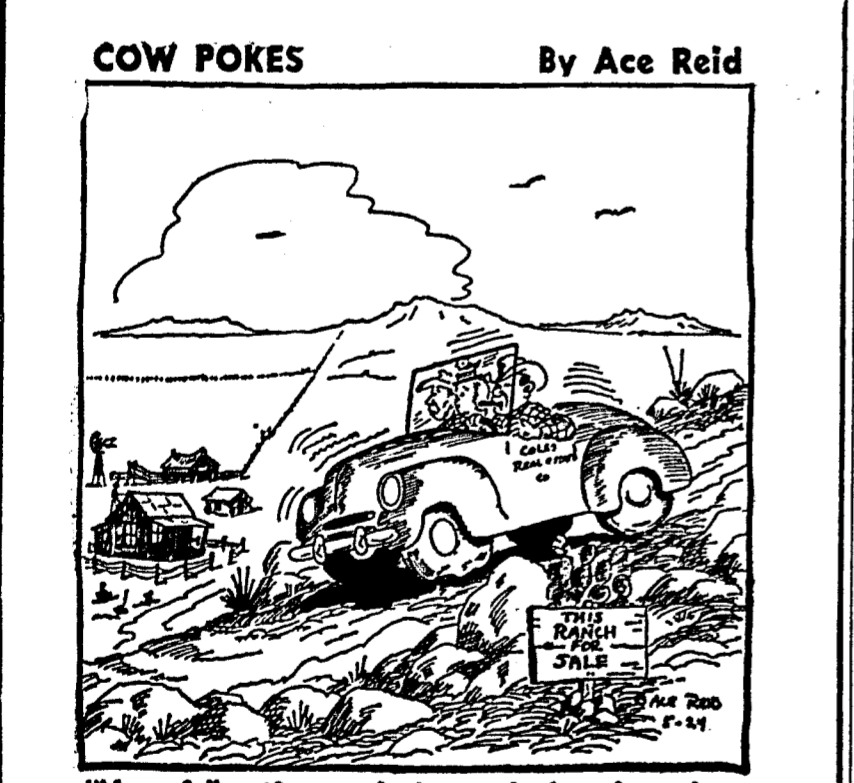

We spent the first half of the morning at Whitman Elementary and the second half at Centennial Elementary. The two schools both use PT (precision teaching). This system is based on recognition and not being worked on and improvement and comprehension will follow.

This system seems to work very well and our teacher plans to obtain information so that she may work with this in the classroom. We were all impressed with this system. SRA testing is also used in both of these schools the same as our school.
