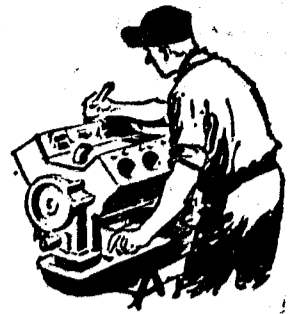

Water Line Work Talked at Genesee Council Meeting

Mayor L. W. Sorensen reconvened the meeting (recessed from Monday, June 9) at 8:00 Tuesday, June 17. Roll call showed all councilmen present.

Clift Morey, P. E. of Hoffman, Fiske and Wyatt (city engineers) attended the meeting to confer on the proposed water line improvement for the city. There was only one bid received at last week's meeting, that of Mel's Excavating. Nichols attended the meeting, along with J. Wayne Roach of General Repair of Genesee. Council rejected the formal bid and asked for hourly rates for machines, equipment and manpower. Mr. Roach informed the council that he was withdrawing from the bidding because of the press of other jobs which he has. The council accepted the bid from Mel's Excavating of Moscow for completing the proposed water system improvements from Elm St. to Laurel St. in the alley between Chestnut and Walnut.

The council was informed that the new CET A II employee will, if approved by Boise, begin employment on July first.

The council worked on amending the budget to compensate for additional revenues received by the City in excess of those originally budgeted for. The Street Department received \$1,304.87 as its share of the special allocation of State funds for street construction and maintenance. Budget hearing on the amended budget has been set for Monday, July 7, 1975, at 8:00 P. M. at City Hall.

No action was taken on a request that Ash Street between Elm and Tamarak (street directly south of the school) be closed for the summer so that children can ride their bikes on the street. The City will contact the school on the proposal.

A building permit for George Whit- ted to install a concrete patio and awning was issued.

Weed Spraying Crews Working In Area

County weed spray crews will start control work in the Kendrick area this week, reports Homer Futter, Latah County Weed Supervisor.

The target weed is spotted knapweed and the infestation covers the Little Bear Creek canyon down the river to the Nez Perce line.

The canyon will be sprayed by airplane using 2,4-D amine. From the Kendrick school down river will be hand sprayed with Banvel. In area not accessible to the sprayers Banvel granular will be applied by hand.

Landowners have been contacted by letter explaining the program and any questions should be directed to Homer Futter.

Spotted knapweed is only one of three weeds that threaten to cover the valley. Poison hemlock and tansy are either present or are spreading toward the area.

Spotted knapweed, white top, leafy spurge and dalmation toadflax are the weeds the program is trying to eradicate before they cover large acreages. The cost of control is carried by Latah County.

Latah County Job Placements Decline

Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow Office Manager for the Idaho Department of Employment, reported today that his office found jobs for only five persons compared with 18 last week. Only nine jobs remain at the end of the week including technical aide in plant and soil science, senior secretary, beautician, beauty salon manager, technical aide in vet. science, and house manager.


At the end of the week, 55 persons had filed new claims, including many persons not formerly covered by regular unemployment compensation benefits. However, the total number of persons continuing to seek jobless benefits declined another week from a total of 413 last week to 396 currently. At this time a year ago, there were only 283 persons seeking benefits. This decline should continue so long as good weather prevails, and more out-of-doors work activities are available.
