### Lillie Dale Aherin, 92, Passes May 17

Lillie Dale Aherin has resided at Genesee since July, 1918 (except for the years 1944-51 when she lived at Clarkston, Washington).

She was born May 21, 1882, to William and Mary Pierson at their farm near Rockwell City, Iowa. At the time of her death, May 17, 1975, she was 92 years of age—and within County Planner; Charles Hudson, Assembly of the county Planner; Inc. four days of reaching her 93rd birthday anniversary.

Her parents, five brothers, and two sisters have all preceded her in death. She and Daniel W. Aherin were

married in Jefferson City, Iowa, during April of 1902. ### **Zone Change Not Required** For School of Country Living In Nez Perce County

A conditional Use Permit or a request for a zone change to operate Carla Emery's School of Country Living will not be required by Nez Perce County, it was decided at a meeting Monday evening at the Kendrick City Hall. However, Latah County reserved an opinion on whether such a permit would be required until a full session of the Planning and Zoning Commission of that county was held. Much of the land which would be used by the proposed school is located in Nez Perce County, but 1.05 acres is in Latah County and it is on this land that the school would construct parking areas and erect a fruit and vegetable stand.

sistant Latah County Planner: Jay Nelson, chairman of the Latah County Planning and Zoning Commission; Bill Roth, a member of the Latah County Planning and Zoning Com-mission, and Mr. and Mrs. Michael Emery, who would own and operate the school.

The purpose of the meeting, which was an informal session, was to allow the chairman of the two planning commissions and the county planners to discuss with the Emerys what the present plans for the school were; review the impact statement and to decide if the school would or should

According to the separate impact statement submitted by the Emerys, the number of people expected to participate in the school on a daily basis is largely unknown. This is because they were not certain they would be allowed to operate the school and could not, or would not, solicit reservations in advance. They said their mail indicates possibly 50 people a month in the three summer months might visit.

In their statement the Emerys stated the school is not proposing to offer food or housing to students. Those attending would be required to seek housing at area hotels or motels. A letter from a registered nurse

currently living in California was also submitted indicating her desire and willingness to be present at the school during the summer months. The Emerys also reiterated their previous statement that at the pres-

ent time there would be no admission

charge for the various classes which would be offered. This fact was one of the determining factors in the Nez Perce County Aherin's pioneering experiences in preliminary decision not to request a zone change; however, Ingle indicated any future changes in the operation

would have to be reviewed. 

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
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
