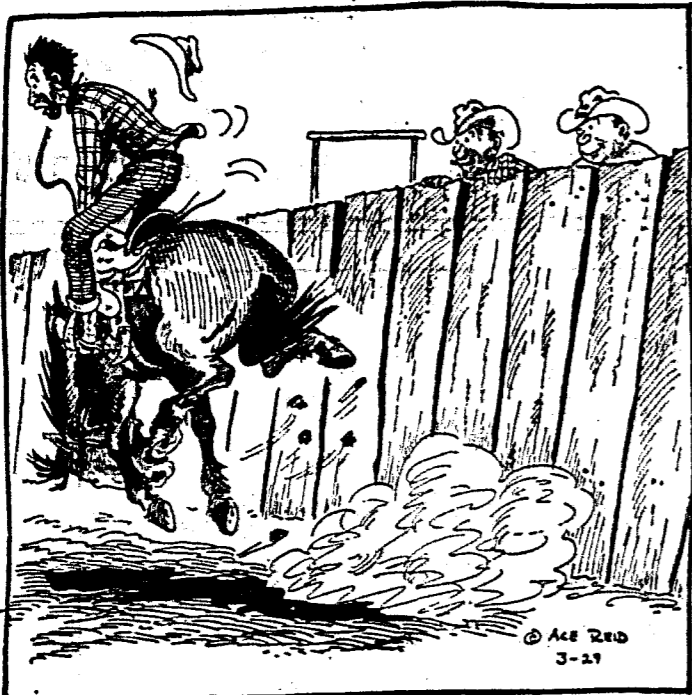

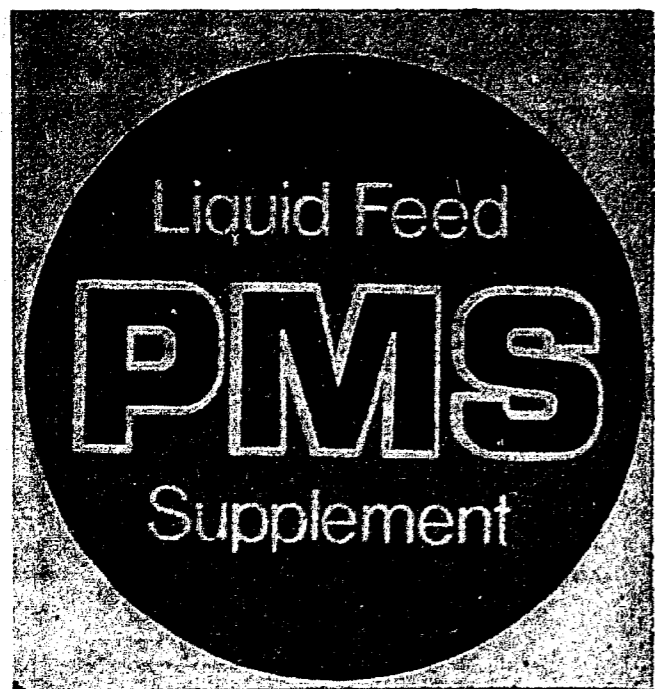
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JULIE DEOBALD

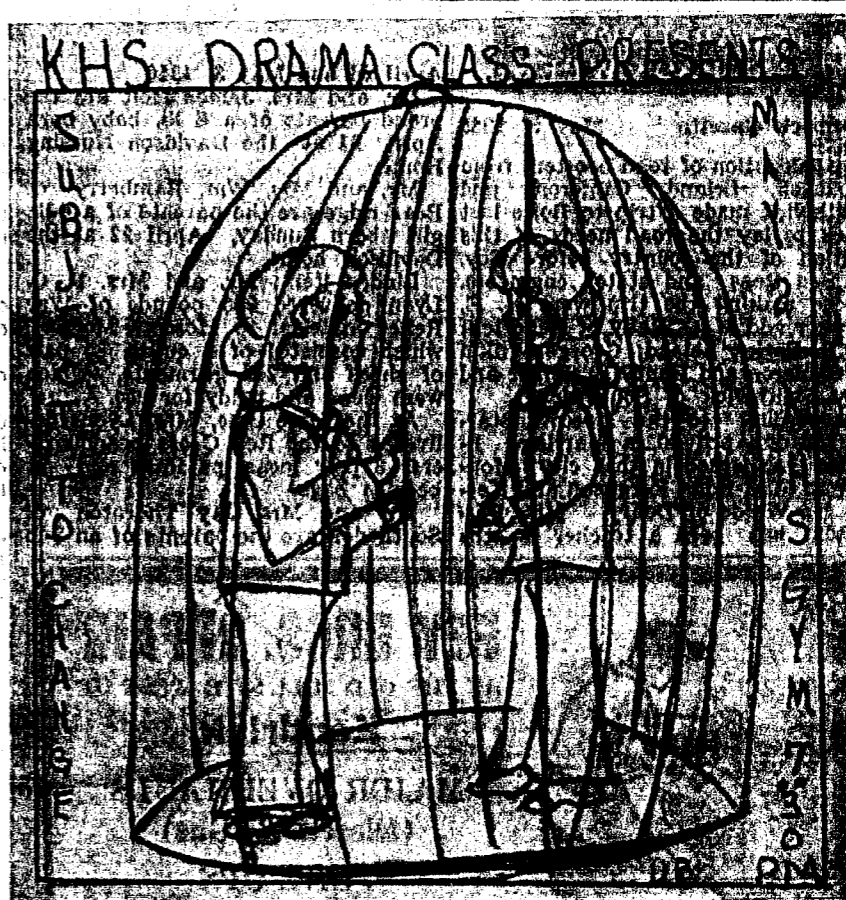

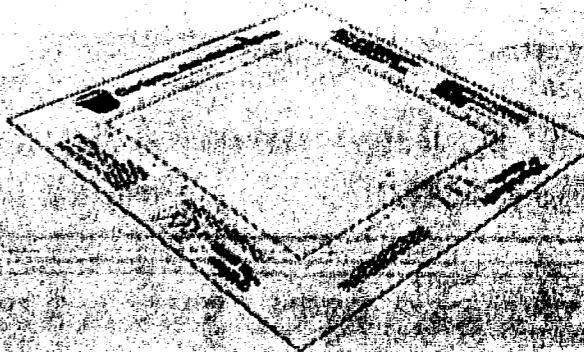
During their visit to the hatchery they saw steelhead bond samples being taken for age determination of the fish. They also saw egg samples and the immature fish known as Sac fry.
