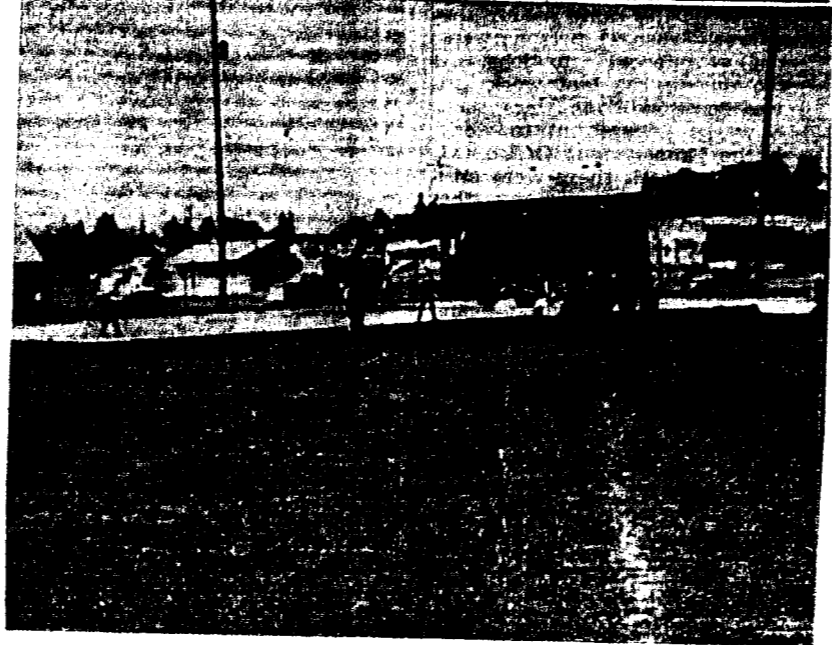

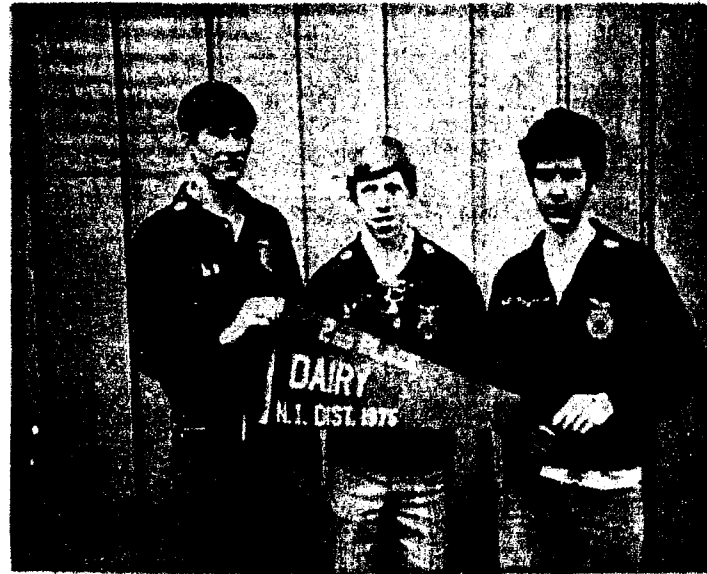
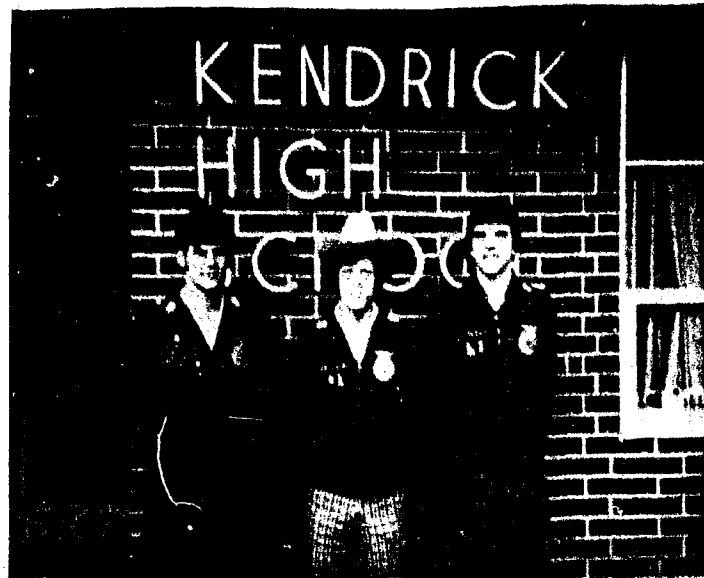

### 10 Workers Placed

Ten workers from Latah Co. were given job placement help during the past week. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager for the Idaho Department of Employment reported that his offices placement activity was just about the same as for the previous week when 11 persons were successfully referred to jobs. A year ago during the last week in April weather conditions were such that 23 workers were put to work through the Employment Office. At the end of the week there were still 24 jobs open, included among the workers needed were secretaries, an auto mechanic, a chef, a bartender, other cafe and domestic workers and some technical workers.

