Weed Control Materials

There are farmers who are still buying weed control materials which are sold by phone from back east. These materials are 98% diesel or similar oils, 2 1/2% weed control materials and some inert materials.

These can't possibly produce the kind of weed control we need, according to Gordon Dailey, Latah Co. Extension Agent.

The cost is about \$16 per gallon, plus freight. "The Weed Supervisor and I recommend using known materials purchased from our own local, reputable dealers," Dailey said.

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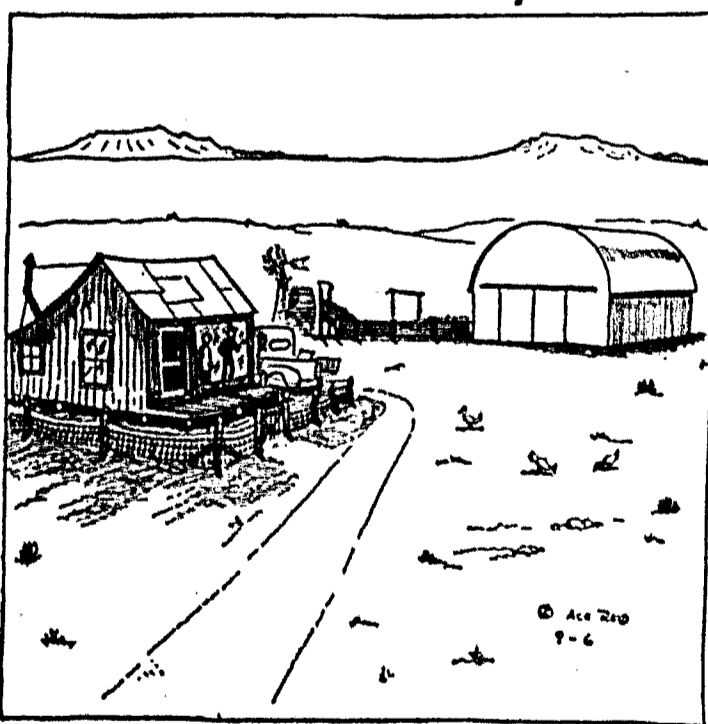
