South Latah Hgwy. Comm. To Meet In Genesee June 5

The public is invited to attend a meeting of the South Latah Highway District Commissioners on June 5 at 2 p. m. in Genesee to review the rural Functional Classification of highways, roads and streets in South Latah Highway district.

Functional systems to be presented for discussion are the outcome of a cooperative effort by State and county or highway district officials at a workshop meeting earlier this year. Representatives of local planning groups and Federal agencies also participated.

Functional classification is a process for grouping highways, roads and streets into classes and systems according to the type of service they provide. Purposes of the classification are two-fold: (1) Provide a systematic basis for realignment of the Federal-Aid Highway systems. (2) Serve as a management tool to be used in the administration of highways and roads at all levels of government.

The 1973 Federal-Aid Highway Act requires that realignment of the Federal-Aid Systems be completed by June 30, 1976. Functional systems identified in the classification process include Principal and Minor Arterials, Major and Minor Collectors, and Local Roads. Highways classed as arterials may become the Federal-Aid Primary System to be

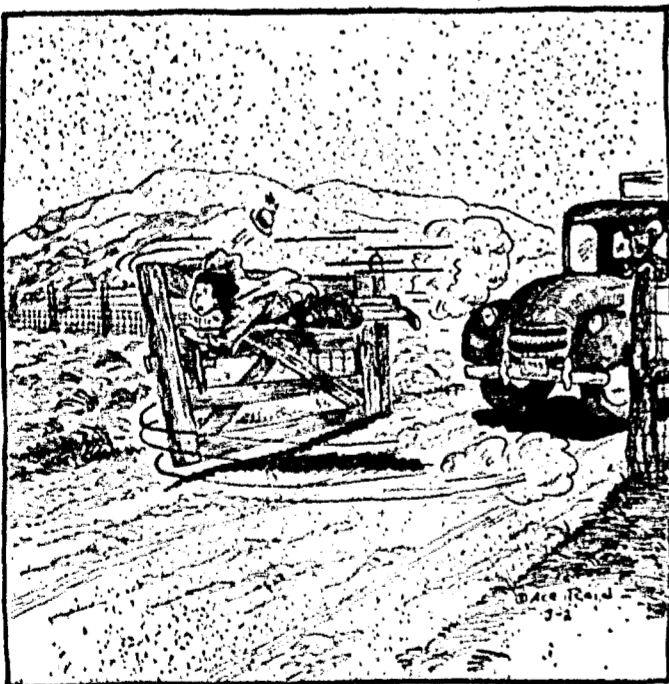

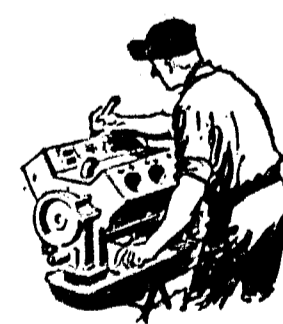