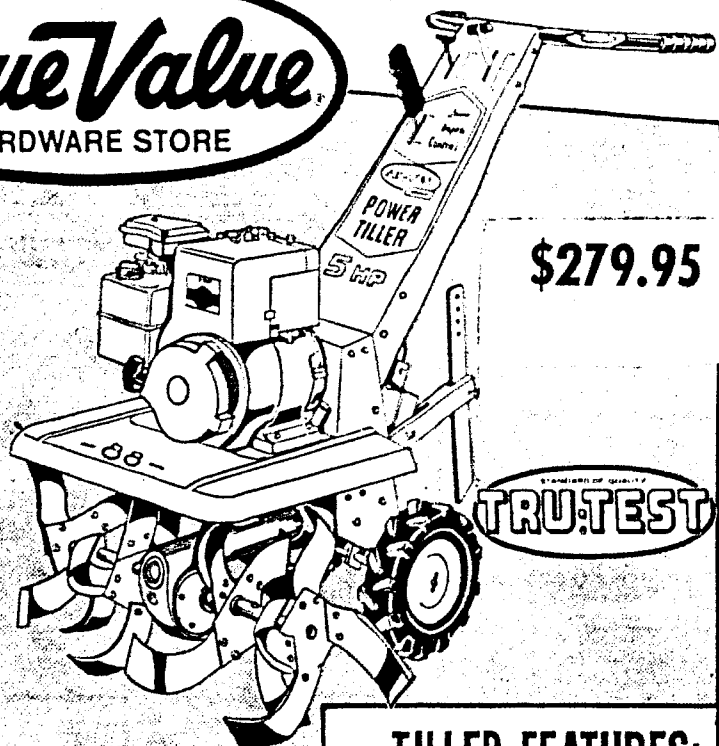

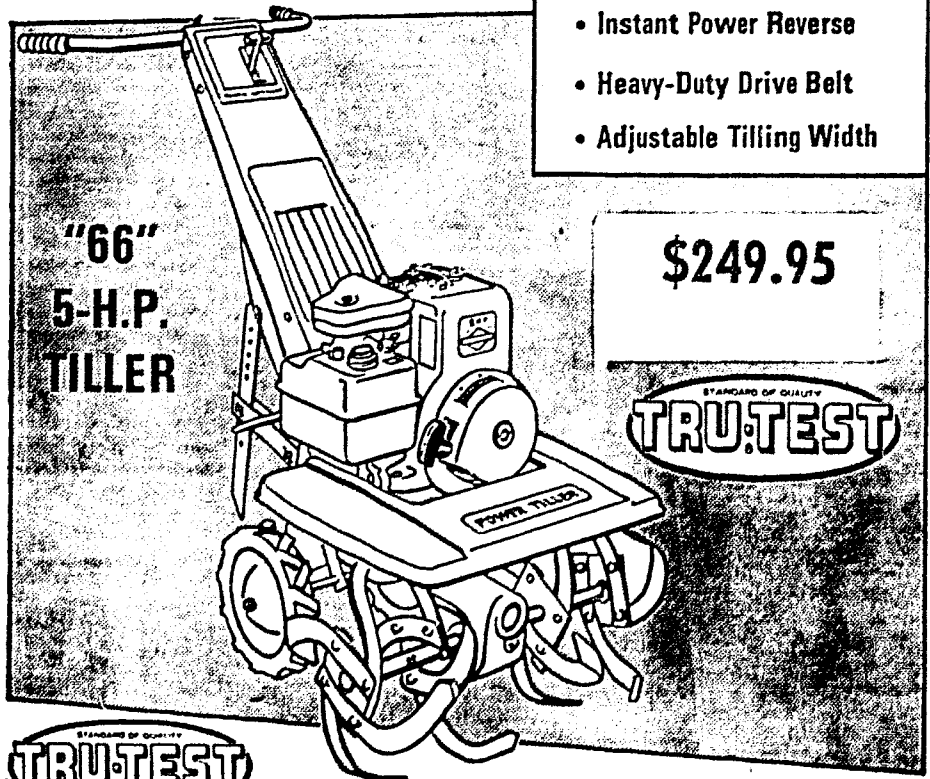

time during the same week a year ago. The total number of idled workers seeking benefits in Latah Co. now stands at 553, up a few from the previous week's 545, up quite a bit higher than last year's total of 420. In the immediate Moscow area there are now 200 benefits claimants, 2 more than a week ago, but up a third from last year's 162. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area the total dropped slightly from last week's 212 to the present 205, but still about a third higher than the 164 of a year ago. At Potlatch 117 persons are seeking jobs; pay compared to 106 a week ago and only 73 at this time in 1974. The totals for Genesee are 14 now, the same a week ago and 9 year ago. The Kendrick totals are 17, 16, and 12.

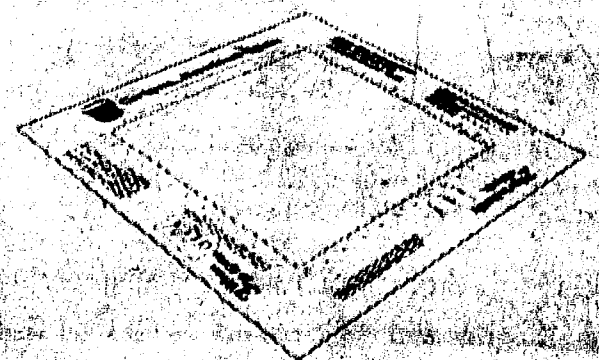

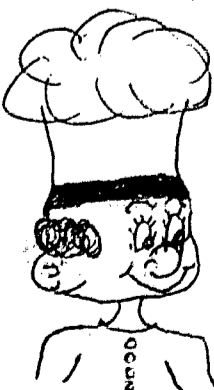
